INCREASE IN B.C. PROVINCE'S PAYROLL

OUTLOOK FOR OTTAWA AID FOR THIS PROVINCE HOPEFUL

No Announcement Made On Federal Loan but Assistance Expected

Neither Mr. Pattullo or Mr. Bennett Had Anything to Say Last Night After Resuming Negotiations—B. C. Premier Leaving For Home Tonight

OTTAWA, May 18:—No official announcement was available from either party last night following the resumption of negotiations by Premier Pattullo of British Columbia, following his trip to Montreal and New York, with Premier R. B. Bennett on the requested \$8,000,000 loan for the province of British Columbia. However, there is still believed to be hope of the Pacific Coast province getting considerable assistance.

Miss May Donaldson, Well Known Here, Passes Away in Vancouver

Many friends will regret indeed to learn of the death in Vancouver of Miss May Donaldson, daughter of Mrs. James A. Brown of Port Essington and sister of Mrs. H. B. Rochester of this city, news of which was received here by wire this morning. Miss Donaldson had been in ill-health for several months and went south a few weeks ago for further treatment. She took a turn for the worse recently and her mother and younger brother, James Donaldson of Port Essington, left for Vancouver on Tuesday of this week.

Deceased was very well known and popular in this city, having attended high and commercial schools here. General sympathy will be felt for the surviving relatives including the mother and stepfather, sisters, Mrs. H. B. Rochester and Miss Ada Brown, and brothers, S. R. Donaldson and James Donaldson of Port Essington.

ACTIVITY IN MINING

Operations Planned in Cassiar Section This Season By M. J. Brown Of Burns Lake

Although loath to disclose too many details of his plans at this time, M. J. (Mickey) Brown, well known Burns Lake mining man, who was in the city this week enroute to the interior after having spent the winter in New York and Chicago, let it be known that interests which he represents contemplate extensive gold mining development this season in the Cassiar a few hundred miles north of the Canadian National Railway line. Mr. Brown, whose wife was with him, was also accompanied by J. A. McLennan and H. Edward Linden, Chicago mining engineers, as well as by his son, Vincent. The party, which arrived here by steamer from Vancouver and proceeded to the interior by train Wednesday afternoon will fly north from Burns Lake on a Pacific Airways plane, piloted by Charlie Elliott, which was due Wednesday from Vancouver, with C. M. Brown, another son of Mr. Brown's on board.

Mr. Brown, who was prominently identified with developments of two or three years ago in the McConnell Creek area, will be active this year in the Cassiar district a good deal further north. Dredges and heavy machinery are to be taken in and, to do this, considerable road construction will be necessary. The route will be from Vanderhoof into Stuart Lake and via Thutade Lake into the Cassiar.

TALKED OF HARD TIMES

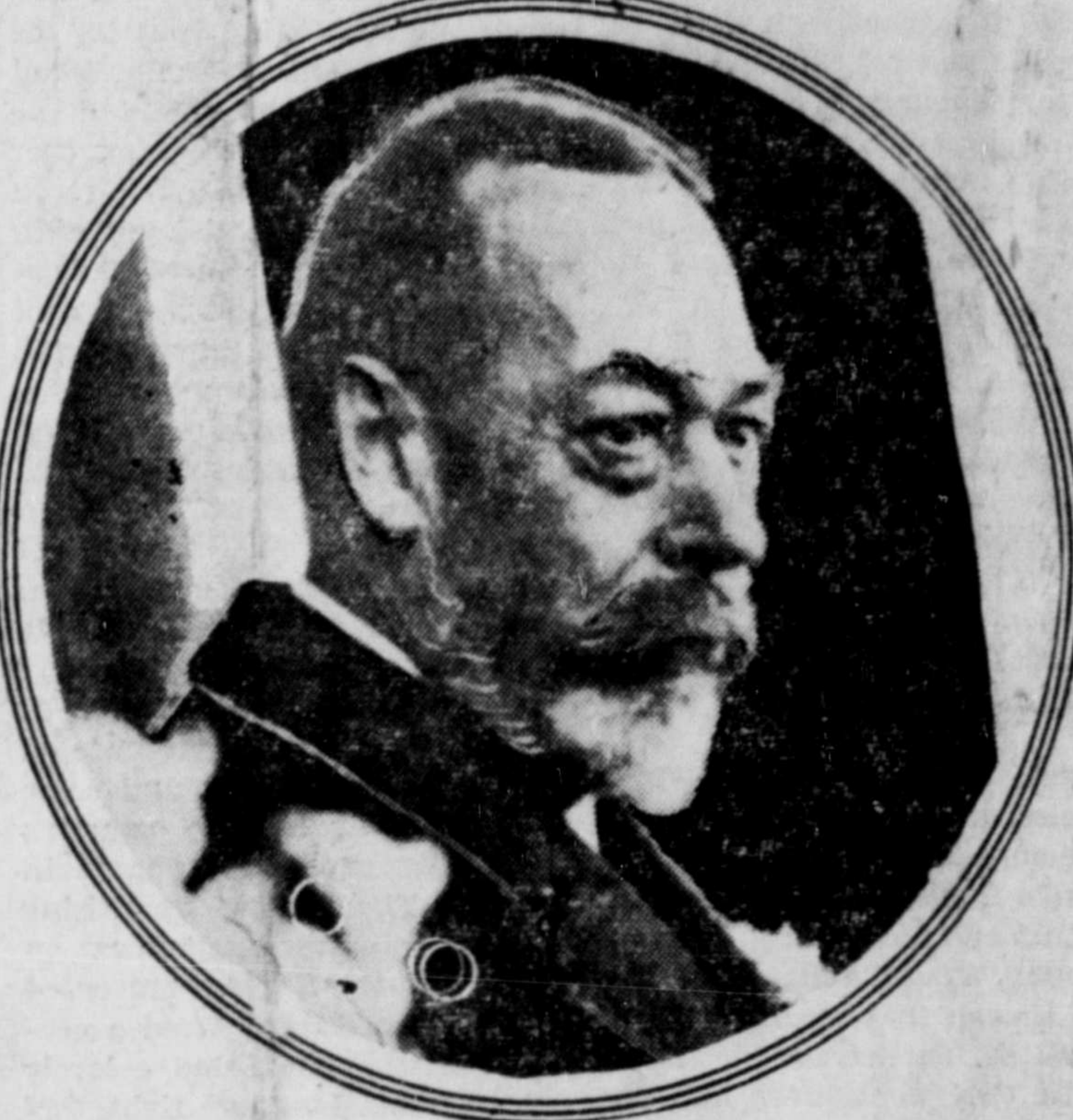

SEALS OR FISHERIES

Senator Macrae Would Determine Which is More Beneficial To Canada

OTTAWA, May 18: (Canadian Press)—An investigation of the amount of salmon eaten each season by seals was recommended Wednesday to the Senate committee on British Columbia sealing fishery conditions by Senator A. D. McRae in order to decide whether the salmon fishery was more beneficial to Canada than sealing. Senator McRae pointed out that \$400,000 was spent annually by Canada patrolling Pacific waters for the protection of sealing.

W. A. Fourn, deputy minister of fisheries, said that measures would be taken immediately to organize a survey.

Wages Are Boosted by Considerable Amount Resulting from Drive

Justice Speedily Executed in Case

California Trio Sentenced to Life Within Twenty-Eight Hours After Being Captured

LOS ANGELES, May 18:—The sentencing of Roy Williams, Jimmy Kirk and Larry Kerrigan to life imprisonment for the kidnapping of William F. Gettle, Beverly Hills millionaire oil operator, within twenty-eight hours after they had been captured in connection with the crime was one of the speediest examples of execution of criminal justice in the history of jurisprudence in California. The trio pleaded guilty to the crime, having confessed soon after their capture. Williams, Kirk and Kerrigan left here with their guards at 6 o'clock Wednesday evening by airplane for San Quentin.

IMPORTANT CONCESSION

An important concession was made to British Columbia by the federal government when it allowed an amendment to the budget providing for the duty on sugar to be removed at the end of this week instead of on July 1 as provided in the budget speech. This allows the fruit canners in the province to operate this year in taking care of the surplus products of the gardens and fruit farms of the southern parts of the province. It means a great deal to the canners and growers of British Columbia.

LAX CONDITION AT KINGSTON

A very lax condition of affairs seems to obtain at Kingston Penitentiary. There has been trouble at that penal institution on more than one occasion and the setting fire to the place seems to have been the culmination of these disturbances. It would seem now as if a complete change of control would be in order.

SILVER SITUATION

It is more than likely that some action will be taken in the near future to improve the price of silver. Evidently President Roosevelt is considering the matter seriously and there is possibility of action that may have the effect of stabilizing the metal to a certain extent. It is certain that any action the president may take will be with the object of improving conditions in the United States and not particularly in Canada. In spite of that, Canada is bound to feel a reflex from the movement.

It is a curious thing that the people of British Columbia do not seem to be looking to Ottawa for help in regard to silver mining. Instead of that their eyes turn to Washington which is the only source from which they seem to expect help. Possibly we have the wrong slant on this and should base our hopes on action by the Bennett government instead of from the Roosevelt administration.

Football Off to Good Start
With Regiment and Merchants
Playing Last Night to Draw

The 1934 football season was officially ushered in last evening when Merchants and Regiment played to a one-all tie in the opening game of the Gilhuly Cup series. City Commissioner W. J. Alder kicked off. The weather was ideal for football and a good crowd was in attendance to give the boys a big hand. Many of the old faces were missing from the Regiment team but their places were ably filled by promising high school boys who were playing their first year in senior company. Merchants seemed to have difficulty in fielding a full team, several changes being noticeable from the advertised eleven. The start of the game was delayed fully fifteen minutes while players were rounded up. All team managers are supposed to see to it that all players are on the ground ready to kick-off promptly on time.

The Merchants' Club has taken over the equipment of the now defunct Home Oil eleven and turned out in the familiar yellow strips formerly worn by the gas and oil men. The following teams took the field last night: Merchants—Parkes, Moe, Styles, McEvoy, A. Dickens, Howe, Willis-croft, H. Dickens, McKay, Loker and Carroll. Regiment—Moxley, Davies, Eby, Naylor, Wingham, Hill, Comadina, Cramp, Campbell, Nakamoto and Lindsay.

The First Half

Regiment won the toss and Wingham elected to kick down hill. After Commissioner Alder had given the ball a hefty kick the sphere was re-centred and McKay set the game in motion. The Merchants started off as though they meant business and for the first ten minutes looked as if they would overrun their younger and lighter opponents. The Regiment was penned in its own half of the field until it got its bearings and then play became more even. Early in the game McKay and H. Dickens had shots on the Regiment goal but Moxley was safe. Campbell, for the Greens, was soon through for the Merchants' defence but over-eagerness spoiled his parking effort. The Regiment, at this stage of the game, showed some clever touches of combination, particularly on the right wing, one passing bout between Nakamoto, Lindsay and Campbell being a treat to watch. The first goal came after fifteen minutes play. A Dickens fired in one of his famous pile-drivers from twenty yards range which Moxley stopped but could not hold with the result that McKay dashed up and scored to open the Canaries' account. This reverse only spurred the youngsters on to greater efforts and the Merchants' goal had several narrow escapes. Styles being forced to kick into touch to clear his lines, play was very fast and even, end to end play being the order of the day. Ten minutes from half time Styles and Wingham collided and Styles was forced to retire with an injured leg. The Regiment, with the advantage of an extra man, tried hard for the equalizer and Parkes saved two shots in quick succession. Half time arrived with the Merchants leading by one goal to nil.

Second Half

Styles was able to resume after half time to complete the Merchants' eleven. The Regiment was out to score and, after six minutes' play, was rewarded with a glorious goal from the foot of young Jack Campbell. George Hill secured possession on the right and passed out to Lindsay who carried the ball further up the right wing before putting across a beautiful centre. Campbell met the ball first time to put it past the helpless Parkes. No finer goal has been scored on the Acropolis Hill grounds for some time. This goal served as a tonic to the game. Play speeded up considerably and, almost immediately afterwards, the Merchants were

awarded a free kick right on the Regiment goal line for a foul on Moxley for carrying the ball. McKay took the kick and, although the ball entered the net, Referee Anslow rightfully disallowed the point as the ball should have been played by a second player. The Merchants tried hard to secure the lead again and H. Dickens and McKay were prominent with several hard shots which Moxley did well to save. Lindsay broke away for the Greens on a pass from Campbell but his shot was scrambled away by the Canaries' defenders. Hill shot over when well placed. Carroll raced away to the other end and forced a corner which was cleared. H. Dickens passed out to Carroll who shot past. The Regiment came into the picture again as Nakamoto passed out to Comadina but offside spoiled a promising movement. Parkes did well to save two shots, one from Campbell and another from Lindsay. A Dickens moved up to centre forward in a desperate effort to secure the deciding goal, McKay dropping back to centre half. A Dickens soon made his presence on the forward line felt and came close to scoring on two occasions but Moxley saved his charge in fine style. The Canaries were tiring fast and only over-anxiousness on the part of the Soldiers prevented them scoring. Parkes saved a certain goal when he fisted a lovely centre from Lindsay right off Campbell's head. Several scrambles occurred in front of the Regiment goal and the game ended with the Merchants attacking hotly. A draw was a very satisfactory result as it represents a fair reflex of the play.

Good Exhibition

In summing up, the Merchants seemed to lack condition and their attacks on goal were not as methodical as usual, too much wild kicking being indulged in. This, of course, will be remedied with a little more practice. The Regiment, although composed chiefly of youngsters, surprised even its most ardent supporters. What they lacked in experience they certainly made up by willingness and energy. They will undoubtedly improve considerably with future games. Considering it was the first game of the season it was a pleasing exhibition and augurs well for a very successful year. Regiment was best served by Moxley, Eby, Wingham, Hill and Campbell although all members were hard workers. For the Merchants the Dickens brothers were always in the thick of the fray, while Howe, McKay and Styles worked like Trojans. Referee Anslow had his whistle tuned to perfection and turned in his usual satisfactory game, being ably assisted by his two linesmen.

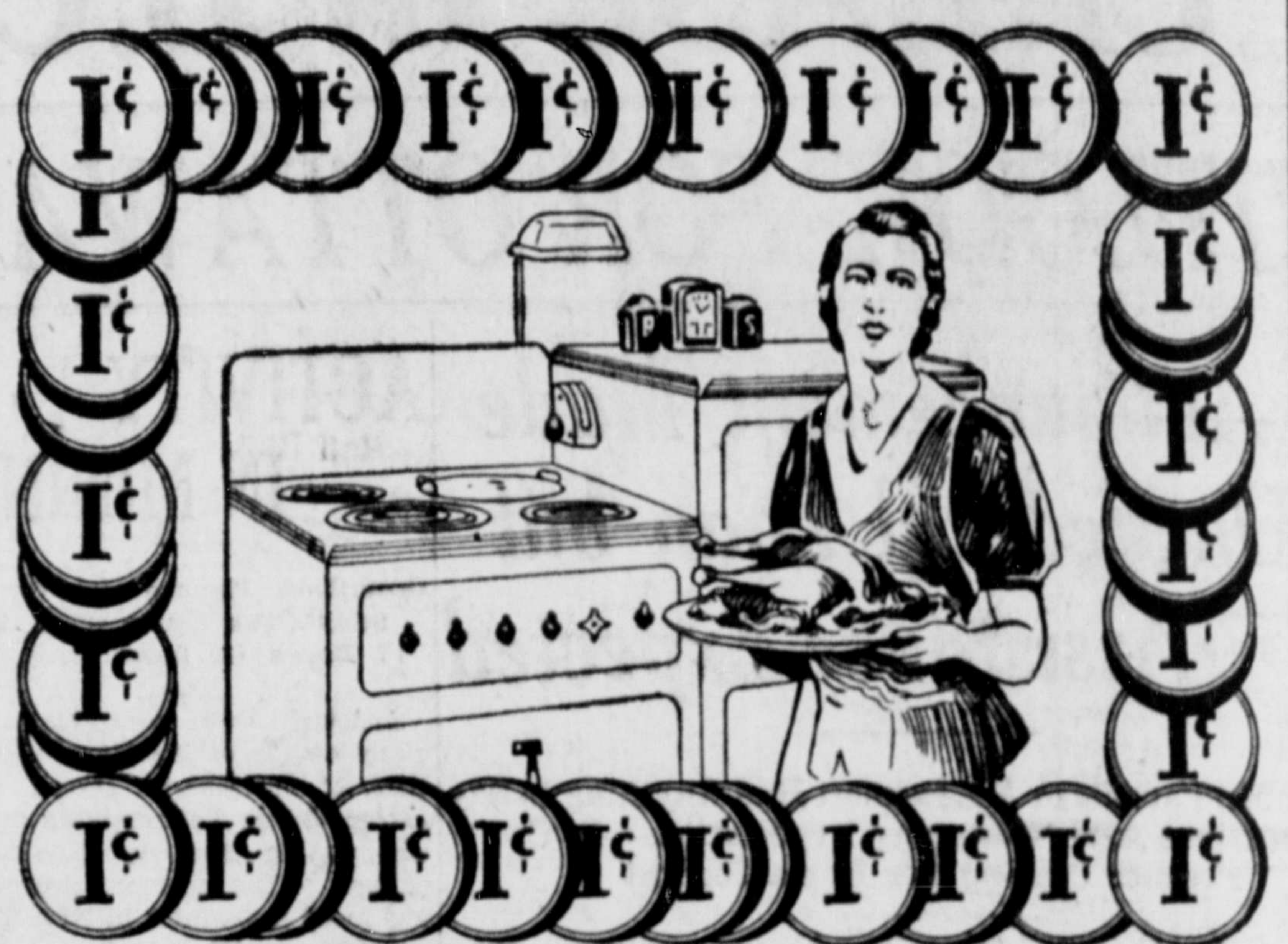

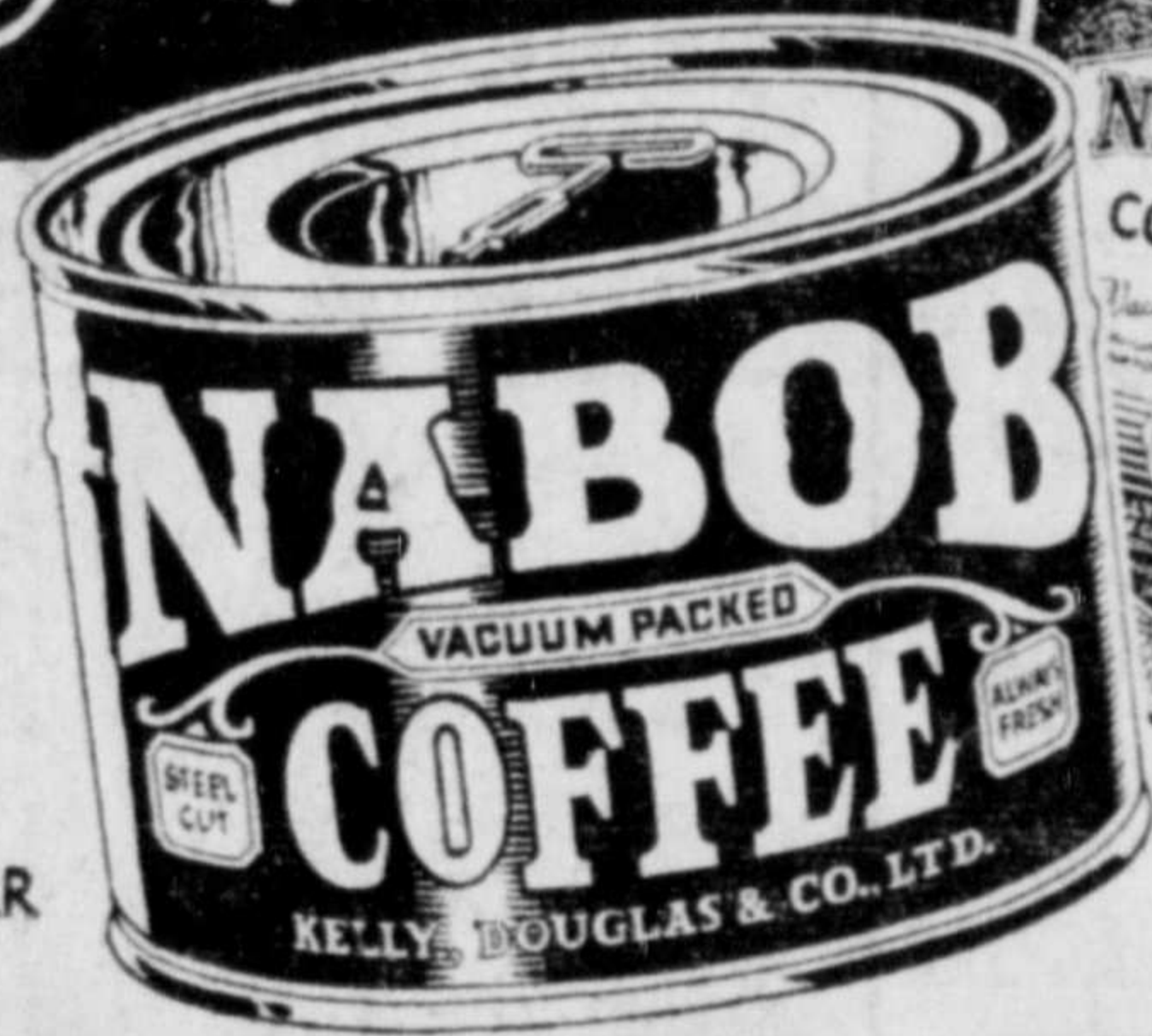

The Letter Box

ITALIAN STANDARD OF LIVING

Editor, Daily News.

I notice in your paper of May 4 an article written by one, V. Basso-Bert.

This individual has been wasting his time in such epigrams of reaction as the "Corporative State," which he cites as a cure for our economic ills.

Without going into too many words, but a few concrete facts, with this "mental wizard" I should like to point out that he must have visited this modern paradise known as Italy about the time of his hero's historic march to Rome.

If he has not been there since, or is not acquainted with some of the facts, I will quote some of them, also the references.

In January 1928 Italy had an army of 4,392,211 totally unemployed, and 76,327 partially unemployed. (Annuario, Statistico Italo.) By December 1932, the same reference gives 1,229,387 totally and 47,644 partially unemployed. Also the same authority gives the figures of the total industrial population as 4,283,209.

One's common sense is only needed to understand the aforementioned figures. Then again the average industrial worker's hourly wage was in 1928—2.15 Lire or 10.4 cents and in 1932—1.71 Lire or 8½ cents. This is the last year the figures are available. This is a drop of 19 percent. We must take into consideration that 1 K. G. of bread (2¼ lbs.) cost 1.81 Lire or 9½ cents in 1928 and dropped only 11 percent to 1.611 or 8½ cents in 1932. Thus the Italian worker the magnificent sum of \$1.10 or 20.91 Lire per month.

The following indices of "real wages" or standard of living were compiled by the British Ministry of Labour in 1930 (See Whitaker's Almanac 1934): Great Britain 100, Germany (pre-Nazi) 74, France 59, Belgium 50, Italy 45.

Now, Mr. Basso-Bert, it is time to give us some facts and not mere words.
