EUROPEAN SITUATION

The flare-up in Europe caused by the assassination of President Dolfuss of Austria and the mild sensation caused by the accession of Chancellor Hitler to the presidency of Germany following his recent summary execution of Nazi rebels seem to be settling down. Austria has accepted Vice Chancellor Franz von Papen of Germany as ambassador and every day that passes without any disturbing force becoming active makes war less likely.

Germany has not forgotten the lessons of twenty years ago and Chancellor Hitler has declared against war. No country that was involved in the Great War will be willing to fight again without very good reason. It will be another ten or twenty years before that war will be sufficiently forgotten.

LAST OF HINDENBURG

Field Marshal von Hindenburg is dead and buried. One of the greatest leaders of a great people, the late president of Germany, will be pointed to as one of the national heroes of the Fatherland. As a military leader he was a source of strength and as a political leader he stepped into the breach at a critical time and enabled the country to carry on. He died in harness as he would have wished to do.

STIR UP TROUBLE

Hon. H. H. Stevens suggests that the fuss over the suppression of his brain child was simply an attempt to stir up trouble. He is wrong. The suppression of a document of that kind would have been "news" at any time but the suppression by the premier of a document prepared by the minister of trade and commerce is enough to cause something of a sensation. Add to this the fact that the document was simply a summary of the evidence of a public parliamentary hearing with comments thereon and the sensation is bound to be considerable. When it is further considered that the criticisms contained in the document stigmatize the actions and methods of some of the big monied powers to which Mr. Bennett belongs, it is easy to understand why the whole country should be talking about the incident and prophesying its effect on the next general election. Mr. Stevens would have been one of the first to be stirred by such an incident if it had occurred in the opposition camp.

GREAT BALL CHIEF DIES

Wilbert Robinson, For Many Years Manager of Brooklyn Dodgers, Succumbs to Brain Hemorrhage—Age 74

Idolized Figure

Uncle Bobby, Once-Great Catcher And Batter, One of Few Remaining Links Between New and Old Game

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 9: (CP)—Wilbert Robinson, 74-year-old president of the Atlanta baseball club of the Southern Association and former manager of the Brooklyn Dodgers of the National League, died last night following a brain hemorrhage.

"Uncle Bobby" Robinson was one of the few outstanding links between the older ranks of baseball and the modern game. Famous first as one of the greatest catchers and hardest hitters in the game, when he was with the three-year champion Baltimore Orioles in the nineties, he gained later distinction as pilot of the Brooklyn Nationals, which he took hold of in 1914 and led to pennant victories in 1916 and 1920, retiring three years ago.

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

With a capacity list of passengers, most of whom were round trip tourists for Alaska, C. N. R. steamer Prince George, Capt. H. E. Nedden, arrived here at 9:45 a.m. yesterday from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and sailed at 1 o'clock in the afternoon for Skagway and other northern points whence she will return here next Monday southbound. All accommodation on the vessel was filled.

Sailing from here this Saturday evening, C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil McLean, is already assured of being full ship. Indeed, there is already a substantial waiting list for accommodation. The vessel is running a special round trip for one way excursion from Anyox, Stewart and Prince Rupert to Vancouver, good returning on the Prince George on Friday of the following week or on the Prince Rupert on the Friday of the week later.

Southbound from the Naas River to Vancouver, Union Steamship Co.'s freighter Chilliwack, Capt. W. Mounce, arrived in port at 7:30 last evening and spent a few hours here. The vessel brought north cargo for cannery points along the coast and is taking shipments of canned salmon back into Vancouver.

Frank Waterhouse freighter Northland sailed yesterday afternoon for Vancouver with 177 tons of screenings loaded from the Alberta Wheat Pool's local elevator. This makes a total of 331 tons of screenings to be shipped from here within a week, the freighter Grainer having sailed on Wednesday of last week with 154 tons, also for Vancouver.

The Seattle power yacht Marlyn, with Fred Hardwick and party on board, arrived in port yesterday afternoon from the north following an Alaska cruise and continued its homeward voyage this morning. The Marlyn is well known here, having been a frequent visitor to the port in the past.
