## RADIO COMMISSION ASSAILED IN HOUSE BY OLOF HANSON

### Local Member Urges Abolition of Air Board As "Waste of Money"

Minister of Marine Suggests That Matter be Taken Up With Special Committee—Hamilton East Labor Member Rises to Defence of Broadcasting Organization

OTTAWA, March 10: (CP)—Abolition of the radio commission was demanded in the House of Commons on Friday night by Olof Hanson, Liberal member for Skeena, who declared it was "a waste of public money." The demand was made when the House was considering estimates for the Department of Marine and a vote of \$259,400 for radio service and improvement of reception.

### Bargain Trips To Pacific Coast On Again This Year

WINNIPEG, March 10—The bargain trips operated to the Pacific coast last Easter proved so popular with residents of the prairies that the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways have decided to offer another cent-a-mile trip to the coast this Easter.

These low fares will be in effect from March 24 to 31 inclusive and will be good for 21 days. Tickets may be purchased at all stations between Port Arthur, and Armstrong and Jasper, Banff, and Westporters permitted at these latter points and all stations beyond.

### BIRTHDAY FOR CITY

Twenty-Four Years of Corporate History Rounded Out With Annual Pioneers' Banquet

### 200 Persons Present

Old Timers Make Merry With Speeches, Songs, Music and Dancing

Another year of corporate history for Prince Rupert was fittingly and enthusiastically rounded out last evening when, with the old time geniality, jollity and spirit of the early days pervading the air, pioneers and friends to the number of well on towards two hundred assembled in the Oddfellows' Hall to celebrate with banquet, speech-making, song, music and dance the twenty-fourth anniversary of the incorporation of this city. It was a right merry gathering fully in keeping with previous events of its kind, the Prince Rupert Pioneers' Association, under the auspices of which it was held, once again acquitting itself with credit in the arrangement with which the proceedings were dispatched.

The hall was suitably decorated with flags and banners. At the rear of the head table the Canadian flag and the Stars and Stripes shared honors while signs around the walls bore the legend "We're Here Because We're Here." Fred Wesch, in the absence of A. J. Prudhomme, president of the Prince Rupert Pioneers' Association, occupied the chair and, at the appointed time of seven o'clock, called the gathering to order with the singing of "O Canada." The blessing was pronounced by Rev. W. H. Pierce, veteran missionary of the north, after which one half a minute's silence was observed in memory of pioneers who have passed on during the past year among whom was the late Ex-Mayor S. M. Newton, former president of the Association. After the toast to "The King" had been honored in the usual manner, an excellent dinner repast was done full justice to, fine musical selections being rendered by the Junior Symphony Orchestra, under direction of Bert Cameron, throughout the meal. After community singing of "We're Here Because We're Here," the program of speeches and music commenced.

Commissioner Alder The first speaker, City Commissioner W. J. Alder, spoke of the development of the natural resources of this district since the founding of the city. The pioneers had had little conception or appreciation of the real importance of possibilities of timber, fishing, minerals and agriculture hereabouts. Despite setbacks which the city had suffered principally through the war and the depression, definite progress had been made and the natural resources, the speaker believed, had been developed to an extent exceeding all expectations. Prince Rupert today was a city "with a good suit of clothes" and had nothing to be ashamed of in facing the world.

The importance of the agricultural hinterland of any city was stressed by the commissioner. Communities with sound agricultural background had weathered the recent period of stress the best. The farming hinterland of Prince Rupert had as great possibilities as that of Vancouver and, with more attention now being paid to the problems of marketing, Mr. Alder felt that, in future, it would play a much more important part in connection.

### May Remove War Menace In Far East

TOKYO, March 10:—According to reports current in well-informed quarters here, a secret deal is in progress whereby the Chinese Eastern Railway will be sold by Soviet Russia to the new state of Manchukuo. Should such a deal go through, it is believed it would largely remove the menace to peace in the Orient. For some time this railway has been the cause of strained relations between the Soviet and Japan.

### HOSPITAL MEETING

Proposal of Trail For Optional Tax Privilege Rejected—Joe Brown To Operate Ambulance

The board of directors of the Prince Rupert General Hospital, at its regular monthly meeting last night, after due consideration, decided against endorsing a resolution from the city council of Trail requesting that municipalities be given the option to levy a tax for medical and hospital services similar to a scheme which has been introduced by the employees of the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. at Trail. The reason of the local board in not endorsing the resolution was that the relative positions of Trail and Prince Rupert were entirely different and, while it was felt that the cause was a worthy one, it was considered that the time of putting it into effect so far as Prince Rupert is concerned was most inopportune.

Joe Brown was awarded the work of operating the hospital ambulance. There were three or four other propositions besides that of Mr. Brown.

A new tube to cost approximately \$205 was authorized to be purchased for the x-ray department, replacing an old tube which is worn out. It was decided to call for tenders for the supply of milk to the hospital.

It is planned to make repairs in the near future to the roofs of the hospital and nurses' home buildings as well as to paint the exterior of the nurses' home. The house committee has both matters in hand.

The house committee reported that repairs had had to be made during the month to the automatic fireman.

Hospital days for February totaled 1281, the finance committee reported, the average cost per hospital day being \$2.95.

Present at the meeting were G. V. Wilkinson, chairman, Government Agent Norman A. Watt, W. M. Brown, Frank Dibb, S. D. Macdonald, R. E. Benson and Dr. W. T. Kerrigan, directors; Miss Jean Harrison, R.N., lady superintendent, and H. W. Birch, managing secretary.

### PASSES IN VANCOUVER

Nichol Thompson, Prominent Pioneer of Southern City, Passed Away Today

VANCOUVER, March 10: (CP)—Nichol Thompson, aged 80, prominent in the business and industrial life of the province for forty-five years, died today. He was known as the father of the Vancouver Board of Trade and was at one time president of the British Columbia Chamber of Mines. For years he was actively connected with the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy.

### Get Convict Back

LOS ANGELES, March 10:—Arrangements are being made to return Ed. Davis, who was arrested here a few days ago, to Kansas City where he is alleged to have participated in a machine gun massacre several months ago at the Union station. Davis is an escaped convict, having made his getaway from a penitentiary in which he had been serving a life sentence.

### Loss of Fliers' Lives Actuates President In Ordering Restrictions

Henceforth Only Such Lines Will be Operated as Will Insure Against Recurrence of Fatal Accidents

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 10: (CP)—Because of loss of ten lives since United States Army planes started carrying air mail, President Franklin D. Roosevelt today ordered an immediate curtailment of service. Henceforth the service will be restricted to such routes as will ensure as far as possible against recurrence of fatal accidents.

The service will be restored to the former proportions when carrying of the mail is resumed by private air companies, it is expected.

### STRIKE IS NEAR END

Settlement of Dispute Affecting Logging Camps Down Coast Relieved in Sight

### Companies Accede

Agree to Recognize Camp Committees and Not Discriminate—Wages to be Probed

VANCOUVER, March 10: (CP)—End of the strike of Vancouver Island loggers is believed to be in sight with the acceptance by the companies of the strikers' demand for recognition of camp committees and that men on strike shall not be discriminated against.

The Department of Labor's wage scale will be put before the men over the week-end with the understanding that, when the board of industrial relations is formed, that body will investigate loggers' wages.

Hon. George S. Pearson and Adam Bell, minister and deputy minister of labor respectively, were present at negotiations conducted here between the companies and loggers.

## WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Halibut Prices Open Satisfactorily—Heavier Landings Expected Next Week—Herring Cease Running at Pearl Harbor

Opening season halibut prices at the port of Prince Rupert this year were generally considered satisfactory although landings during the ten days since the commencement of 1934 fishing operations have been small and irregular. For the first few small catches that came in 6c per pound was paid, the most of the fish being disposed of to

the local retail trade. The first carload of fresh fish of the season for the eastern market was dispatched yesterday by the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. which paid 9.1c and 8.6c for the 17,000 pound catch of the Canadian boat Prosperity A. Capt. Andrew Christiansen. During the week the Atlin Fisheries have bought a couple of catches aggregating 8,500 pounds for 8.5c and 6.5c, shipping the fish to Vancouver. Landings for the week totalled 28,465 pounds.

Next week, it is expected, should see the arrival of the first American fish of the year with heavier landings of Canadian halibut also coming in from boats completing their first trips of the season. The pre-Easter market it is anticipated, will hold prices up well for the time being. If there is success in the real attempt that is being made this year to regulate the supply, steadier and higher prices than last year should be the rule pretty well throughout the season.

Delayed by having had a call to make at Surf Inlet on the way north to put off a crew of 12 men and mining machinery, and on account of having a goodly-sized parcel of freight for North Pacific cannery in the Skeena Slough, where the cannery crew arrived at the first of the week to make ready for the season's operations, Union steamer Cardena, Capt. Ernest Georgeson, did not arrive in port until 11 o'clock last night from the south. The vessel sailed at midnight on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

The Digby Island ferry boat Catherine B., which has been on the pontoons at the local dry dock for the past couple of weeks undergoing annual overhaul, is expected to be back in commission on her regular run next week. The small lighthouse tender Birnie, Capt. Joe Peterson, has been on the Digby Island run during the absence of the Catherine B.

Capt. John Orvik joined the seining fleet at Pearl Harbor this week and was catching herring for sale as fresh bait to the halibut fishing fleet. He was in on Thursday morning with a load of bait, the American vessels Arne and Gloria, which were here enroute to the banks on their first trips of the season, being among his customers.

Taking the run for two weeks in place of the Princess Adelaide, which has been withdrawn for annual overhaul, C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise, with Capt. Steve Gray in command, arrived in port at 7 o'clock last evening from the south and sailed at 10 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

The herring have stopped running at Pearl Harbor. They have mysteriously disappeared and, although the boats have been scouting for them, it has been without success. Pearl Harbor is deserted of the fish. However, a run is reported at Butler's Cove, Stephens Island, and it is understood a pound is to be put in there.

The lighthouse tender Newington, Capt. Harry Ormiston, will sail on Monday morning for a ten-day trip of service to various light-houses and aids to navigation between here and Egg Island in Queen Charlotte Sound. This is a trip which the Newington makes every two months.

Duncan P. Miller and his sister, Miss Edith Miller returned to the city on the Princess Louise last evening from a vacation trip to Vancouver.

## LONG DAY PROTESTED

Labor Council Sends Resolution to Provincial Gov't—More Local Labor for Skeena Canneries

The Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council, at its regular monthly meeting Thursday night, decided to send a resolution of protest to Premier T. D. Pattullo; Hon. G. S. Pearson, minister of labor, and Robert Connell, Leader of the Opposition, at the Tucks Inlet reduction plant here being permitted to work more than an eight-hour day while there are so many unemployed in the city.

The meeting heard reports of unfair wage standards existing on the local waterfront and of certain city stores which are said to be violating the requirements of the Minimum Wage Act. The former will be further investigated and the authorities will be requested to make prosecutions in connection with the latter.

The meeting passed a resolution supporting in principle the fight of Rev. A. E. Smith, general secretary of the Canadian Labor Defence League, against conviction at Toronto on a charge of sedition.

Letters passed on by the Junior Chamber of Commerce from Skeena River cannery companies expressing sympathy with the request that more local instead of southern labor be employed in the canneries on the river were read.

Thomas Elliott, delegate of the Fish Packers' Union, was appointed to represent the council on the Public Library new book campaign committee.

S. D. Macdonald, president, was in the chair and there was a fair attendance of members.

The sunshine is bringing out the primroses and polyanthus in the gardens. Several people have reported these flowers in bloom already.
