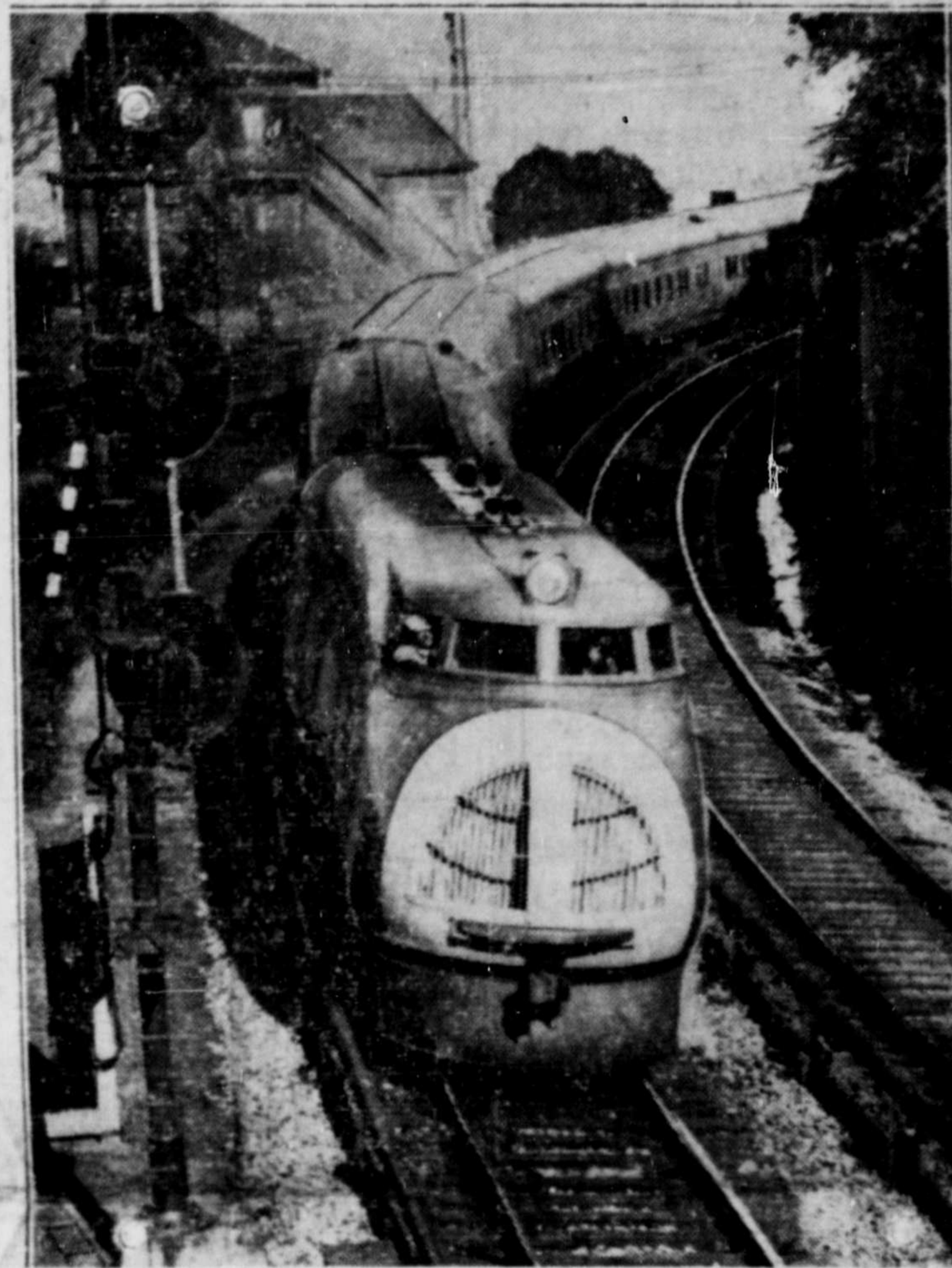
INTEREST RATE CUT

PARIS, Nov. 14: (CP)—The new ministry of Premier Pierre Flandin met the Chamber of Deputies for the first time yesterday and received a decisive vote of confidence. The division was 523 to 118 in approval of Flandin's policies. Former Premier Gaston Doumergue, in a statement, yesterday, warned his successor not to show the least sign of weakness or there would be a union of Germany and Austria before they knew it. "Germany covets Austria and, after Austria, Europe," declared Doumergue.

OPINIONS DIVIDED

Opinions will be much divided on the question of legalizing gambling by authorizing the sale of sweepstake tickets as it being proposed in Great Britain just now. There may be some justification for the plea that tickets are being sold anyway and that, as at present conducted, they benefit some other country, whereas, if legalized, they could be conducted for the benefit of institutions within the country and the money kept at home.

The other viewpoint is that gambling is injurious and should not be allowed. To legalize it would be for the state to ally itself with the forces that make for deterioration.

And yet gambling is a vice that most people enjoy. People like to take a chance on horse races, on the stock exchange or on real estate. In business it is pointed out that most buying is a gamble. The merchant is betting his judgment and experience as to what the people will buy. Many a business has been wrecked because the merchant bought too heavily of something that he thought the public would take but which proved a drug on the market. Possibly the greatest gamble is the game of politics in which a candidate for public honors gives his time and thousands of dollars of his money on the chance of winning an election. Often the odds are against him but he is willing to stake everything on the chance of winning.

Should Great Britain pass the measure now before it and make it legal to operate sweepstakes, it is quite probable the Dominion Parliament will be asked to consider a similar proposal. The matter has already been discussed very widely. Some of the churches allow gambling at their social affairs. Public welfare organizations do the same. It is only one more step to national lotteries or hospital sweepstakes. It is probable that the question will have to be decided soon.

THE CENOTAPH SERVICE

The Canadian Legion and other organizations co-operating with it are to be congratulated on the manner in which the Cenotaph service was carried out on Sunday afternoon and the large attendance under such extremely unfavorable weather conditions. In this connection the name of Major C. V. Evitt should be especially mentioned as being the man who attended to much of the detail. His faithful attention to the military organization was one of the important factors which made for its success.

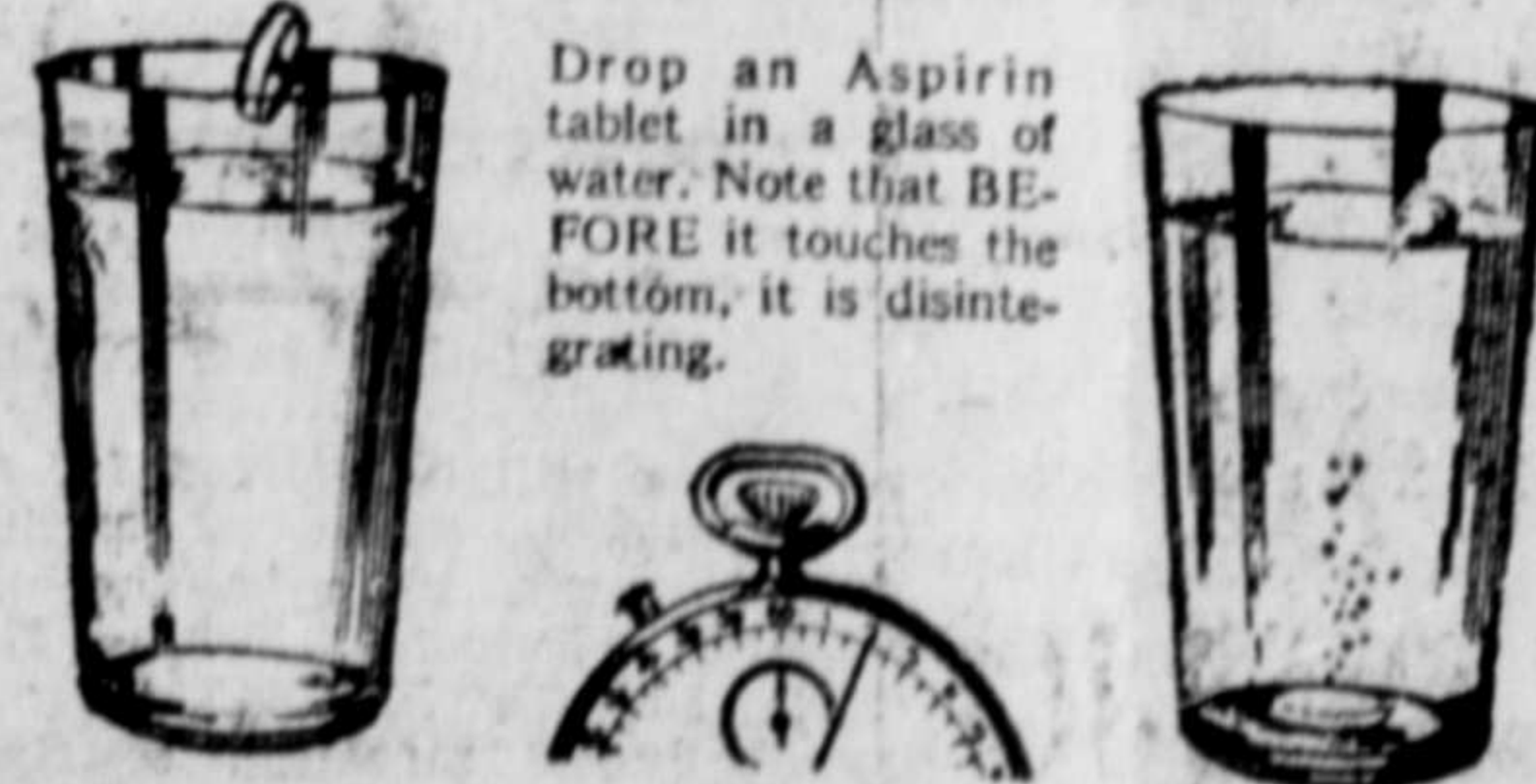
