No. 172. FIVE CENTS NAZIS CAPTURE CHANCELLOR DOLFUSS WHO DIED LATER

Violent Bid For Power Is Made Today By Nazis In Austria Where Rebel Faction Seems To Have Succeeded Thus Far

President Miklas Captured by Federal Army But Attack Threatened by Dolfuss Supporters On Nazi Headquarters in the Chancellory; Fighting Not Yet of Serious Nature.

VIENNA, July 25:- The Nazis made a violent bid for power in Austria today, capturing Chancellor Dolfuss, dictator of Austria, and most of the members of his cabinet and the trouble is reported to have spread as far as Klagenfurt, where President Miklas was reported captured by the federal army.

Machine guns were mounted on roof tops at strategic points throughout the city but fighting is believed not to have been of a serious nature. Police reports said Chancellor Dolfuss had been wounded and resigned.



LONDON, July 25:-Heavy thunder and rain storms swept over England yesterday bringing an end to the long drought from which the country has been suffering. Many roads are reported under several inches of water.



As "Purger" Hitler Addressed Nazis After Cleanzing

This picture was made shortly following the "Bloody Saturday" of June 30th, in which over 200 persons throughout Germany met death as Hitler "purged" the Nazi party of traitors.

Late this afternoon government officials not captured in the Nazi "Putsch" threatened an attack on the Chancellory where Dolfuss and his associates are being held.

Reports from London, Paris and Berlin stated that attempts to reach Vienna by telephone early in the evening were unsuccessful.

EVIDENTLY HE WAS MURDERED LONDON, July 25:-An exchange telegraph agency dispatch said it was officially announced tonight that Chancellor Dolfuss was dead. Unconfirmed reports from Vienna earlier stated that the Chancellor died of wounds.

VIENNA, July 25:-Josef Gerl, socialist, who declared his ideals were more important than his life, was hanged last night, the first victim of Chancellor Dolfuss' decree for terrorists.
