

Walled City Close To Shanghai Sieged; Many Killed by Marauders

Two Thousand Armed Robbers Visited Kingyu and Departed With Heavy Load of Loot, Leaving Fire And Death in Their Wake

SHANGHAI, April 6: (CP)-Laying feudal siege to the walled city of Kingyu, three miles north of here, two thousand bandits scaled the walls, looted and ravaged the populace and set fire to the town, departing heavily loaded with pillage. Casualties among civilians were heavy.

CROQUETTES

I teaspoon finely chopped onion, 4 tablespoons butter, 1/4 cup flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/8 teaspoonful pepper, 1/2 cup St. Charles Milk, 1/2 cup water or white stock, 2 egg yokes, 112 cups chopped cooked meat, 1 teaspoon mineed parsley.
