PATTULLO RESOLUTE IN HIS DEMANDS

GOVERNMENT POLICY SAID TO BE "WORK AND WAGES" AHEAD OF BONDHOLDERS' CLAIMS—PATTULLO AND HIS CABINET REACH FEDERAL CAPITAL TODAY.

VANCOUVER, April 23: (CP)—The following special dispatch from Ottawa was published in the Province today:

"Premier T. D. Pattullo and his cabinet colleagues arrived here this morning from the west to sell their 'new deal' to the Dominion government and secure a large federal loan of at least \$8,000,000 in order that the province may finance some kind of program of work and wages.

"British Columbia will tell Premier R. B. Bennett through Premier Pattullo that the province cannot continue financing from hand to mouth, not knowing whether it will be able to meet its bills at the end of the month.

"Premier Pattullo was besieged by newspapermen today but he refused to talk until he had met the federal government tomorrow.

"It was known, however, that, if the federal government would not finance the province, British Columbia would undertake to develop a fiscal economic policy of its own with consequences which will affect everybody. Specifically, it will mean default on interest charges of the provincial debt for the government has no intention of abandoning unemployment relief or any essential service in order to pay the bondholders."

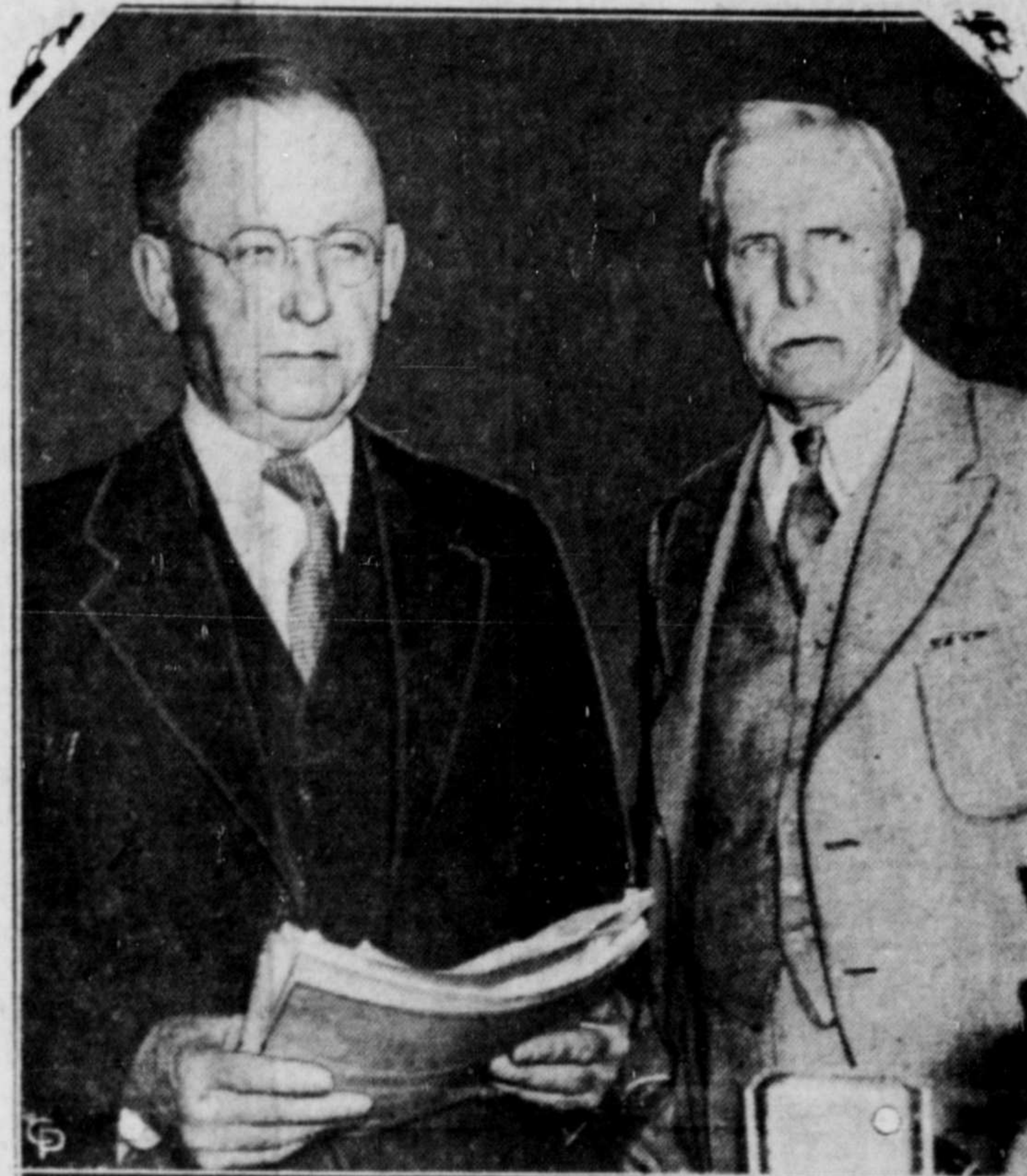

Levy Is Considerably Less This Year Than Last, Figures Reveal

A veritable army of federal and state officers was unable to hold the notorious desperado who escaped some weeks ago from the jail at Crown Point, Indiana, with a wooden pistol.

PLOT TO ASSASSINATE KING CAROL RESULTS IN PRISON SENTENCES

BUCHAREST, Roumania, April 23.—Thirteen persons, including a colonel of the King's Guard, were found guilty yesterday of a conspiracy to assassinate King Carol, each being sentenced to ten years' imprisonment.

Support of Roosevelt For Move to Improve Silver Is Believed to Have Been Won

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 23:—Following his conference on Saturday with the silver senators, President Franklin D. Roosevelt was reported to be ready to compromise on the silver question. It was intimated that the chief executive might be willing to agree to mild legislation of a permissive rather than a mandatory nature with a view to improving the silver price situation. It is said, however, that he is not prepared to agree to the setting of a fixed ratio for silver with gold.

It is now thought that the president may support the Dies silver bill in a revamped form with the elimination of inflationary clauses. The Dies Bill would provide for the exchange of domestic farm products of the United States for silver at twenty-five percent above the world market price. This plan, it is anticipated, would have the effect of improving the market for agricultural products and at the same time raise the price of silver and, therefore, would be supported by both the farming and the silver interests of the country.

The Senate silver bloc decided today to demand enactment of the Dies Bill in its mandatory form despite the opposition of President Roosevelt.

### TELEVISION IN BRITAIN

Television tests have been made in Britain which seem to indicate that radio as applied to conveying pictures has advanced almost, if not altogether, to the commercial stage. The British Broadcasting Company, which is a national institution controlling radio, claims the sole right of operating television in Britain but this, it is intimated, is likely to be challenged. Three different systems are in use and the B.B.C. has not yet definitely tied itself to either but is likely to do so soon. It is claimed that television will revolutionize broadcasting in the very near future, just as the talkies revolutionized the theatre. In the meantime we enjoy or curse the radio, depending upon our mood, the quality of the broadcast or the quality of reception for the time being.

### SILVER IS PROBLEM

Silver is the problem that has been agitating mining men for some months and the situation is even more interesting today than it has been. At present silver stocks are down, indicating that mining men and speculators are doubtful of any congressional action to improve its position. Even without any definite action there is a possibility of price improvement and indications seem to be that President Roosevelt will make some move that will be beneficial to the silver mining industry. What is needed is an increase in price sufficient to warrant mines at present inactive to again operate, even at a small profit.

### AN ERA OF FEAR

While few individuals seem to be infected with the fear of war, almost all nations except Canada are preparing for defense against any foe that may arise. France is afraid of Germany. Some nations are afraid of Italy. Austria's neighbors fear that the Nazi influences may cause trouble in their sphere. Russia is afraid of Japanese aggression. Chinese groups fear other Chinese groups and all fear the Bolshevik groups. National fear fanned by armament interests keeps the nations armed to the teeth and ready for any eventualities.

## WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Pink Salmon Experiments at Massett; Disinfecting Plant Installed; New Fish Buyer Arrives.

With Dr. A. L. Pritchard of the Nanaimo Biological Station in charge, operations are again in progress at McClinton Creek, Massett Inlet, where the fry resulting from the planting of 550,000 "eyed" pink salmon eggs are being enumerated. These eggs were obtained from mature pinks in the Tlell River on the east coast of Graham Island during the month of August, 1933. They were then conveyed to the hatchery at McClinton Creek, "eyed" and planted in the creek late in October. This experiment should not only produce definite data on the question of the efficiency of "eyed" egg planting in the transference of pink salmon, but, as a result of marking a number of the migrants by removing the adipose and right ventral fins, should also give additional information on the migrations of the species.

With ninety-six passengers on board, C. P. R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, was in port from 10:30 to noon yesterday bound north on her regular fortnightly voyage to Skagway and other Alaska points. More prospectors going into Squaw Creek and other areas in Northern British Columbia and the Yukon and members of the boat crews of the Yukon and White Pass Route bound for Whitehorse for the summer formed an important part of the passenger list. Two passengers disembarked from the vessel here while fifteen joined her at this port for the north, giving her a total of 109 on board as she left here. The Princess Norah is scheduled to call here southbound on Thursday afternoon.

The Northern Fishermen's Cold Storage Company of Prince Rupert has installed a formaldehyde disinfecting plant for the use of hall-but boats. This is the second company at Prince Rupert to make available the process recommended by the local Fisheries Experimental Station.

With a fair sized list of passengers on board, Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, arrived in port at 8 o'clock last evening from the south and sailed a couple of hours later for Anyox, Stewart and other northern points whence she will return here tomorrow morning and sail at 1:30 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints. The Catala, before reaching here, called at Oceanic Cannery to let off W. G. Mitchell, accountant of the cannery, R. M. Gosse, son of Robert Gosse, head of the company, and freight for the plant.

William Ballantyne, who has been chief engineer of the steamer Prince Rupert for the past six months during the absence on the Atlantic Coast of Chief Engineer W. E. Baillie, who returned here from the east last week to resume the post, will transfer this week to the Prince John as chief. George Davidson, who has been chief on the Prince John will come over to the Prince Rupert as second engineer.

Charles Lissom Smith arrived in the city at the end of the week to take up his duties here as local representative of Edmunds & Walker, New Westminster and Vancouver fish handling concern, which will engage in mild curing of salmon on the Skeena River at Balmoral as well as in the fresh fish shipping business from here. Miss Ursula Malkin Delights Audience at First Presbyterian Church Saturday

It was a brilliant performance, an interpretation of the works of the masters such as few Prince Rupert people ever have a chance to hear.

Miss Malkin is a striking personality, much belied by her photographs, but in Saturday evening's recital she seemed to be so carried away by her art that the performer became lost in the performance. She had a sympathetic audience and she took full advantage of the situation.

The program was well varied. It opened with a group of Mozart compositions, including the "Sonata in D Major" and Debussy's delightfully sweet "Reflections in the Water." Chopin was represented by two brilliant studies and two all too brief mazurkas, the dances which delighted our grandmothers. The Greig "Ballade" was a quaint little composition, alluring and wholly enjoyable. The closing piece was "St. Francis Walking on the Water," an interpretive composition by Franz Liszt, illustrating the miracle of the saint triumphing over the forces of nature. 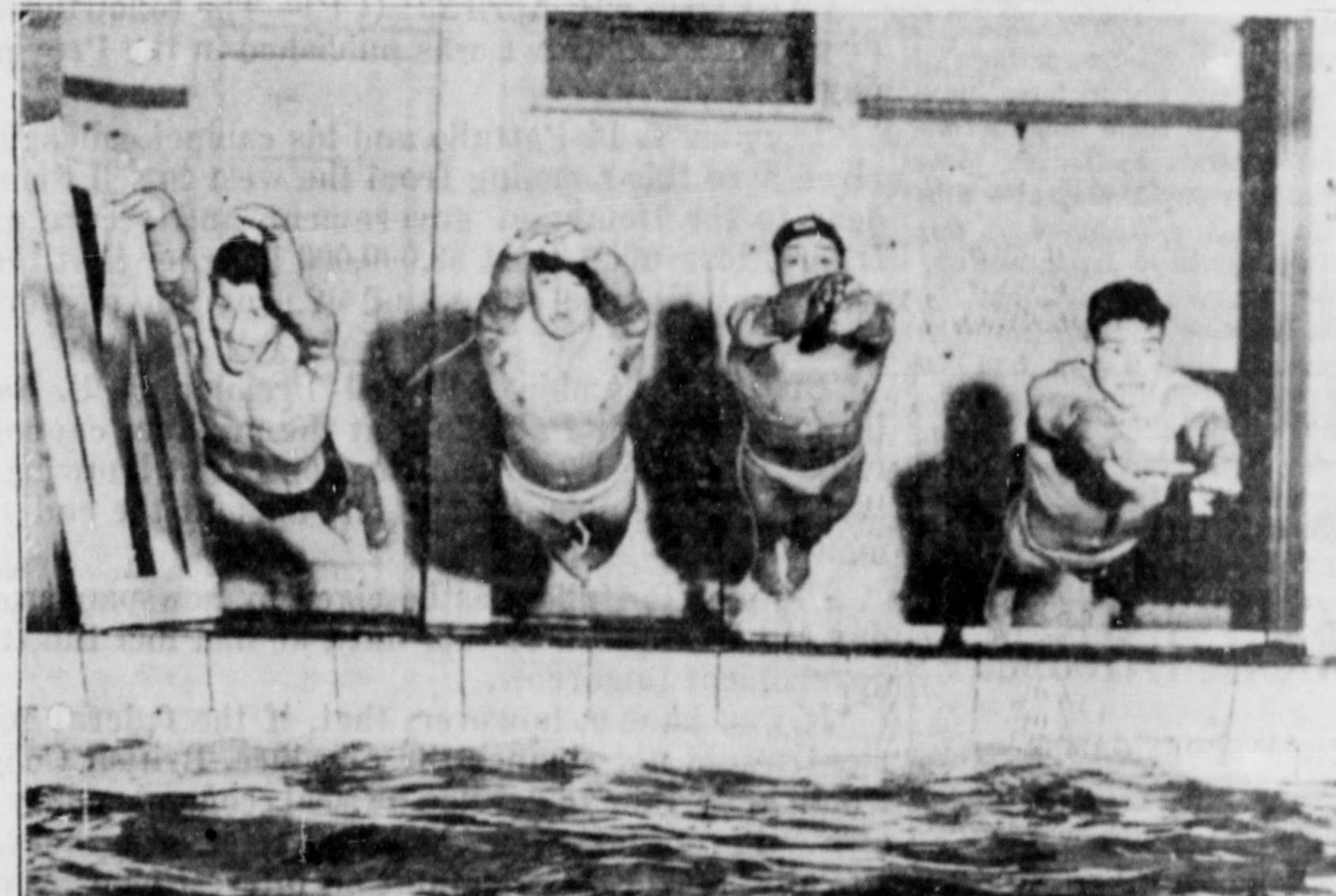

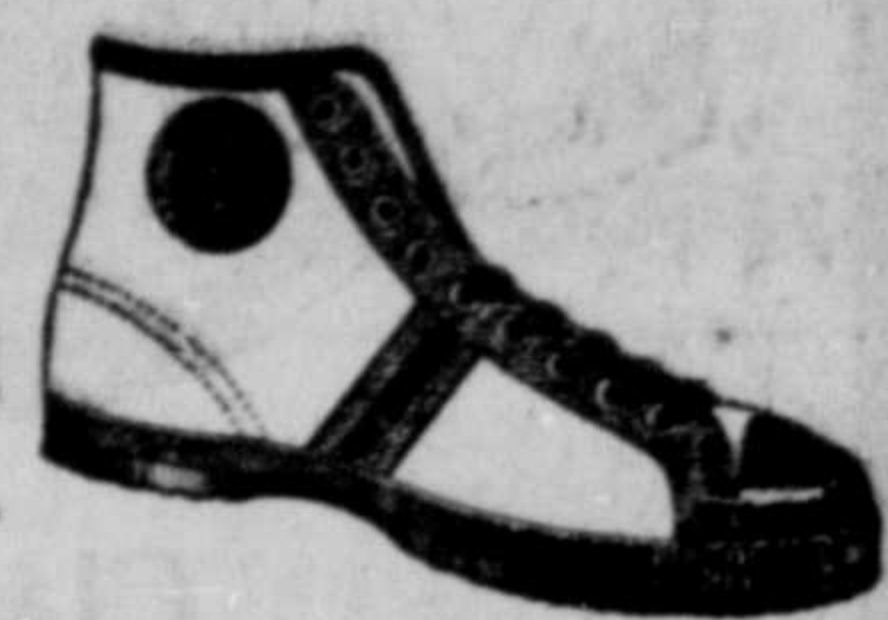
