Two Officers of Royal Navy Are Among Those Captured From Vessel

SHANGHAI, June 18: (CP)—Six British subjects, including two officers of the Royal Navy, were kidnapped together with twenty Chinese by pirates from the steamer Shuntien this afternoon off the mouth of the Yellow River.

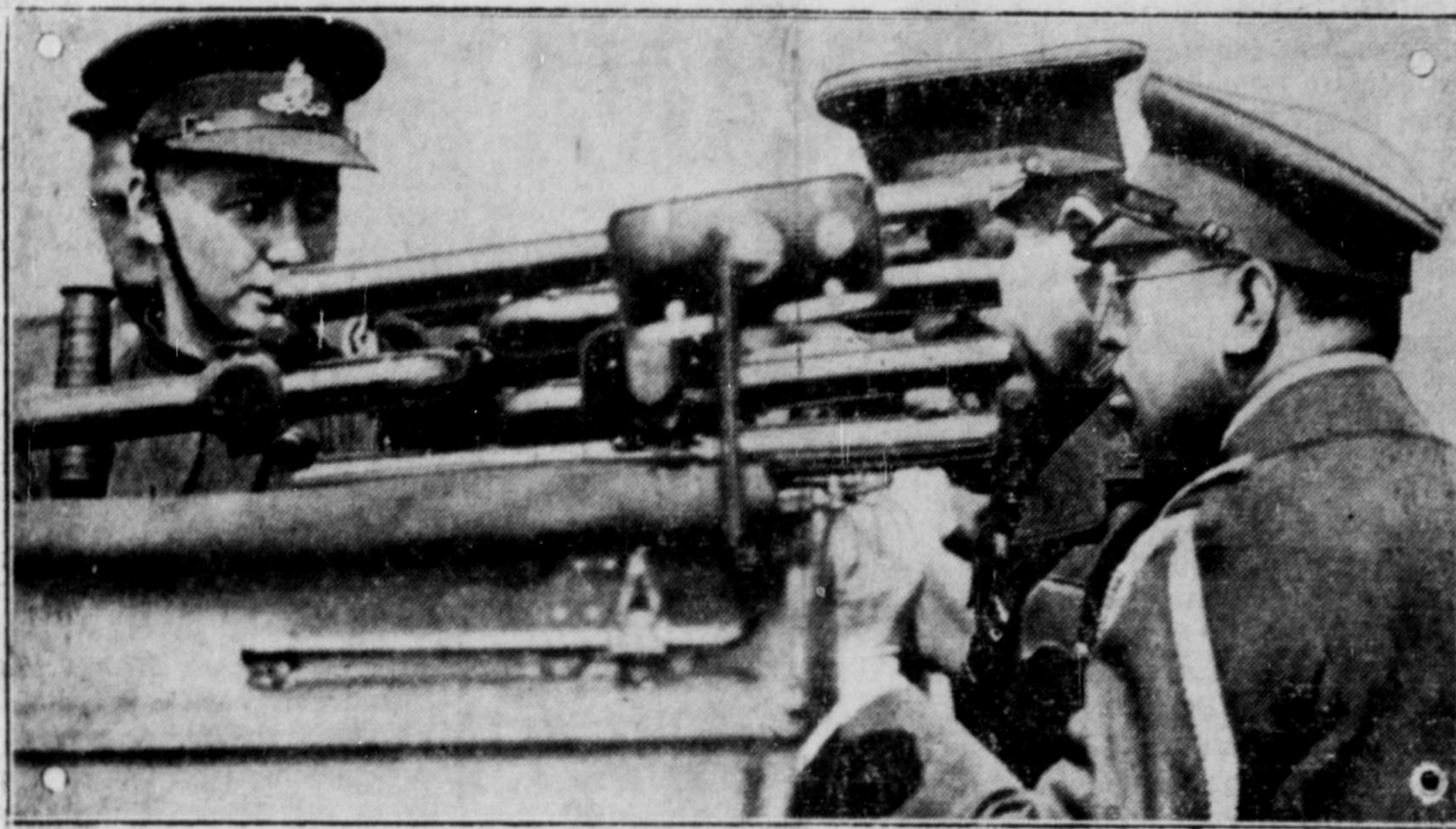
Ten Million For Relief Of Indian Tribes in States

Took Big Plane To Interior Of Alaska Recently

In a short time he will be flying north again with a second plane to be used in the same service.

TAKE LOGS ON ECSTALL

Morgan Company to Take Out Stand of Timber From Falls River—Superintendent Makes Inspection

After having spent a couple of days at Falls River inspecting a stand of timber in which it is planned to commence logging operations at an early date, Elmer Palmer, logging superintendent for the J. R. Morgan Logging Co., returned this morning aboard the company's service boat Mary Roberta, Capt. Charles Edwards, to Crescent Inlet, Queen Charlotte Islands.

There is understood to be about fifteen million feet of timber in the Falls River stand which was formerly owned by the National Airplane Lumber Co. and which was acquired by the Morgan company some time ago. The logs will be disposed of to coast pulp and paper mills.

DECORATION DAY HERE

I. O. E. Members and Returned Men Honor Memory of War Dead

The annual Decoration Day service which is conducted by the Queen Mary Chapter, Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, was held at Fairview Cemetery yesterday afternoon.

In spite of inclement weather, there was a large turnout of Daughters of the Empire members, also members of the Canadian Legion and Women's Auxiliary.

The parade congregated at the cenotaph where flowers were placed by Mrs. D. C. Stuart, Municipal Regent of the I. O. E., after which all proceeded in cars to Fairview Cemetery where the main service was held. Mrs. J. E. Boddie, Regent of Queen Mary Chapter, conducted the service. After two minutes' silence, Lt. Col. S. D. Johnston gave an appropriate address.

During the service a spray of flowers and a small Union Jack were placed on each returned soldier's grave by members of the Queen Mary Chapter and a poppy was placed on each grave by members of the Canadian Legion.

LABORITES IN SESSION

Meeting of Trades and Labor Council Discusses Various Matters

Various matters of interest and importance to labor were taken up at the week-end meeting of the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council.

A communication from the Trades and Labor Council of Calgary called attention to the fact of a milling company employing non-union carpenters in the construction of grain storage tanks in the Alberta city. It was asked that support be given the protest against making use of non-union carpenters. The letter was received and such action as may be deemed advisable will be taken so far as the commodity made by the mill in question is concerned.

A report was adopted dealing with the opening of the Canadian Legion building here and the secretary was instructed to write this organization, extending hearty congratulations on the faith and enterprise shown in erecting such a splendid structure, especially during times like the present, and under fair labor conditions.

Relief Question

Some time was devoted to a discussion of the practice of using relief labor to the disadvantage of skilled trades and thereby denying union men taxpayers the privilege of an earning power whereby they might meet their obligations as taxpayers and property owners of the city. In view of this situation, a committee consisting of Thomas Black, T. Elliott and W. M. Brown will prepare a questionnaire for submission to Premier T. D. Pattullo, who will be in Prince Rupert early in July.

On certain contemplated improvements on the new library building there has been a suggestion that relief labor be used but strong objection is being taken to this and it is hoped the library board will have this work done under fair conditions.

It was reported that an attempt was being made to extend the hours of retail stores in this city and, in view of the fact that it is contrary to the provincial labor department's policy of shortening the hours of work, a protest will be sent to Hon. Mr. Pearson, minister of labor.

Lakes District Woman Succumbs To Heart Attack

Divisional headquarters of the provincial police here have been advised of the death as a result of a heart attack on Monday of last week of Mrs. Mary Jane Bell Connor of Tchesinkut Lake. While engaged in milking cows on her farm, Mrs. Connor collapsed, expiring almost immediately. She was a widow, 73 years of age and is survived by two sons. Death was due to natural causes, it was established to the satisfaction of the coroner.

KILLED BY EXPLOSION

Disastrous Fire in Gasoline Tanks At Jamestown, New York

JAMESTOWN, N.Y., June 18:—Between twelve and twenty persons are reported to have been killed and from forty to fifty injured here this afternoon when three 20,000-gallon gasoline tanks exploded while a crowd of several hundred persons was watching the firemen battle with a blaze believed to have been caused by an electric spark.

FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY

The Victoria Daily Times recently celebrated its fiftieth anniversary by publishing a supplement to its regular edition telling of the founding of the paper, its growth and influence and by illustration indicating the growth and development of Victoria.

Very soon after the paper was founded it was taken over by the late William Templeman. Among members of his staff was a young man named B. C. Nicholas, who became Mr. Templeman's secretary while he was a member of the federal cabinet at Ottawa. This man is now in control of the editorial department of the paper and is following out the high ideals which have always actuated the editorial staff. He has grown up with the paper and has made it a power in British Columbia.

While the Times has been an exponent of Liberalism, it has not always seen eye to eye with the leaders of the Liberal party. This was recently exemplified when the paper came out strongly in opposition to the special powers granted to the Pattullo government at Victoria. It did not hesitate to oppose the party when it considered the cause of Liberalism was at stake.

The illustrations in the anniversary number show the city of Victoria to be developing as a business centre and also aesthetically. The Times has developed with the city and is today a first class newspaper published at a point where beauty and commercialism go hand in hand and where tourists come from all parts of the world to see how it is done.

STRATFORD HAS LOSS

Senator Rankin Was Outstanding Citizen—Firm Believer in Liberalism

STRATFORD, Ont., June 18. (CP)—For many years Sen. (Dr.) James Palmer Rankin, who died here at the end of the week, was a familiar figure in the life of this community, serving the people both in his professional capacity as a physician and in public life. Dr. Rankin was born in East Zorra township of Oxford County in 1855, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. David Rankin. His father was a well known and prosperous farmer of the district, who originally came from Scotland. Dr. Rankin went to the rural school and later to a boys' school in Hamilton, after which he entered Trinity Medical College, Toronto. Dr. Rankin was graduated from Trinity College in 1878 with high honors and the degree of M. B., and went to Edinburgh University from which he was graduated in 1879 with the degree of L. R. C. P. and S.

Returning to Canada he started to practise medicine at Tavistock, going from there to Toronto, and later coming in 1891 to Stratford, where he became a foremost member of the medical profession.

Dr. Rankin had two daughters living, Miss Gertrude and Miss Ethelwyn, both residing at the family residence here. His wife died in 1915. A son, Dr. Ramsay Rankin, died in 1921.

During his residence in Stratford, Dr. Rankin was diverse in his activities, not confining himself entirely to his own profession but branching out into the field of politics where he received a generous share of success. He was elected a Liberal member of the Dominion Parliament in 1908, was defeated in 1911 and in 1917, but was elected again in 1921. He remained the representative of North Perth until he was appointed a senator in 1925. During his career in Dominion politics Dr. Rankin was a firm upholder of the Liberal standard. In city affairs, he was also prominent, having been a member of the board of education and the city council.

Dr. Rankin was also a Lieutenant Colonel of the Canadian Army Medical Corps. During his career in Stratford, Dr. Rankin had more of the confidence and respect of his fellow-citizens than perhaps any other man. During his occupancy of civic and Dominion offices he proved a faithful servant of the people.

From the Waterfront

Making her final appearance here of the season, C. P. R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, after having been in the Skagway service steadily since last fall, arrived in port at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon from Skagway and other northern points and sailed an hour later for Vancouver. The Princess Norah, which was making the company's first run of the summer tourist season to Skagway, will now go off the northern route and will be transferred for the summer to the West Coast of Vancouver Island run. The vessel had 120 passengers aboard on arriving here, three disembarking at this port and seven going aboard for the south.

Having had heavy freights to discharge at cannery points along the coast, Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, arrived in port at 10 o'clock last night, several hours late, from the south and sailed at midnight for Anyox. Stewart, the Naas River and other northern points whence she will return here tomorrow southbound. The vessel brought north a fair-sized list of passengers.

Presenting a considerably altered appearance since her last visit here as a result of extensive remodelling work which has been carried out during the past spring at Victoria, C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. Thomas Cliff, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Vancouver on her first trip of the season in the Alaska tourist service and sailed a couple of hours later for Skagway and other northern points whence she is scheduled to call here southbound on Saturday afternoon. The two upper decks—boat and promenade—of the vessel have been completely remodelled as far as passenger accommodation is concerned. A large block of staterooms have been enlarged and improved with the providing of many new de luxe quarters, additional baths, etc. The roof of the boat deck has also been widened to provide additional shelter from the weather. The summer service will be carried out by the Princess Louise and Princess Charlotte, calling here Monday mornings northbound and Saturday afternoons southbound. The Princess Charlotte will be here next week. The Louise today had a large number of passengers on board, the most of whom were round trip tourists. There were 179 passengers on arrival here, four disembarking at this port.

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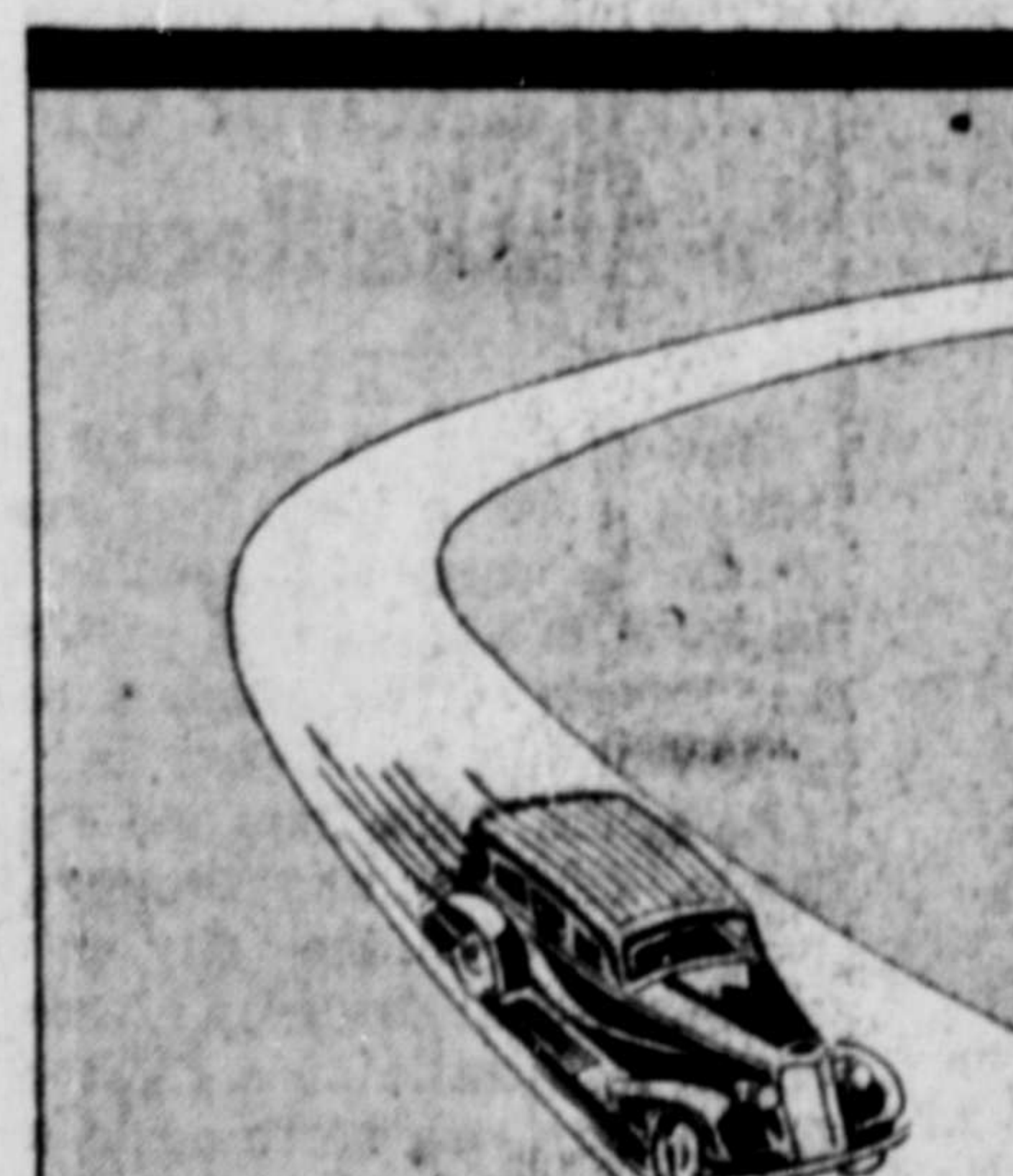
