# DEVELOPING OF ISLAND RESOURCES

## QUEEN CHARLOTTE MINING PROPERTY OUTLOOK IS GOOD

### Queen Charlottes Are Looking For New Deal From Pattullo Gov't

Thousands of Unemployed Could be Absorbed by Exploitation of Timber, Coal and Oil, Mineral and Fisheries Possibilities

SKIDEGATE, Jan. 13.—People of the Queen Charlotte Islands are hoping that the new provincial government will take early action to bring the resources of these islands before the public with a view to development of same. Exploitation of the great stands of Sitka spruce and yellow and red cedar, gold possibilities, coal and oil fields and fisheries, it is felt, would easily result in the absorption of thousands of unemployed. At one time the Queen Charlottes supported a population of eighty thousand Haida Indians.

Already the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. of Prince Rupert and other companies have done much to bring the fisheries of the islands to the fore.

### Favors Lottery



PREMIER TASCHEREAU

MONTREAL, Jan. 13. (CP)—Repeal of the Dominion's anti-lottery law to permit the holding of one large lottery, the proceeds of which would be distributed on a per capita basis among the nine provinces for charitable and educational purposes, was advocated yesterday by Premier L. A. Taschereau of Quebec. He said he would bring the matter up at the forthcoming Dominion-provincial conference.

### UNDER FOUR SOVEREIGNS

Mrs. Thomas White Passes Away in Ottawa Today at Age of 99 Years

OTTAWA, Jan. 13. (CP)—Mrs. Thomas White, aged 99, widow of the late Hon. Thomas White, who was minister of the interior in Sir John A. Macdonald's cabinet, died here this morning. She had lived under four British sovereigns, being born two years before Queen Victoria ascended to the throne.

### DEAD AT PREMIER

Thomas Powers, Dock Foreman For Mining Company, Passes Away

Thomas Powers, dock foreman for the Premier Gold Mining Co. at Stewart, died yesterday morning in the Premier Hospital, according to word received in the city. He was sixty years of age and is survived by a widow who, before her marriage, was Miss Eleanor Peck, daughter of the late Hal Peck and Mrs. Peck, formerly of Prince Rupert.

Mr. Powers had been for many years at Stewart and was quite well known in Prince Rupert. He had been in ill-health for some time.


#### SILVER AND COPPER PRICES

### BLOCKED BY SNOW

Impassable Roads Making Serious Condition Around Terrace

TERRACE, Jan. 13.—Mild weather, with showers, has been the order of the past week but many of the roads are still impassable. This condition is assuming rather a serious aspect as all the local woodpiles were consumed in the long cold spell. It is also a serious hindrance to those settlers who have logs or ties to deliver. The snowdrifts are in many cases too deep and stiff for the snow plough. Meantime gangs of men, armed with shovels are setting out to grapple with the problem.

### Possibility Of Acclamation On Terrace Board

TERRACE, Jan. 13.—The 1933 Board of Village Commissioners held its last meeting on Monday. Whether the present three members are to be re-elected will be decided on January 25, the date of the village election. From present appearances it is to be gathered the people of Terrace are satisfied with the present combination and are likely to put them back into office though one or two other names are being mentioned in this connection and there may be a contest. If only three are nominated, there would be no poll.

### IS DIGGING FROM RUDY

Mrs. Vallee To Seek Alimony of \$7,400 Monthly and \$50,000 In Attorney's Fees

LOS ANGELES, January 13 (Canadian Press)—When Fay Webb Vallee goes into court next Wednesday to begin prosecution of a suit for separate maintenance against her husband, Rudy Vallee, the noted crooning orchestra leader, she will ask for temporary alimony of \$7,400 monthly and \$50,000 attorney's fees.

### TRIAL IS GOING ON

Elderly Chicago Woman Doctor Is Charged With Killing Her Daughter-in-Law

CHICAGO, Jan. 13.—Empanelment of a jury for the trial of Dr. Alice Wynecoop, who is charged with murder of her 23-year old daughter-in-law, Rheta Wynecoop, who is alleged to have been given an overdose of anaesthetic and shot on an operating table in the home of the elder woman, was completed yesterday and the trial is proceeding. The elderly woman, who was brought into the courtroom on a wheel chair, was calm and unperturbed as she pleaded not guilty to the charge following her arraignment.

A huge crowd of spectators was present at the opening of the trial and broke into disorders. The police were unable to maintain order so the courtroom was finally ordered cleared.

### Vehicular Traffic Tied Up as Result Of Snow Blockade

Traffic is blocked between Premier and Stewart owing to heavy snow on the road and automobiles are unable to get through, according to word reaching here. Miss Edith Kergin, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. L. W. Kergin of this city, who has been visiting at Premier, has been unable to get home for this reason.

Sutherland and two passengers, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Stewart, who have been missing since December 20 on a flight from here to Jovunnetook, Ungava, a telegram to Montreal said.

### Mill Store Near Prince George Robbed Lately

Robert Blangy and Woodrow Hedrick Appear in Court Charged With Breaking and Entering

Following the Sinclair Mills store in the Prince George district being broken into on the night of January 3-4 and a large quantity of goods taken therefrom, Robert Blangy, who lived about a mile and a half distant, and Woodrow Hedrick have been arrested by Constable Murray and, on appearing before Stipendiary Magistrate George Milburn at Prince George on charges of breaking and entering, were remanded for eight days, according to report received at divisional headquarters of the provincial police here. A quantity of the goods believed to have been taken from the store is alleged to have been recovered from Blangy's house on being searched. Further charges, it is stated, are to be laid against the two men in view of other articles, allegedly stolen, having been also found in the house.

### CONFIDENCE VOTE GIVEN

French Chamber of Deputies Gives Clean-up Mandate to Premier; Warning Against Royalists

PARIS, Jan. 13. (CP)—The chamber of Deputies last night gave Premier Chautemps a smashing vote of confidence 360 to 229 on his pledge to clean up the Bayonne Pawn Shop scandal.

Premier Chautemps warned the nation yesterday that Royalist riots over the Stavisky scandal held the threat of a coup d'etat to establish a "directory." Thousands of troops are being held in readiness to march on Paris if necessary to stamp out disorders occurring in protest against the alleged Bayonne Pawn Shop collapse which cost the public more than \$40,000,000.

## CAME FROM U. E. L. STOCK

Son of Clergyman E. B. Ryckman Became Corporation Counsel Cabinet Minister

The late Hon. E. B. Ryckman, former minister of national revenue, who died this week in Toronto, was born in Huntington, Quebec, of United Empire Loyalist stock, his father, the late Rev. Dr. Edward Bradshaw Ryckman having been a distinguished clergyman of the Methodist Church in Canada. He was educated at Brantford Collegiate Institute, Toronto University and Osgoode Hall and, being a brilliant student, won a number of important awards.

Mr. Ryckman became a corporation lawyer and was promptly identified with the directorships of such well known concerns as Dunlop Tire and Rubber Co., Gurney Foundry Co., International Business Machines Co. Ltd. and Russell Motor Car Co. with all of which companies he severed his connections upon becoming a cabinet minister.

First elected to the House of Commons in 1921 for Toronto East he was appointed minister of national revenue by Prime Minister R. B. Bennett following the 1930 election. He had been minister of public works in the Meighen "shadow cabinet" in 1926.

Mr. Ryckman is survived by his widow, formerly Mabel Louise Gurney of Toronto, whom he married in 1895. There were four children—two sons and one daughter, one of the sons, Edward Gurney, being killed while serving as a lieutenant in the Royal Flying Corps during the Great War.

**Another Test Run**

## WATERFRONT WHIFFS

"Dry Southeaster" Stirred Things Up—Halibut Fishing to Start March 1—Control of Operations Planned

Sunday night's wild "dry southeaster" caused possibly less damage along the waterfront than might have been anticipated, the major casualty being the breaking of the back of the Northern British Columbia Airways' hangar which broke loose from its moorings and became caught on the steep bank as a result of which the damage occurred.

The structure has since been moved from the foot of McBride Street to beyond the ocean dock. A couple of small boats were sunk at Cow Bay beach but were pulled up the next day. Other damage included the partial blowing down of Philipson & Eddy's coal shed which is being speedily repaired. About a hundred feet of railing was blown down on the Canadian National vehicular ramp leading to the docks and a few shingles were ripped off the big shed. Due to general watchfulness and all night vigils in many cases, the many boats of the various fleets held steady and there was little other damage of consequence. However, it was a trying enough night and no one wants another like it for a while. If it had been a westerly instead of a southeaster that kicked up such a fuss, consequences would, undoubtedly, have been much more serious.

With Capt. E. K. Gray back in command after having taken his annual vacation ashore, C. P. R. steamer Princess Adelaide arrived in port at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon from the south and sailed at 10 o'clock last night on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

The Indian Department's power cruiser Maskeena, with Indian Agent W. E. Collinson and Dominion Constable A. J. Watkinson on board, returned to port last evening from a trip to Port Simpson, having left here early Thursday morning for the native village. Mr. Collinson made the trip for the purpose of conducting the annual election of the village council at Simpson.

Halibut fishing activities of the 1934 season will get under way by general agreement of the various interests concerned on March 1. It is now expected that means that little more than six weeks must elapse before work is resumed and meantime there is considerable to be done in the way of preparations.

The waterfront is still quiet today but things before very long now will, doubtless, be beginning to show considerable stir. Meantime, pending the opening of the new season, fishermen and vessel owners of both the Canadian and American fleets continue to work on plans for voluntary control of operations both in the interests of improved market conditions and the conservation of the fishery.
