

Wages Are Boosted by Considerable Amount Resulting from Drive

Earnings and Working Conditions in British Columbia Are Much Improved in Response to Government's Efforts, Minister of Labor Declares

VICTORIA, May 18: (CP)-Payrolls in British Columbia have been increased approximately \$200,000 per month since the provincial Department of Labor started its drive through the Board of Industrial Relations and other agencies to improve wage and working conditions within the province, Hon. George S. Pearson, minister of labor, estimated yesterday. In the sawmill industry alone, the advance has been about \$85,000 a month, he said.

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

The Letter Box

ITALIAN STANDARD OF LIVING

Editor, Daily News.

I notice in your paper of May an article written by one, V. Basso-Bert.

This individual has been wasting his time in such epigrams of reaction as the "Corporative State," which he cites as a cure for our economic ills.

Without going into too many words, but a few concrete facts. with this "mental wizard" I should like to point out that he must have visited this modern paradise known as Italy about the time of his hero's historic march to Rome.

If he has not been there since or is not acquainted with some of the facts, I will quote some them, also the references.

In January 1928 Italy had an industrial population as 4,283,209. of a fist fight with Flewin. One's common sense is only needed to understand the aforementioned figures. Then again the average industrial worker's hourly wage vas in 1928—2.15 Lire or 10.4 cents and in 1932-1.71 Lire or 91/4 cents. This is the last year the figures are available. This is a drop of 19 percent. We must take into consideration that 1 K. G. of bread (21/4 lbs.) cost 1.81 Lire or cents in 1928 and dropped 11 percent to 1.511 or 81/2 cents in 1932 Thus the Italian worker, if he worked a 60 hour week, could not make \$6. I not wish to mention the agricultural laborer as his condition is far worse. In 1932 unemployed charity relief paid the Italian worker the magnificient sum of \$1.10 or 20.91 Lire per month.

The following indices of "real wages" or standard of living were compiled by the British Ministery of Labour in 1930 (See Whitaker's Almanac 1934): Great Britain 100, Germany (pre-Nazi) 74, France 59.
