

HUGE PACIFIC OCEAN STORM RAGES

EUROPE AIR TENSE FOLLOWING DOUBLE ASSASSINATION

Slaying of Alexander And Barthou Cause of Widespread Sensation

No Serious Political Repercussions up to Last Night—Eleven Year Old Prince Peter Proclaimed King—Killer of Monarch and Minister Himself Dead

DEATH LIST TOTALS FIVE

MARSEILLES, France, Oct. 10: (CP)—The death toll from the assassination of King Alexander reached five today when Madame Dubrec, widowed spectator, died as a result of wounds from flying bullets, fifteen, in all, having been wounded. The condition of General Alfonse Georges of the French Superior War Council, is good and he is expected to recover.

PARIS, Oct. 10: (CP)—There were no political repercussions of consequence in Europe up to last night following the double assassination in Marseilles yesterday of King Alexander of Jugo-Slavia and Foreign Minister Louis Barthou, the most sensational incident of its kind since the slaying at Sarajevo, Serbia, in 1914 of Archduke Francis Ferdinand of Austria, the spark which kindled the Great War.

Some political observers do not believe the circumstances of yesterday's unfortunate incident to have been of such a nature to lead to serious international complications although civil strife may ensue in Jugo-Slavia. It is pointed out that, after all, the dead king, the object of many previous assassination attempts in his own country, was the victim of his own countryman. Barthou's slaying was, undoubtedly, not the prime intention of the assassin, a young Jugo-Slav terrorist, but was incidental to the planned killing of the king.

What effect the slaying of Barthou would have on international relations in Europe appeared to be uncertain last night. Barthou, 72 years old and a prominent French statesman, became foreign minister after the Stavisky scandal. He had been a zealous worker for goodwill between France and the nations of the Little Entente, had been instrumental in improving relations between Italy and Jugo-Slavia and is credited with having had a good deal to do with the recent acceptance of Soviet Russia into the League of Nations.

The French government yesterday officially declared one month of national mourning.

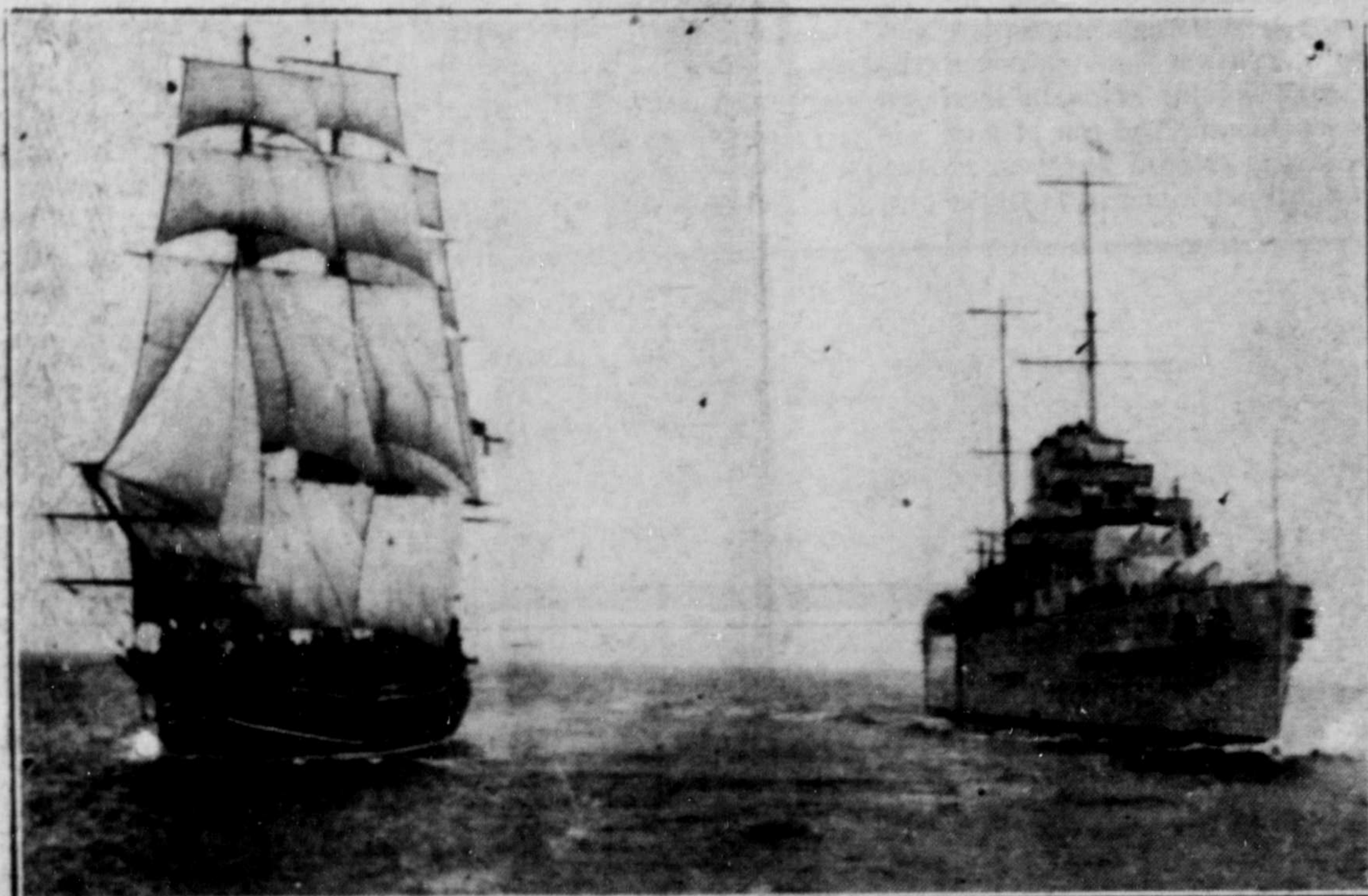
Assassin Is Dead

MARSEILLES, France, Oct. 10:—The assassin of King Alexander of Jugo-Slavia and Foreign Minister Barthou of France, two hours after the murderous attack, was dead himself as a result of wounds inflicted by mounted guards and police after he had worked his way through bodyguards to mount to the running board of the car in which King Alexander and Barthou were riding past the Stock Exchange in a procession and pump bullets point blank into the body of the king and the arm and leg of Barthou.

King Alexander was shot through the liver, left shoulder and left lung. Loss of blood from the arm and leg injuries was the cause of death of Barthou who expired two hours after being shot. The murderer was Petroff Kallinin, a 35-year old Jugo-Slav terrorist, who entered France on September 28, apparently intent upon assassination of the king even at that time. He was a merchant from Zagreb.

After he had fired upon King Alexander, Kallinin was felled to the ground. (Continued on page five.)

REBELLION PUT DOWN

Latest Casualty List Shows 500 Dead in Spain—Former Premier Arrested

MADRID, Spain, Oct. 10: (CP)—The rebellion in Spain, which during its duration of six days resulted in 500 being killed and thousands wounded and arrested, was reported last night to be still weakening despite the declaration of extremists of their intention to continue the revolt. Fighting during the day was of a desultory nature.

Former Premier Manuel Agano was reported to have been placed under arrest as one of those responsible for inciting the outbreak.

PASSING OF MRS. BRAND

Well Known Resident of Prince Rupert in Early Days Died in Vancouver

Mrs. Annie Agnes Brand, wife of E. Carlyle Brand, formerly well known as an engineer on Grand Trunk Pacific Coast Steamships and also at one time in the service of the Imperial Oil Co. Ltd. here, passed away last Saturday at St. Paul's Hospital in Vancouver. The late Mrs. Brand made her home for a number of years in Prince Rupert in the early days. She was 65 years of age. In addition to her husband, she is survived by a son, A. Carlyle Brand, former accountant for the Royal Bank of Canada here and now in the brokerage business in Victoria, and a daughter, Mrs. C. W. Wearmouth of Vancouver. Capt. A. E. Slocomb of Victoria is a brother.

The funeral took place yesterday morning in Vancouver from T. Edwards Co. Chapel to Mountain View Cemetery with Rev. W. J. Minto Swan of St. Mark's Anglican Church officiating.

Little Change In Stock Prices On New York Market

NEW YORK, Oct. 10:—There was little change in price range in yesterday's trading on the New York Stock Exchange when 770,000 shares changed hands. The industrial average at closing was 91.71, off .79; rails, 35.01, off .5; utilities, 19.61, off .35, and bonds, 92.68, off .01.

ROAD WORK NEXT WEEK

Between Fifty and Sixty Men to Go To Work on Continuation of Skeena River Highway

Work of actual grading of the continuation of the Skeena River from the present end of the road towards Cloyah Bay, a distance of about a mile and a half, is expected to start at the first of next week, giving employment to from fifty to sixty men.

Construction of a new camp at the present end of the road is now in progress. It is likely the old camp at Cloyah Bay will be abandoned as it has fallen almost completely into disrepair.

The public works department, at the instance of Premier T. D. Pattullo, has specified that Bulkley Valley beef shall be supplied in meat orders for the camp.

San Francisco Region Bombarded by Seas of Very Big Proportions

Caisson in Construction of Golden Gate Bridge Has to Be Abandoned—Centre of Tempest 1500 Miles Northwest of Golden Gate

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10: (CP)—A great storm centering 1500 miles at sea caused huge waves to bombard San Francisco Peninsula today, continuing a lashing that began Tuesday. No great property damage has been caused but engineers had to abandon a caisson being used in the construction of the Golden Gate Bridge. Weather Forecaster Reed said that the storm was northwest of San Francisco and that it was one of the biggest and deepest ever charted locally.

RELIEF GRANTS

British Columbia to Get \$200,000 Per Month From Ottawa

OTTAWA, Oct. 10: (CP)—Monthly grants for relief costs of \$145,000 to Manitoba, \$200,000 to Saskatchewan, \$100,000 to Alberta and \$200,000 to British Columbia will be announced in the new relief agreements by the Dominion with the provinces, it is learned here. The agreements will terminate March 31.

HAUPTMANN EXTRADITED

No Delay Expected in Delivery of Alleged Lindbergh Baby Killer To New Jersey

TRENTON, N.J., Oct. 10: (CP)—Bruno Richard Hauptmann is expected to be delivered to New Jersey state authorities either today or tomorrow to face trial on the charge of murder in connection with the kidnapping of Charles Augustus Lindbergh jr.

Following Hauptmann's indictment by a grand jury on the charge of murder, Governor A. Harry Moore of New Jersey yesterday signed the application for Hauptmann's extradition from New York. It was not long before it was announced that Governor Leaman of New York would sign the papers providing for Hauptmann to be delivered over without delay.

Governor Moore announced that a new witness had been found who would testify that Hauptmann had been seen near the Lindbergh home at Hopewell on March 1, 1932, the day of the kidnapping.

TO RETURN TO ONTARIO

Harold Vermilyea Waives Extradition to Belleville For Trial on Charge of Killing Mother

ONTARIO, Cal., Oct. 10:—Harold Vermilyea, taken into custody here on Saturday in connection with the "hatchet murder" of his mother at Belleville, Ont., last week, has agreed to waive extradition proceedings and return to Belleville for questioning. He protested his innocence and expressed confidence that he would be treated fairly by the Ontario authorities.

Belleville authorities believe that Vermilyea slew his mother and then fled into the United States via Toronto and Detroit, rushing here by airplane.

BENNETT IS RETURNING

Canadian Premier to Sail From England For Home This Friday

LONDON, Oct. 10: (CP)—Premier R. B. Bennett of Canada, after spending nearly two months in Europe attending sessions of the League of Nations, negotiating trade agreements with France and visiting in England, will sail on Friday for home.

President Now Preparing For Congress Meet

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 10:—Returning from a week-end fishing trip up the Potomac River, President Franklin D. Roosevelt has now set himself upon the task of preparing legislation for the forthcoming session of Congress which promises to be one of the most momentous in the history of the country.

SHIP FIRE IS PUT OUT

No Serious Consequences as Result of Blaze Aboard German Liner Konigstein

NEW YORK, Oct. 10: (CP)—Fire which blazed in the hold of the liner Konigstein for several hours while the ship was 150 miles east of the Nova Scotia coast enroute to New York from Europe with passengers and cargo was extinguished, the captain radioed. There was no loss of life or injury.

## NEWS OF THE MINES

### Mining Continues Satisfactorily at Dunwell—Glacier Creek Takes Adjoining Property—Consolidated Expected to Continue Stewart Railway

Mining of high grade ore and mill feed from No. 3 level of the Dunwell mine at Stewart is continuing satisfactorily under the superintendence of Harry Thomey. In addition to maintaining a constant supply of mill feed, high grade ore is being shipped direct to Tacoma smelter. The tramway having been completed, contractors on the George E.

claim of Dunwell operations are now ready to maintain steady shipments. They have to deliver 1000 tons of ore to the Dunwell mill within ninety days. The laying of an air line to the Ben All workings of Dunwell will soon be completed and, when this operation gets under way, steady shipments of high grade ore will go forward directly to the smelter. The Dunwell is an entirely different proposition now to what it was three years ago. The output is being gradually increased every month. The run of mine ore which is shipped direct to smelter returns net values of just over \$100

per ton and the tonnage and grade of ore passing through the mill is being stepped up.

Surface stripping of the Mastodon property on Hastings Arm, Observatory Inlet, is reported to have followed the ore for 1000 feet. The width of the ore is from twelve to fourteen feet and it has been uncovered for a width of six feet. Samples from various points have given returns of from \$4 to \$13 per ton in gold and silver valuing gold at \$30 per ounce. There are also lead and zinc values. It is planned

to employ three or four men throughout the water on the property. Discoveries of the first large showings on this property caused somewhat of a sensation in the district earlier in the summer.

Glacier Creek Mining Co. has acquired the Wolverine and O. K. claims adjoining the company's Portland Canal property on the south side and at a lower altitude. It is announced. Glacier Creek tunnel has been equipped with a track and air line and work of mining commenced about a month ago. To date the tunnel has been advanced thirty feet, leaving approximately 140 feet to go to encounter the vein which has been proven by diamond drilling to exist. Core of the diamond drill assayed \$20 to \$25 per ton values. The vein is expected to be reached in about four weeks' time. Air supply for drilling on the Glacier property has been obtained from the Dunwell compressor.

Many prospectors have been engaged in placer mining on Lorne Creek this summer and most of them have obtained gold. One old timer on the creek took \$40 out of one pocket. This year the water has been lower than for many years

and the prospectors have been able to clean out a number of pockets which were formerly inaccessible.

Stewart camp is hopeful that the modest start which is being made this year by the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. in resuming extension of the Canadian Northern Railway will be followed up with annual work looking to the eventual completion of the line to Fort Graham. Consolidated has large mining interests along the route of this railway and there is reason to believe that the company may proceed with the actual construction work possibly faster than some people may anticipate.

Jack MacConnachie, commercial flyer of Anyox, has been recently making flights from Stewart into the Unuk River mining area with prospectors. There has been more activity in the Unuk this season than at any time previously.

John Nelson, pioneer rancher of Aiyansh on the Naas River, arrived in the city on the Catala yesterday from the north. He will proceed from here for a six months' visit with relatives in Texas.

## FASCISM IN CANADA

Two rather interesting articles, "Canada's Fascist Rabble" and "Fascists in Manitoba" appear in the September number of "The Canadian Unionist." These articles analyze the fascist movement showing that in Quebec the French-Canadian Fascists are rabidly anti-Jewish and also anti-English. In Ontario the English speaking Fascists are anti-Jewish and also anti-French and anti-Catholic.

According to Colin McKay, one of the writers, Fascism has to have a scapegoat and Canada has so many races and religions that this is difficult and he says that the Socialists and Communists are as yet too insignificant to serve as proper scapegoats. The only accord of the Fascists in Canada at present is in their hatred and contempt of democracy in all its forms. He quotes from "Le Patriote" organ of French-Canadian Fascism as follows:

"With the development of liberalism or democracy, the national races have ceased to be the masters in their own land. . . . The English, the Jews, and the Americans with their departmental and chain stores have ruined our small French-Canadian merchants. . . . The Jews are lords and kings of the clothing industry; they have made feminine underwear light, soft and seductive, the better to pervert Christians."

Discussing the rise of Fascism, Bernard Webber speaks of it as "a youth movement which left social revolution and a dictatorship in its wake." In Manitoba it called itself "The Canadian Nationalist Party" and claimed to have enrolled a couple of thousand adults and a thousand youths. Then came a split and early this year The Fascist Party of Canada was formed and affiliated with Sir Oswald Mosley's Empire-wide Union of Fascists. It is not anti-Jewish but professes to be democratic and concentrates on advocating establishment of the corporative state. Its advocates declare that they would suppress all opposition. They have profited by Mussolini's mistakes in allowing the anti-Fascists to pursue their propaganda until so late as 1925. It would declare a moratorium on all Canada's external debts until they could be paid out of national profits.

The writer of the article says that politically Fascism is retrogressive. It repudiates all democratic institutions, established only through centuries of strife and re-establishes a mediaeval dictatorship which the recent German "second revolution" exemplifies as having the power of life and death over the state's citizens.

According to the same authority the membership of the Canadian Nationalist is predominantly German, that of the Canadian Fascist Party is British, that of the Black Shirt organization on Montreal is Italian and that of the Toronto organizations Irish. In other words each Fascist organization caters to one race in particular in accordance with the type of European Fascism which is taken as a model.

## SLAYING OF ALEXANDER AND BARTHOLOMAY CAUSE OF WIDESPREAD SENSATION

(Continued from Page 1)

street by the sabre of a lieutenant but he continued to shoot. He was then fired upon by the police who prevented the crowds, infuriated, from killing him outright on the spot. Kallinin died later in a news-stand to which he had been carried. He was found to be armed with two pistols as well as carrying a powerful bomb.

The assassination of Alexander came in spite of elaborate precautions which had been made for his protection. The king had just landed from a Jugo-Slav warship and was on his way to Paris to pay a state visit, at France's invitation, and to discuss political questions which it was believed would lead to a solidification of peace in the long troubled Balkan states. A mighty demonstration of friendship had been arranged by France. Marseilles was en fete and King Alexander was about to receive a formal welcome to France.

The bodies of King Alexander and Foreign Minister Barthou lay in state in Marseilles Hospital last night, thousands already gathering to pay their respects to the dead.

Queen Marie, consort of Alexander, was on her way here by special train from Strasbourg where she was informed of her husband's death. Owing to ill health, she had been travelling to France by train with the intention of joining King Alexander in Paris.

Queen Marie arrived here this morning and fainted after throwing herself upon the body of the king.

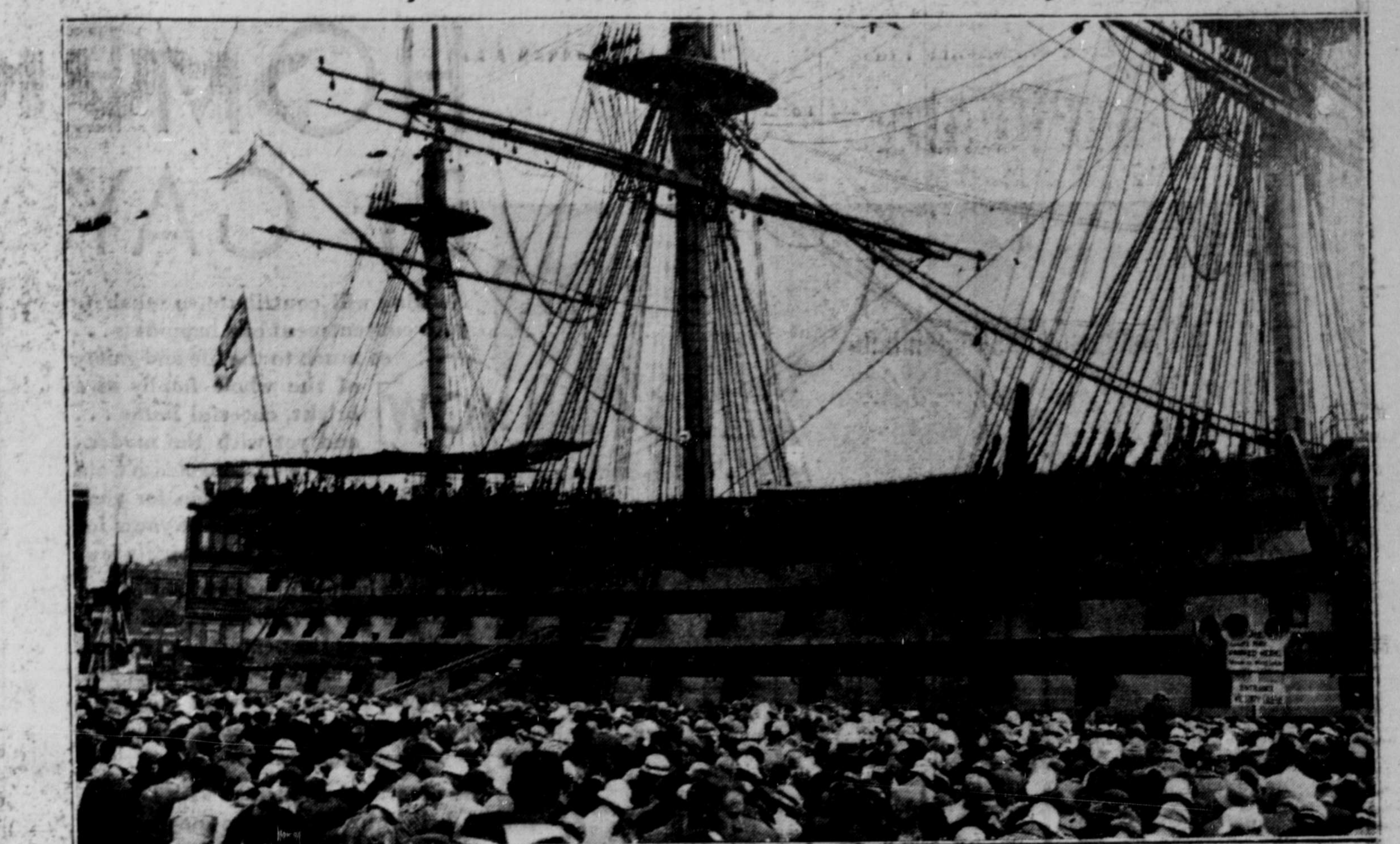
With the pomp of grief and majesty of death, the king's body was started back to his homeland today aboard a Jugo-Slavian destroyer exactly twenty-four hours after he had arrived in France on his good-will visit.

**Boy Proclaimed King**  
**BELGRADE, Oct. 10**—Eleven-year old Prince Peter was proclaimed King of Jugo-Slavia in an emergency session of Parliament last night. Until he attains his majority, Jugo-Slavia will be ruled by a regency to be elected by Parliament, the present prospect being that this may take the form of a military dictatorship. King-Designate Peter was in England attending the famous Eton College for boys. He had not been informed up to last night of his father's death but was told today and immediately left London for Belgrade.

The government last night officially denied reports emanating in foreign countries of widespread rioting and disorders in various parts of this country.

Forty-six years of age and the second son of the late King Peter of Serbia whom he succeeded as Prince Regent in 1918, King Alexander had personally led the Serbian armies in the Great War and had always been a strong ruler, in fact, a virtual dictator.

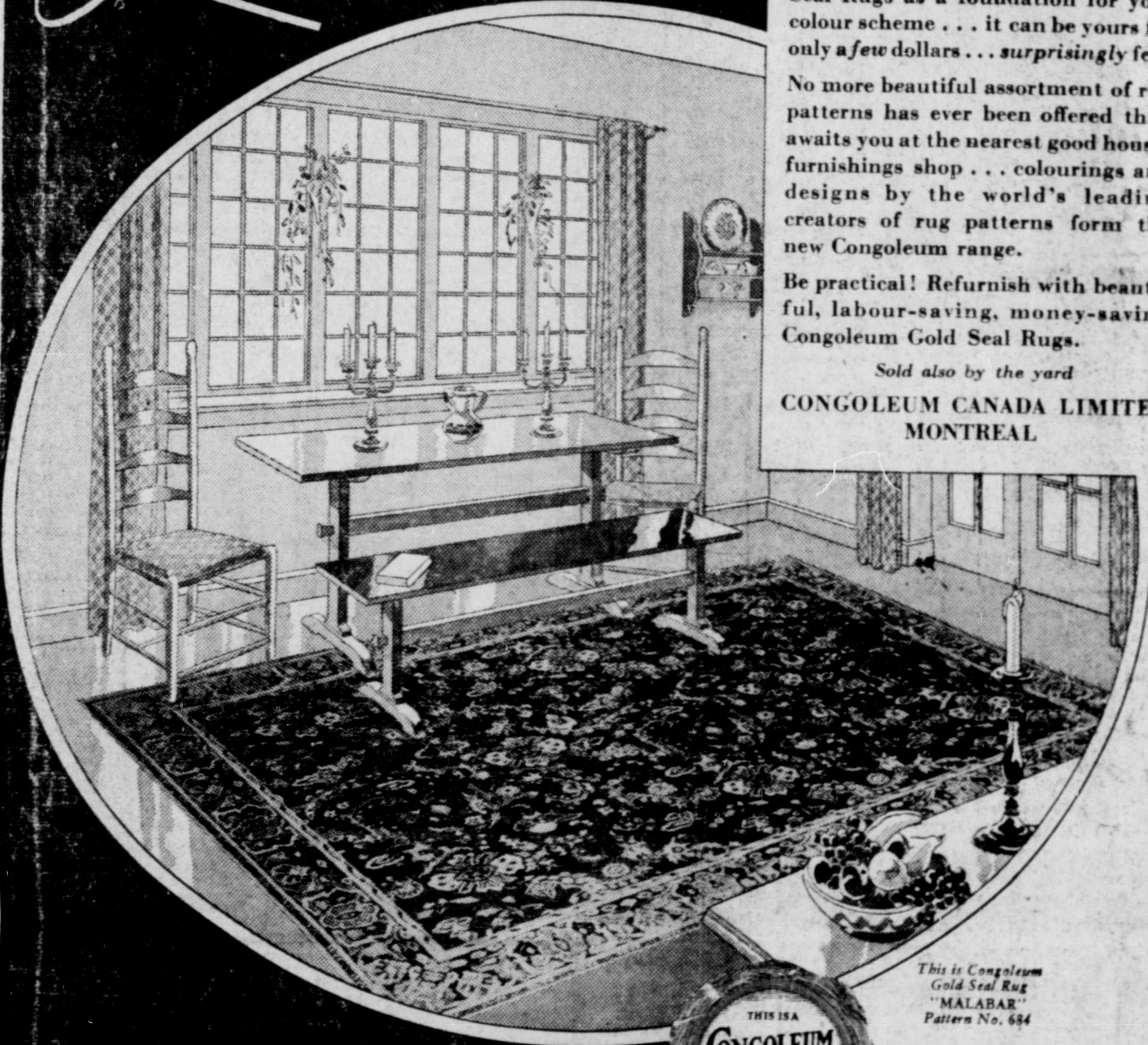

Efforts to secure the forecasting of weather conditions through the meteorological service and its broadcast by the Canadian Radio Commission for the benefit of fishermen.

Correspondence with a view to having Prince Rupert registered as an airport.

Campaign for books for the library in connection with a drive by the Library Patron's Committee in which more tickets were sold than by any other organization in town.

Work to interest tourists in Prince Rupert. During the year 200 circulars were placed on each boat leaving Vancouver giving facts about Prince Rupert.

Co-operation with the fair board in reviving the fair and preventing it dying a natural death.

The report mentions that what had been done was as nothing to what the Junior Chamber expected to do. The organization is now complete and recently fifteen new members were added. It has been formed to assist rather than to replace the older organization. Young men are coming to the fore more and more. He asks for support in the chamber's endeavors.
