ACTION IS TAKEN AGAINST MEIGHEN CANADIAN NATIONAL HEAD OPPOSED TO AMALGAMATION

Diversion of Ontario Hydro Board Funds is Alleged By Chairman

Stewart Lyon Charges Former Premier of Canada and Others With Using Commission Moneys to "Get Something on Liberal Party"

TORONTO, Oct. 17: (CP)—T. Stewart Lyon, chairman of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission, said last night that the commissioners had adopted a resolution that action be entered against Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen and T. A. Maguire, former commissioners, and two former officials for the return of money "illegally diverted from funds of the Commission."

MONETARY CHANGES

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 17:—The developments are expected to be announced within the next few days in connection with the nation's monetary policy as a result of discussions which have been in progress this week between President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Department of Treasury leaders and banking and financial leaders of the country.

Silver Issues Lead Revival in Stock Mart

NEW YORK, Oct. 17:—Stocks resumed an upward trend on the New York Exchange yesterday following the slump of the past week or so. Silver issues, particularly, showed renewed strength with gains of from two to five points. The day's turnover amounted to 800,000 shares.

It is expected, owing to hoof rot, the expedition lost thirty horses in a few days.

MILDENHALL, England, Oct. 17: (CP)—Twenty flyers from eight different countries are ready to start Friday on a 11,500-mile flight to Melbourne for a prize of \$50,000.

Volume of Retail Trade in United States Increasing

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 17:—Official government statistics reveal that the retail trade volume in the United States in September showed an increase of 2 1/2% over August.

HAUPTMANN LOSES OUT

Habeas Corpus Application Against Extradition to New Jersey Denied

NEW YORK, Oct. 17:—Bruno Hauptmann lost his fight against extradition to New Jersey last night when the court refused his application of habeas corpus. It was decided by the court that the State of New Jersey has sufficient evidence to warrant Hauptmann's extradition to stand trial on charges of kidnapping and murdering baby Charles Augustus Lindbergh jr. two and a half years ago.

Hauptmann has already been indicted in the State of New York on a charge of extortion in connection with the collection of \$50,000 ransom money.

Mrs. Stoll Safe, Family Announces

Was Brought Home Last Night in Company With Federal Officer

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 17:—The family of Mrs. Alice Stoll, wife of a wealthy Louisville oil operator, announced last night that she was alive and safe at home, arriving in company with a federal officer. Mrs. Stoll was kidnapped six days ago and \$50,000 was paid for her release. Search is now being made for Thomas H. Robinson, aged 27, former inmate of a lunatic asylum, in connection with the abduction.

Investigators are already holding Mrs. Robinson who, it is said, collected the money.

Mrs. Stoll was kept in an Indianapolis apartment and her condition is fairly good.

ARMY HEAD IN CANADA

Commissioner John McMillan of New York to Succeed Commissioner John Hay

TORONTO, Oct. 17: (CP)—Commissioner John McMillan, commander of the Salvation Army in the Eastern United States, has been named the new head of the Salvation Army for Canada succeeding Commissioner John Hay, retired.

More Men Go To Work Today On Road Building

Twenty-eight more men are being taken out to the Skeena River Highway road building camp at the present end of the road today to join the thirty-two who went to work on Monday in continuation of the construction of the road to Cloyah Bay.

Bella Coola Valley Ranchers Hard Hit by Floods; Cattle Lost and Crops Destroyed

With their cattle swept away and drowned, their crops ruined, their homes marooned in addition to other hardships and inconveniences, some twenty-five ranchers in the Hagensborg district of the Bella Coola valley are, nevertheless, standing by philosophically and hoping for the best following the disastrous floods which inundated the highway from Bella Coola to some five miles above Hagensborg early last week following the Bella Coola River breaking through its banks above Hagensborg and changing at least a portion of its course to flood some fifteen miles of highway, carrying out all the bridges in its way and making vehicular traffic impossible between Bella Coola and Hagensborg.

Such is the word brought to the city today by J. G. McRae of the Provincial Secretary's department, Victoria, who arrived this morning after a trip into the valley. There was no loss of human life or serious injury as a result of the flood but damage was extensive not only to the highway, which it almost looks may have to be rebuilt possibly by a different route, but also to the land and belongings of the farmers. No homes were actually destroyed although, in some cases, water has come up above the level of lower floors and the occupants had to move upstairs. Outbuildings and barns, etc., however, were affected.

Schools stand marooned and children are unable to reach them. Canoes are being used to navigate the water which covers the main highway to a depth of from a few inches to possibly feet at points of depression. The people are in no immediate peril and have supplies necessary for immediate requirements.

H. Lindsay Swan, district engineer for the provincial department of public works from Victoria, and two assistants were due to reach the flood area today to make a special survey of the situation as affects the highway.

Fullerton Believes Real Co-Ordination Would Mean Savings

Chairman of Government Railway Board Replies to President of Canadian Pacific—Interests Of Country Should be Regarded

HALIFAX, N.S., Oct. 17: (CP)—Amalgamation of Canada's two great railway systems would not be in the interests of the country, Hon. C. P. Fullerton, chairman of the board of trustees of the Canadian National Railways, told a gathering of Halifax business leaders. He departed from his policy of not discussing amalgamation to reply to E. W. Beatty K.C., president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, who recently asserted that amalgamation would have the effect of saving \$75,000,000 annually. All that could be saved by amalgamation, said Mr. Fullerton, could be saved if the railways honestly co-ordinated their efforts. If the railways wished to proceed ruthlessly, they could, of course, cut down expenses but it would be by reducing services, abandoning lines and putting men out of work.

ACTIVITY ON THE ISLANDS

Two Camps to Operate All Winter And Third Will Increase Output in Spring

There is likely to be a movement to further develop the Southeastern mine, known latterly as the Skidegate Sunrise. An effort is being made to interest new capital and it seems likely this may prove successful. This is the word brought to town by L. T. Wood, an old timer of Prince Rupert, who was in the city yesterday going south on the Catala from Skidegate.

Mr. Wood said two of the logging camps were planning to work all winter, Kelley's and Allison's. Allison's camp is at Cumsheva where a railway right-of-way is to be slashed at once and the road will be built back into the timber as the logging progresses. There is a stand there sufficient to last for ten years' operations.

Morgan's camp will close when the weather gets bad but preparations are being made for larger operations in the spring and many of the crew will remain at work throughout the winter. Six donkey engines were purchased by the firm from the Massett Timber Company and four of these are being conditioned for the work.

Work of drifting on the vein is being continued at the Haida Gold Mines at Kootenay Harbor.

AIR RACE INTERESTING


Many people will watch with interest the big air race that starts Saturday from England for Melbourne, Australia. The Mollisons have entered and so have a number of other famous British aviators. The prize of fifty thousand dollars will be enough to add zest to the race.

PERMISSION TO EXPORT

While as a settled policy the export of logs from British Columbia is not a good one, it is an excellent temporary expedient for getting rid of the hemlock that has to be cut at the same time that the spruce and other logs are being taken out of the woods. Logs have often been exported from the south but so far none have ever been allowed to be sent from Northern British Columbia except the few aspen that have gone through Prince Rupert. The permit to allow thirty million feet of hemlock to be sent to the Orient from Prince Rupert district will allow employment for a number of men and will give us a chance to benefit from the privilege which the south has enjoyed at various times.

THE HEAVY INDUSTRIES

A good deal of talk is heard in the United States in regard to the non-recovery of the "heavy industries" and we have been asked what are the heavy industries. As we understand it the heavy industries are those dependent on the building trades and transportation. The manufacture of building materials, of steel rails, of railway rolling stock and in a general way anything that has to do with permanent construction. To have these busy there must be a demand for the products and that can come only when the people have faith in their country and its future and also have the money to spend. Take Prince Rupert as an example. During good times about a quarter of the population are more or less dependent on the building trades. Today hardly anyone is employed on building work. Let a pulp mill be built here and building will start and everyone will be busy. It is a matter of faith in the place and its future. During the past few years people had lost faith in everything.

From the Waterfront

Walronda Calls Here—Malaspina On Trip to Islands—Good Cohoes At Skidegate Bar.

Southbound to Victoria after a trip to Stewart with Assistant District Engineer Halkett, who has been on wharf inspection duties, the federal department of public works cruiser Walronda was in port yesterday. The vessel arrived Monday afternoon from Stewart and Port Simpson, having spent overnight Sunday at the latter point.

C. G. S. Malaspina, Capt. A. Henderson, is due in port tomorrow after a trip to Port Simpson and the Queen Charlotte Islands. The vessel, which arrived here Sunday afternoon from Vancouver and left at noon Monday for Port Simpson whence she proceeded that night to Naden Harbor, Massett and Skidegate Inlets, had on board Major J. A. Motherwell, chief supervisor of fisheries from Vancouver, and C. E. Webb, engineer of the Dominion Water Branch, who is making an inspection of water supplies of Indian villages in this district. James Boyd, inspector of fisheries here, is making the trip to the Queen Charlotte Islands with Major Motherwell.

Having been delayed by loading a large parcel of canned salmon at Mill Bay in the Naas River, Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, returned to port at 2:15 yesterday afternoon from Anyox, Stewart and other northern points and sailed an hour later for Vancouver and waypoints.

Herring of unusually large size are reported to have been taking the coho spoons at Skidegate Bar, Queen Charlotte Islands, recently. Cohoes that are being caught there now are reported to be of splendid quality, the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. taking the most of them. Selling for chums on the Islands is said to have been very poor of late.

Capt. Lewis, who came north as pilot for the freighter City of Vancouver, which loaded aspen logs here at the end of the week for the Orient, and W. McKinstry, supercargo for the Ocean Shipping Co., sailed yesterday afternoon by the Princess Louise on their return to Vancouver.

C. N. R. steamer Prince George, Capt. Neil McLean, arrived in port at 10:30 o'clock this morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and will sail at 4 o'clock this afternoon for Anyox and Stewart whence she will return here tomorrow evening southbound.

Members of crews of the Yukon and White Pass Route river boats Klondyke and Casca were among a total of 178 passengers here yesterday afternoon aboard the steamer Princess Louise, Capt. Arthur Slater, which was in port from 3:30 to 5 o'clock southbound from Skagway to Vancouver. Seven passengers disembarked from the vessel here while twelve others went south from here aboard her. It was the last appearance here for the season of the Princess Louise which is now to be replaced for the winter by the Princess Norah which is due here on Sunday morning on her first voyage northbound on the Alaska route.

Northland Transportation Co.'s motorship liner Northland, Capt. Len Williams, was in port last evening from Ketchikan and, after discharging one carload of frozen halibut for transshipment east over the Canadian National Railways, sailed for Seattle.




