EDMONTON, Feb. 22:—William "Old Bill" Burns, aged 76, blind news vendor and familiar figure on the streets of this city, is dead following an operation to remove his right leg. He was a sufferer from diabetes.

Canada Must Regain Canned Salmon Markets; New Rules For Fraser River Defended

OTTAWA, Feb. 22: (CP)—Canada must regain world salmon markets which in recent years have gone to the United States, Japanese and Russian packers, Hon. H. H. Stevens, minister of trade and commerce, declared in the House of Commons yesterday in defending regulations permitting seine fishing off the Fraser River.

The minister declared that, since the Americans had refused to ratify the sockeye treaty with Canada, Canadian fishermen were being permitted in self-defence to use purse seine nets. Some gillnet fishermen claimed that they were being driven out of business and that the purse seines were making irreparable inroads into the salmon run.

MRS. MANDY IS SPEAKER

Inaugurating of Children's Story Hour in Prince Rupert Is Urged

New Influences

Changed Environment and Activities Necessitate Different Occupations

In the course of one of the most impressive addresses ever delivered to the Parent-Teachers' Association, Mrs. J. T. Mandy last night placed before the members of the Association and the citizens of Prince Rupert the vital importance and necessity of inaugurating a Children's Story Hour.

The child of today was in some ways different from the child of fifteen or twenty years ago. Influences outside the home and the school—radio, the movies, newspapers and magazines—tended to make him more sophisticated but his heart and mind were just the same and developed in the same way as they did twenty years ago. The child today still loved the true, beautiful, and the good. The cause of the present sophistication was in large measure due to the fact that parents were too often different from what parents were twenty years ago. In too many homes the father was absorbed entirely in business affairs, meetings and clubs, while the mother moved in a whirlwind of social duties. The child often came home from school to a deserted house, snatched a piece of pie or cake and went out to the gang. From his gang he often learned distorted facts of life and ideas which might be put in operation and which would shock his mother and father if they were. In the evening father went to his club or committee meeting and mother went to a party. To pass the evening the child was given money to go to the movies where perhaps a gangster picture would indelibly impress his plastic mind with false and distorted views of life. Such an upbringing would not help the child to develop that strength and stability of character which would enable him to cope successfully with the problems of life.

Mrs. Mandy contrasted such a home with that ideal home which Henry Wadsworth Longfellow described from his own experience in those well known verses which began:

"Between darkness and daylight,
"When the night is beginning to lower,
"Comes a pause in the day's occupations
"That is known as the children's hour."

In such a home, at the dinner table or around the fire at the children's hour, father and mother joined with their children and told them stories and took part in their play. The words of wisdom spoken by the parents and the lessons inculcated by the stories bore fruit in spite of ideals and noble character. Nothing could take the place of this character in the life of the child, but, unfortunately, today it had shifted from mother and father to the radio, the movies and even to the streets.

An Ancient Art
Story telling was a very ancient art. Among early peoples the storyteller was the most honored and respected guest a king or court could have. Some of the world's greatest stories, including the Iliad and the Odyssey, were products of the story-teller's art. Among the Indian tribes courage, bravery, and industry were inculcated by means of the story.

A good story was ever the magic passport to the heart and mind of a child.
Mrs. Mandy discussed four types

of stories. The fairy tale taught moral truths very easily through concrete pictures. It did not teach the child to lie but, on the contrary, helped to keep the child from telling lies. The inventive mind of the child readily distinguished between a story of fancy and a deliberate lie. The story of "The Two Sisters" taught the beauty and purity of truth and kindness and the ugliness of falsehood and unkindness. The fairy tale would also provide the child with a useful background of literary allusions which would be of inestimable value to him in his later reading.

The nonsense story developed the sense of humor. The nature story taught scientific facts and the laws of nature. The historical tale connected the past with the present and was an important guide for the growth of ideals and interests, and the development of courage, endurance and wisdom.

Story hours for children were being successfully carried on in many cities. In Chicago children even from the slum and tenement districts, flocked to the library, school or settlement house to listen to the story teller at the children's hour, and, through such stories as Cinderella, they received that hope which enabled them to rise out of the very cinders of life and attain happiness and nobility of character.

Opportunity Here

A children's story hour would be as successful and useful in Prince Rupert as in Chicago or any other city. It was an undertaking which would cost no money, but which would bring results greater by far than could ever be measured. There were many ladies who had leisure hours and who were longing for some constructive hobby. Here was a golden opportunity knocking at their gates. "He, who helps a child, helps humanity with an immediateness which no other help given to human creatures at any other human stage can possibly give again."

On the motion of Miss S. A. Mills and Miss M. Hartin, a hearty vote of thanks was accorded Mrs. Mandy for her address, and to Mrs. William Cruickshank, Mrs. Wm. Blackstock, and Miss Dorothy Hogan who took part in the musical program.

The meeting was held in the Borden Street School and was very largely attended. Mrs. D. C. Stuart, president of the Association, presided over the meeting.

WAS HEAD OF SPIES

Investigation Reveals New Phase In Affairs of Alex Stavisky

PARIS, Feb. 22.—An investigation into the affairs of Alex Stavisky, who recently ended his own life in Switzerland while police were closing in around him, it is reported, shows that he was an international spy heading a ring. Stavisky had been wanted in connection with the "Bayonne Pawn Shop" scandal. French secret service reports hinted broadly that Stavisky might have acted as a spy both for France and for the Nazis of Germany.

Stavisky, it is also reported, cashed checks aggregating \$10,000 in value made out to himself by various companies.

STOWING AND ICE MOST IMPORTANT FACTORS IN FISH PRESERVATION, DR. BEDFORD INFORMS FISHERMEN.

(Continued from Page 3)

discuss in more or less of a technical way more up-to-date and efficient methods of the use of ice in connection with the stowage of fish after it is caught on the banks. In the course of his lecture, Dr. Bedford discussed sources of heat in the hold, effects of temperature of air and sea on fish and ice and the kind and extent of insulation, duration of trips, benefits of ice water, inefficiency of present methods of icing and stowage, drainage and decomposition.

The most efficient system of stowage, Dr. Bedford declared, provided a wall of ice surrounding each pan of fish. The ice on and around the fish should be constantly watched to see that the supply was maintained throughout the trip. The objects thus attained would be as follows:

- Proper drainage of melted ice.
- More even distribution of cold water bathing the fish.
- Reduction of weight on the bottom fish.
- Warm air coming into the hold from the hatch is cooled before coming into contact with the fish.
- Heat transfer from sea water and air through hull to fish is stopped before reaching fish.

Following the lecture a model fish hold was demonstrated. Dr. Neal Carter, director of the experimental station, also spoke briefly.

Appreciation Expressed

The lecture was again listened to with deep interest by the boat owners and fishermen, about 120 being present. G. W. Nickerson, secretary of the Canadian Halibut Vessel Owners' Association, presided and expressed appreciation to Dr. Bedford for the time and thought he had expended on the lectures, referring to the value of same from a practical standpoint.

over the meeting during which it was announced that Mr. Taylor would be in the city for the next few days with a view to organizing two more C.C.F. clubs locally in addition to the one which is already in existence.

Mr. Taylor, in his address, reiterated the C.C.F. doctrine that the present capitalistic system is decadent and must be replaced with a new order of things whereby production, distribution and exchange would be premised on human needs rather than for the making of profits for the vested interests. He urged the people, when they went to the polls next time, to have no fear of voting by the constitutional means of the ballot for a party which proposed to give them a decent living. If there was further delay in doing this, the situation might become so serious that drastic developments might ensue which would endanger the well-being of all.

Movement Popular

The C.C.F. had seized on the ambitions, desires and wishes of the people as no other movement ever had, declared Mr. Taylor, and it was sweeping through the country like a tide. This was evidenced by the fact that it had polled 90,000 votes in the recent provincial election after a campaign of little over three months. The movement was still making progress everywhere.

Mr. Taylor gave his theory of the history of capitalism from the time 150 years ago when James Watt had invented the steam engine, thus giving birth to multiple production in manufacture which had expended until today there were no markets for capitalism. Science had produced machinery for the production of abundance yet there was dire poverty all around with people undernourished and suffering for the lack of proper food and those out of work threatened with permanent unemployment.

The situation would not right itself, declared Mr. Taylor. It was an economic impossibility under the present system for it to do so. Governments for years had been annually expending more than they received until today the public debts of the nations and the provinces had reached a point where they could never be paid. The C.C.F., with a clear understanding of the issue, offered a new planned economic order whereby production, distribution and exchange would be for human needs and not for profits. The C.C.F. proposed to interfere with no nationality, race or religion but had as its sole object the material and social advancement of the people.

Mr. Taylor expressed the hope
