Important Statement Made in House Today by Sir John Simon Ends Storm in Far East as Far as Great Britain is Concerned

LONDON, April 30: (CP)-Japan has fully accepted the policy of the "open door" for all nations in China, Sir John Simon, Foreign Secretary, told Parliament today in clearing up the recent Japanese "hands off China" statement. The storm over this declaration is thus ended as far April this year totalled 2,174,400 as Great Britain, with a bigger stake in China than any ounds as compared with 1.446,600 other foreign power, is concerned.
