NEW YORK, Oct. 17:-Bruno Hauptmann lost his fight against extradition to New Jersey last night when the court refused his application of habeas corpus. It was decided by the court that the State of New Jersey has sufficient evidence to warrant Hauptmann's extradition to stand trial on charges of kidnapping and murdering baby Charles Augustus Lindbergh jr. two and a half years ago.

Hauptmann has already been indicted in the State of New York on a charge of extortion in connection with the collection of \$50,000 ransom money.






