

British Freighter in Trouble With Shifted Cargo Returning to Port From Cape Flattery

SEATTLE, Dec. 17: (CP)-Bound for Shanghai with a cargo of lumber, the British freighter Cape Ortegal was in distress Sunday night four hundred miles off the coast outside of Cape Flattery when her cargo shifted. The Empress of Asia and other vessels went to her assistance but a wireless message this morning stated that the crew had succeeded in trimming the ship so that she might return to port unassisted.

The Cape Ortegal's "S. O. S." was picked up at midnight last night by the provincial police boat P. M. L. 9 at Ocean Falls, according to word received at divisional headquarters of the provincial police here. The distress call was forwarded to Victoria.




