Alleged Lindbergh Baby Kidnapper Now Facing New Jersey Trial

IS SHOWING STRAIN

PLEMINGTON, N.J., Oct. 24: Bruno Richard Hauptmann, now in the county jail here awaiting trial for the kidnapping and murder of baby Charles Augustus Lindbergh, is beginning to show | ---obvious signs of strain. It is probable that he will be arraigned today when defence attorneys are expected to ask that the trial be delayed until December 11. A change of venue is also expected to be sought from this county on account of local prejudice.

James Fawcett, chief defence attorney for Hauptmann, who, under New Jersey state laws has no alternative but to enter a plea of not guilty, gave some idea yesterday of the course which the defence would follow, also intimating that Hauptmann would take the stand on his own behalf. Fawcett stated that the defence would endeavor to prove that the Lindbergh ransom notes were not in Hauptmann's handwriting and that a new theory would be advanced as to how Hauntmann had come into pos-

session of the ransom money. NEW YORK, Oct. 24:-Bruno Richard Hauptmann has been taken to Flemington, N.J., to face trial for the kidnapping and murder of Charles Augustus Lindbergh ir, following the refusal of the federal Appellate Court to interfere with the decision of Judge Ernest Hammer denying his application for a writ of habeas corous against extradition. The decision of the Appellate Court against Hauptmann was unanimous, making it impossible to continue the appeal to the Su-

preme Court of United States. Four hours after the decision had been given, Hauptmann, under heavy guard, had been removed from the Bronx jail here to Hunterdon County jail in New

Hauptmann had appealed against extradition on the basis of an alibi.

OIL TANKER IN TROUBLE

Rescue Vessels Speeding Toward American Vessel Disabled North of Manila

MANILA, Oct. 24: (CP)-A wireless message received last night from the liner President Jackson intimated that the Richfield Oil Co.'s tanker Larry Doheny, for the safety of which grave anxiety had been earlier felt, was still afloat although seriously disabled some 1000 miles east northeast of Manila with much of her superstructure already swept away and other damage done by a typhoon in which she was wallowing. Two American steamers, the Gold Star and Olympia, were rushing at top speed towards the stricken vessel, the former last night beign 214 miles away and the latter 500 miles.





One Report is That Louisville Abductor is Heading For Canada; Another Says Pacific Coast

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 24:-AIthough bills believed to have been part of the ransom money are being reported with increasing frequency from various parts of the country and the alleged abductor is thought to have been seen at widely separated points; Thomas H. Robinson, alleged kidnapper last week of Mrs. Alice Stoll, wife of a wealthy young Louisville oil operator, is still one jump ahead of the police, despite a nation-wide hunt; The authorities are, however, hopeful that he will soon be taken.

One search was centering on Rochester, N.Y., it having been reported that Robinson was heading for Canada. Later it was reported that he was on his way to the Pacific Coast with most of the ransom money still in his possession.

Still later the search for Robinson was intensified around Buffalo, N.Y., and Fort Erie, Ont., the alleged kidnapper having been reported to have been seen at both places early this week.

Indictments charging Robinson, · his wife and father with kidnapping have been returned by a federal Grand Jury here and they were arraigned Tuesday. Under the Lindbergh anti-kidnapping laws, it is possible all may be executed.

Mrs. Robinson pleaded not guilty. and it is expected her trial will proceed next Monday.


