HENRY REIFEL FORFEITS BAIL BOND

HUGE CONSIGNMENTS OF SILVER ARE BEING SHIPPED

Vancouver Distillery Magnate Fails to Put In Court Appearance

Over Million Dollars of His and Other Defendants' Property Has Been Tied Up By United States Authorities

SEATTLE, Aug. 21: (CP)—While the \$100,000 bond of Henry Reifel sr. of Vancouver, Canadian distillery magnate, was being forfeited here yesterday, federal officials announced that the government had tied up under court writs approximately \$1,250,000 of property belonging to Reifel and others who are being sued for alleged huge liquor smuggling operations. The bond forfeiture was ordered by Federal Judge Jeremiah Neterer when Reifel failed to appear for arraignment on federal Grand Jury indictments.

PARTY SAW WHITE BEAR

Local Fishing Party Encounters Ursus Kermodii at Princess Royal Island

PROGRESS IS SLOW

Capture of Labatt Kidnappers Appears to be No Closer—Police Are Silent

TORONTO, Aug. 21:—Capture of the kidnappers who "snatched" John Labatt, wealthy London brewer last Tuesday and released him near Toronto sixty-five hours later appears no nearer following a week-end of intense police activity. With John Labatt silenced by threats of death if he talks, police clamped down a tight censorship on their activities last night and looked to the Canadian underworld for help in finding the millionaire brewer's kidnappers.
Provincial authorities have communicated with police of Detroit where Chief of Detectives Fred W. Frehm is in possession of evidence concerning the make-up of the kidnap band.

PLEDGES REJECTED

Premier Bennett Refuses to Back Up Henry Election Promises; Confers With Hepburn

OTTAWA, Aug. 21:—In a conference with Premier Mitchell Hepburn which lasted from 10:30 yesterday morning until 1:30 in the afternoon, Premier R. B. Bennett refused to acknowledge the Dominion's liability for one-third of the before election pledges of the former Henry ministry of the province of Ontario which cost over \$14,000,000.
Premier Hepburn reported at the conclusion of the conference on the relief question that every aspect of relief was discussed and an agreement is hoped for.

INCREASE IN PRICE

Packers in Canada Expected to Pay More as Result of Shortage Across the Line

OTTAWA, Aug. 21:—Increase by packers in the price of meat is foreseen in official circles as a result of the removal by the United States of the tariff on hay and feed owing to the prevailing shortage across the line.

CONVENTION OF ASSOCIATED BOARDS OF TRADE IS UNDER WAY IN PRINCE RUPERT TODAY

The purely formal part of the work of the convention of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia took place this morning at the opening session in the city council chamber with President L. B. Warner of Smithers in the chair. The president spoke of the value of the association in the past and suggested that its usefulness might be greater in the future than in the past. It was an attempt to correlate the activities of the individual boards in order to give them greater influence. He regretted that Stewart was not represented but the secretary explained that the Portland Canal centre had been hit hard by the depression and was only now in process of recovering. They had shown considerable interest in the proceedings but could not this year send a delegate.
Vice-President C. V. Evtitt of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce and City Commissioner W. J. Alder both officially welcomed the delegates from outside points. They felt that all matters of vital importance would have their whole-hearted support.
Mr. Warner spoke appreciatively of the interest taken in the work of the association by Commissioner Alder.
The question of whether publicity should be given to resolutions before they had been passed on by the committee was discussed and it was decided not to give them to the press until after the committee had reported. However, Captain J. B. Colthurst of Terrace managed to explain that one of the Terrace resolutions asked for the removal of the headquarters of the game department from Vancouver to Prince Rupert. The board had operated at a loss of \$42,000 last year. Another resolution was one providing for the making of agricultural education compulsory.
The resolutions committee consists of W. L. Armstrong of Prince George, J. W. H. Day of Vanderhoof, F. M. Dockrill of Telkwa, E. T.

Four Million Is Estimated Damage By Hail This Year

WINNIPEG, Aug. 21:—Normal conditions have returned to the prairie provinces after a hailstorm which slashed and battered crops, bringing this year's loss from hail in the western provinces to more than \$4,000,000.

PARIS, Aug. 21:—The Paris newspaper Le Soir charged yesterday that the will of the late President Paul von Hindenburg of Germany had been falsified so as to eliminate a recommendation that the former Kaiser Wilhelm II should succeed him.

Fifty Million Dollars Worth of White Metal Exported by Shanghai

This Amount Sent Out Over Week-End to London and New York, Total Shipments For August to Date Being Nearly \$100,000,000

SHANGHAI, Aug. 21: (CP)—Silver consignments valued at \$50,000,000, the heaviest volume of the white metal to flow from China this year, were shipped to London and New York over the week-end by the Shanghai banks. Since August 1 nearly \$100,000,000 worth of silver has been exported from China.

SQUADRON OF TWELVE PLANES FLYING FROM SITKA ARRIVES TODAY

United States Navy Aircraft Left Old Alaska Capital Shortly Before Noon Today—Mine Sweepers Arrived Last Night

Twelve United States Navy amphibian flying boats, in command of Lieutenant Commander on their way back to their base at San Diego after an expedition to the Alaskan Peninsula during the past month, hoped off from Sitka, Alaska, in relays of three starting at 11:20 this morning and, travelling at a speed of about eighty miles an hour, commenced arriving in Prince Rupert at 3 o'clock this afternoon. They will pay a four-day visit here, leaving on Saturday in continuation of their flight south.

TRAGEDY DETAILS

Believed Philip Ivanovitch Took His Own Life in Remorse After Accidentally Shooting Steve Zadoronzy

Further particulars of the double tragedy of the past week in the Pineview district of the Prince George area in which Steve Zadoronzy and Philip Ivanovitch are both dead of bullet wounds have been received at divisional headquarters of the provincial police here. Zadoronzy is believed to have been shot while picking berries in mistake for an animal, possibly a bear, by Ivanovitch who a few days later, in remorse, committed suicide by turning the weapon upon himself.

According to the police report, Zadoronzy went berry picking on Sunday, August 12, and, after he had failed to return home, the son

reported that he was missing. Search parties, under police direction, were sent out. On Friday, August 17, Ivanovitch committed suicide by shooting himself.

Ivanovitch, who had taken part in the search for Zadoronzy, was questioned closely by the police after it had been reported that he had been seen carrying a rifle on the day that Zadoronzy became missing. Following this questioning, it is believed that he shot himself.

It had not been uncommon for Ivanovitch to carry a rifle as he was known to be afraid of bears. He had been known to shoot at stumps in mistake for bears.

Zadoronzy's body was found on Saturday morning in a berry patch ten feet off the trail not far from Ivanovitch's homestead. There was a bullet wound in his body and twenty-five yards from the body was found a discharged 38-55 cartridge. Ivanovitch had used a 38-55 rifle in shooting himself.

The police have little doubt that Ivanovitch shot Zadoronzy accidentally and later took his own life. The theory of murder is discounted.

CAPTAIN SPEAKER

Commander of H. M. S. Danae Gives Address to Toc H

Quite a large gathering of Toc H members and friends assembled last night in the rooms on Second Avenue to welcome Capt. C. H. Knox-Little, R.N., Commander of H. M. S. Danae, and Lieutenant Commander M. G. Goodenough, R.N. The rooms were tastefully decorated with flowers and national flags. P. H. Linzey, the Toc H pilot, after the singing of "O Canada," opened with the ceremony of "Light" and then, in a few well chosen remarks, introduced the speaker.

The Captain's address was very instructive and inspiring. He described what Toc H was accomplishing in the Old Country. While this was the first time he had addressed a Toc H unit, Captain Knox-Little said he was well acquainted with the splendid work that was being done throughout the British Empire by Toc H under the enthusiastic inspiration of its patron, the Prince of Wales. Its foundation was laid on comradeship and service. One of the most important "jobs" that was being done in Great Britain, was the taking under their wing of the unemployed, more especially the younger generation. Camps, clubs and various educational facilities, both mental and physical, had been organized by Toc H and were doing wonderful work in keeping these young jobless through the depression.

At the close of his address Captain Knox-Little said he had great pleasure in presenting the Prince Rupert Group with one of the ship's flags which was in the Toc H colors, black and gold, as a token of that comradeship upon which Toc H was founded. This was greeted with enthusiastic applause. The Captain also mentioned that, on their return trip south, the ship would call at Alert Bay and he would meet there Rev. O. T. Hodgson, Commander of the Royal Navy, who is honorary padre of Prince Rupert Group Toc H.

During the evening John E. Davey rendered some very pleasing solos, accompanied by Mrs. J. S. Black. A hearty vote of thanks, proposed by City Commissioner W. J. Alder and seconded by J. D. Allen, was enthusiastically endorsed.

DINNER TO DELEGATES

Necessity of Co-operation and Unity Of Communities of District Is Stressed by Speakers

Improvement Seen

Progress Has Been Made During Past Year and Outlook For Future Definitely Better

The necessity of continued co-operation and unity of the various communities of the north coast and central interior in facing the problems of the district and working for the development and future prosperity of this section of the province was stressed by speakers at the dinner tendered in the Commodore Cafe last night to delegates to the annual convention of the Associated Boards of Trade of British Columbia. The dinner was the first event in connection with the holding of the convention, business sessions of which opened this morning in the city council chamber. Speakers also referred to the valuable role the Associated Boards could play in striving for the advancement of the northern and central areas of the province provided it worked in a common cause with the interests of the district as a whole, rather than for particular parts of it, at heart.

The dinner was presided over by C. V. Evitt, vice-president of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, in the absence of the president, John Dybhavn. Speakers included City Commissioner W. J. Alder, L. B. Warner, Olof Hanson M.P., E. T. Kenney M.L.A. and Harry Bowman. There were about fifty present.

In opening the proceedings, Mr. Evitt welcomed the delegates and bespoke success and results for the convention proceedings.

Commissioner Alder extended a civic welcome to the delegates. He urged unity on the part of the various communities in working for general advancement of the district which he claimed was as potential from the standpoint of natural resources as any in British Columbia. Resolutions passed at last year's convention in Smithers had been productive of good results. Progress had been made in the way of placing interior products on the Prince Rupert market but there was much more that might be accomplished along this line.

Mr. Warner, who is president of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia, told of the industrial revival that had set in in this district since last year. All the industries, mining, lumbering, fishing and agriculture, were feel-

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Two Boats on Trip to Warke Canal; Seattle Sailing Schooner Enroute North; Danae Officers at Khtada

The power cruiser Neiris, with Dr. R. G. Large on board, and the Prince Rupert Fisheries' Experimental Station's service boat Irish Belle, with members of the scientific staff of the station, made a trip to the head of Warke Canal at the week-end, leaving Saturday night and returning Sunday night. The biological men carried out certain checking up in the Warke Canal area and the party had a few hours angling at Leverson Lake.

The Boeing flying boat of the Canadian Airways, which is stationed at Swanson Bay engaged in fisheries patrol service, left early Sunday afternoon on its return to the base down the coast after having spent a couple of days here in connection with illegal salmon fishing prosecutions as a result of which William Rudland and Nathan Shaw were each convicted and fined for fishing within the fishing boundaries, the former at Kumeleon Inlet and the latter at Turtle Point, Gill Island. Pilot W. R. Mc-

Cluskey is in charge of the aircraft on which G. E. Moore, fisheries inspector, returned to his post down the coast.

The fifty-six foot sailing schooner Valkyrie of Seattle, on its way north to Southwestern Alaska with a party of four young Seattle men—David Dale, Dwyer Dale, Don Dedrick and William Blackford—on board, left today in continuation of its voyage after having been in port since last Friday evening, moored at the floats of the Prince Rupert Rowing & Yacht Club. The four sailors planned on leaving Seattle July 28 to go as far north as Kodiak Island for some big game hunting but now do not expect to get much further than Baranoff Island. They will put in at Ketchikan and Juneau enroute. The Valkyrie is a sturdy sailing vessel adapted more to ocean waters than to the inside passage. She has had a rather colorful career and was at one time a rum-runner on the California coast. She has made voyages as far afield as Hawaii and South America. She has an 8 h.p. Atlas gas engine as an auxiliary.

With another heavy list of Alaska tourist passengers on board, C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil McLean, was in port yesterday southbound from Skagway to Vancouver. The vessel arrived at 9:30 a.m. from the north and sailed for the south at 4:30. There were 216 passengers in all on board of whom 182 were round trippers. Nineteen persons disembarked from the vessel here.

Dr. L. W. Kergin is due back this afternoon from a week-end angling trip to Lake Khtada with his power cruiser Aledor. Dr. Kergin left for the popular trout fishing resort on Saturday afternoon, having as his guests some of the officers from H. M. S. Danae, the visiting British light cruiser.

Piloted by L. Barr, a Vancouver seaplane arrived here from the south at 12:45 noon yesterday and was in port overnight, leaving today in continuation of a flight to Ketchikan.

Gold Now Being Turned Out From Vital Creek Mine

Royal Shepard, Juneau mining man, who is operating a Vital Creek placer property on lease from a syndicate of local owners, arrived in the city on the Prince Rupert yesterday from the Alaska Capital and proceeded by train last evening to Vanderhoof enroute to Vital Creek via Fort St. James. Although there are still twelve men working on the property which is now producing pay, operations have been somewhat curtailed following a recent accident in the workings when a cave-in caused the death of two miners. Charles Graham, inspector of mines, is now on his way to the property and, following his visit, the mining program will get fully under way again.

Robert Tobey, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Tobey, sailed yesterday afternoon on the Prince Rupert for a trip to Vancouver.
