# MAROONED RUSSIANS BEING RESCUED

## GOVERNMENT HAS DONE ITS SHARE IN SETTLING DISPUTE

### Victoria Cannot Take Further Part Now in Island Logging Strike

Good Faith Has Been Shown by Setting Minimum Wage, Minister of Labor Feels—Both Sides Must Ask For Mediation

VICTORIA, April 11: (CP)—The British Columbia government will not re-enter the logging strike in the role of mediator unless asked to do so by both sides, Hon. George S. Pearson, minister of labor, stated yesterday. The government had demonstrated its good faith by setting a minimum wage scale and settlement now rested between the two parties concerned, the minister stated.

The men have declared they will not return to work unless the operators recognize camp committees and the operators indicate that they do not intend to re-open until after the fire season is over.

The Comox Logging and Railway Co. is the only operator that has re-opened its camps.

### LOG CAMPS WORK FULL

More Men Brought to Islands by Morgan—Big Trucks for Kelley—Wireless for Allison

Logging camps on the Queen Charlotte Islands are continuing to expand their activities and what is expected to be a very busy season is already in full swing.

On the present voyage of the steamer Prince John, Elmer Palmer, logging superintendent for the J. R. Morgan Logging Co., returned to Crescent Inlet from a brief business trip to Vancouver, bringing twenty loggers north with him.

The Prince John also brought from Vancouver three large trucks to be used in transporting logs to the beach on a new road which has been built from the T. A. Kelley Logging Co.'s camp at Atli Inlet.

The A. P. Allison Logging Co.'s camp, recently moved from Queen Charlotte City to Cumshewa Inlet, is in full operation now at the latter point. A radio station has been established at the camp and is proving a great convenience.

### PROPOSAL PROTESTED

Spokane Bodies Back Up Idaho Resolution Opposing Tariff Bargaining by President

SPOKANE, April 11:—The Spokane Chamber of Commerce and the Northwest Mining Association have backed up resolutions of protest from Idaho at the move of Congress to confer upon President Franklin D. Roosevelt special tariff bargaining powers.

### BASIS FOR AGREEMENT

Sub-Committee of World Wheat Conference Makes Progress Towards Minimum Price

ROME, April 11: (CP)—The sub-committee of the world grain conference consisting of Canadian, United States, Australian and Argentine representatives last night reported progress towards reaching a basis of agreement on a minimum world price for export wheat. It was also reported that agreement had been reached that governments of nations should not engage in bartering methods in connection with wheat.

### Where 14 Perished In Relief Hostel



The little knot of people shown here are gazing into the wreckage of the federal transient relief bureau at Lynchburg, Va. A fire had been extinguished within structure which took a toll of 14 lives and injured at least 75 more. The flames started from a hot stove on a hot stove, and spread through the former furniture store that had been converted into a haven for the homeless and derelict. There were 190 lodgers in the structure when it caught fire and an even hundred of them escaped without injury.

### FAHEY CASE COMING UP

Extradition Proceedings Against Alberta Man to Commence Within Few Days

EDMONTON, April 11: (CP)—Extradition proceedings against James Fahey of Jasper, who is wanted in Omaha, Nebraska, on a twenty-four year old jail breaking charge, are expected to commence within a few days. It is alleged that Fahey, who for many years has led an exemplary life as a citizen of Alberta, escaped in 1909 from penitentiary where he was serving a term of life imprisonment for mail robbery of which he maintains he was not guilty.

According to word from Seattle one of the men who was alleged to have taken part in the mail robbery declares that Fahey never admitted that he was implicated. Two other witnesses, however, are declared to have asserted that Fahey did take part.

### STORM IN PORTUGAL

Eighty-Four Persons Lose Their Lives in Tempest on Coast

LISBON, Portugal, April 11: (CP)—Eighty-four persons lost their lives in severe storms which lashed the Portuguese coast, according to reports reaching here. At least seven boats were lost.

### TAX UPON FUEL OIL

Two-Cent Impost Being Urged on Government as Protection to Coal Mining

VICTORIA, April 11:—The British Columbia government is being urged to place a 2c per gallon tax on fuel oil as a measure of protection for the coal mining industry of the province, Hon. G. S. Pearson, minister of mines and member for the coal mining constituency of Alberni-Nanaimo, is understood to be at least one member of the government who is strongly in favor of such taxation.

### Taxation in This Province Highest

Per Capita Rate Almost Double That of Alberta—Rates in Dominion Shown

VICTORIA, April 11:—The British Columbia Taxation Association has issued figures showing that per capita taxation in British Columbia is almost double that of the next highest province in Canada. British Columbia's per capita taxation is \$23; Alberta's, \$12.34; Saskatchewan's, \$8.07, and Quebec's only \$1.20 it is shown.

OTTAWA, April 11:—The House of Commons was engaged last night in consideration of a bill under which automobile and truck driving speeds would be limited in the interests of safety of life.

### Six Persons Shot to Death in Minneapolis Home

MINNEAPOLIS, April 11:—Six persons, three adults and three children, were found shot to death in a home here yesterday.

### Thirty-Three Persons Saved From Ice Floes Yesterday; More Today

Daring Soviet Airmen Succeed in Efforts to Pick Up People Who Have Been Stranded Since February 23—Are Being Landed in Siberia

MOSCOW, April 11: (CP)—Thirty-three members of a party of eighty-three Russians who have been marooned on an ice floe in the Bering Sea since February 23 when their ship was caught in the ice were rescued by daring Russian airmen last night, according to messages received here, and early today it was expected the remaining fifty would be rescued without further delay and landed at Cape Van Karem in Siberia.

### SILVER AND COPPER ON NEW YORK MARKET

NEW YORK, April 11: (CP)—Bar silver closed at 46 3/4c per ounce on the local metal market today, being unchanged from yesterday. Copper was also unchanged at 8 1/4c to 8 1/2c per pound.

The rescue operations were carried out by flyers operating both from Nome and Siberia. The big Russian ice breaker Krassin, dispatched recently via Panama Canal to the Bering Sea to assist in the rescue operations, is expected to be ordered to return to her base in Petrograd.

### Special Powers Act is Again Discussed in Ottawa House; Bennett Demands Protection

OTTAWA, April 11: (CP)—The Dominion government must be placed in a position to "protect the functions of this federal parliament from usurpation," Premier R. B. Bennett informed the House of Commons today during debate on the unemployment relief bill. The Premier was dealing with the situation in British Columbia where special powers have been granted the provincial government.

OTTAWA, April 11: (CP)—British Columbia's Special Powers Act came in for discussion in the House of Commons again yesterday when Wilfrid Hanbury, Liberal member for Vancouver-Burrard, asked in what particular a provincial executive, clothed with such power as the British Columbia government had, could do anything a legislature could not do.

A legislature passed a statute, Prime Minister R. B. Bennett replied, and the Dominion government might disallow it. However, in the case of an executive with all the powers of a legislature, it would not pass a statute but accomplish the same result by promulgating an ordinance. A provincial executive might promulgate an ordinance that was ultra vires but there would be no federal authority to disallow it since it was not a statute.

### FORMER ASSISTANT SECRETARY OF NAVY IN STATES IS DEAD

LITTLE FALLS, N.Y., April 11: (CP)—Theodore Douglas Roberts, who was assistant secretary of the navy during the regime of the late President Calvin Coolidge, died here yesterday, a victim of pneumonia. He was a nephew of the late President Theodore Roosevelt.

### Minister of Labor Promises Federal Loans For Building Schemes to Give Employment

OTTAWA, April 11: (CP)—Hon. Wesley A. Gordon, minister of labor, promised yesterday that the government would give consideration to a scheme of lending money to provinces and municipalities to be expended in building programs for the purpose of providing employment. The government would not deal direct with the municipalities, Mr. Gordon said, but it was hoped to devise some means of giving them help in this way.

Earlier in the day Premier Bennett said he could not see when the federal building program might commence.

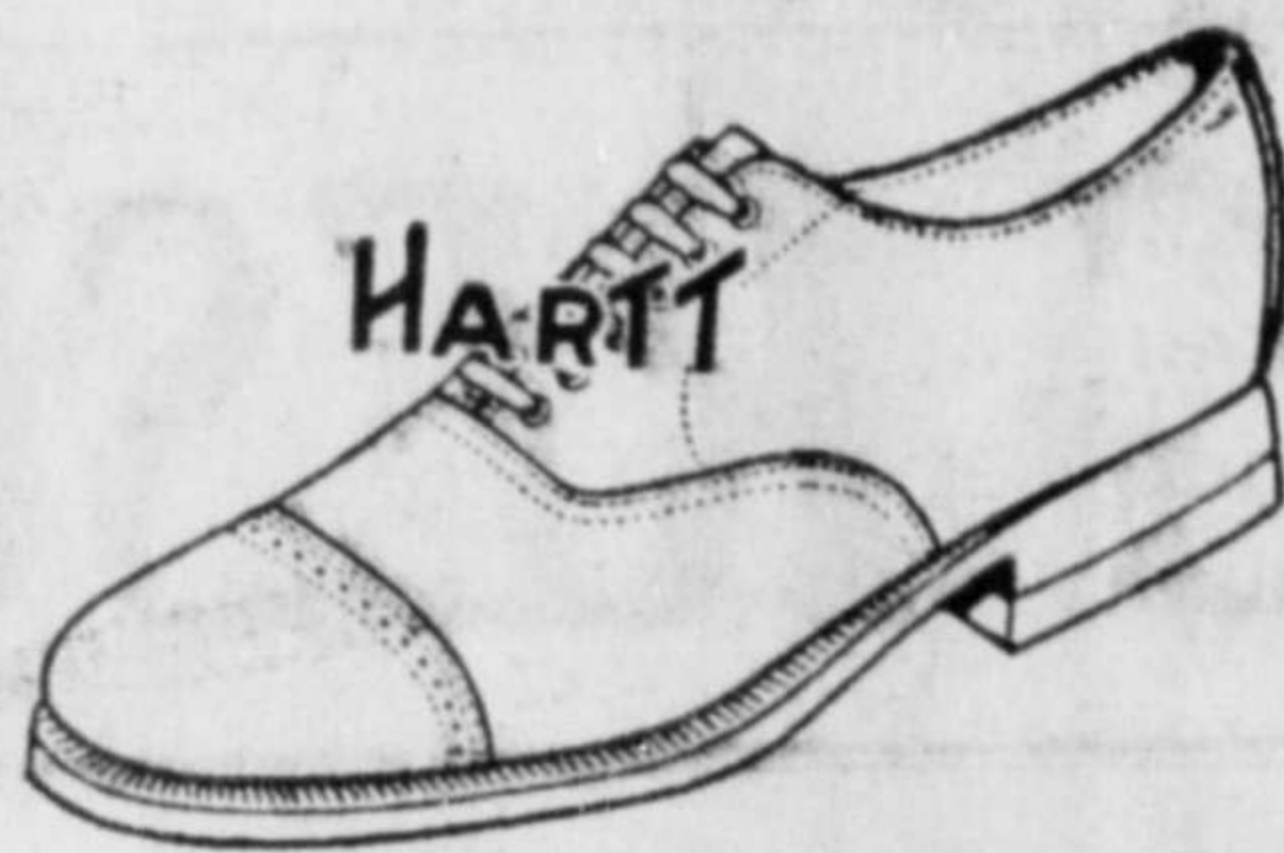

### PILLSBURY ON COMPENSATION BOARD

J. H. Pillsbury of Prince Rupert has been appointed to the Workmen's Compensation Board. While his many friends will be pleased to hear of his getting the position they will regret that it will be necessary for him to leave the city where he has lived for the past quarter of a century.

Mr. Pillsbury has had plenty of experience. He has business ability, is a good mixer and during his term in the city council he showed strong labor sympathies. As president of the Chamber of Commerce and as a member of that organization throughout his residence here he has shown great aptitude in dealing with all public questions. At the head of the dry dock organization he showed executive ability of a high order. As manager of the local stevedoring company he has had the confidence of his employees. His appointment will doubtless receive general approval, especially in Prince Rupert.

### POOR OLD INSULL

Samuel Insull is to be brought back to the United States to be tried for crimes said to have been committed during the boom days and at the time of the crash which followed. He was doing what thousands of others were doing at that time. He was playing fast and free with other people's money. Possibly he did not think there was any wrong in what he did until the collapse of the financial structure which he had reared. Then somebody had to be blamed and he was the chief manipulator.

Insull is an old man, a victim of the system. It will be sad if he dies in prison.

### SPECIAL POWERS FOR MR. BENNETT

Premier Bennett is asking for special powers to deal with unemployment relief. If he is given these he can sit down at a table with Premier Pattullo and the other Premiers and discuss the affairs of British Columbia and arrive at a settlement if he thinks it desirable. While his powers will not go as far as those conferred on the B. C. premier they will be important. Incidentally it will be noted that the Liberal leader at Ottawa is opposing the granting of those powers.

### TERRACE

The Easter week-end proved uncomfortable as far as the weather was concerned. Cold rain and gusty winds as well as flurries of snow dashed the hopes of the local gardeners as they resumed work on their wood piles.

Terrace Board of Trade held its monthly meeting. A good deal of unfinished business was cleared off the slate and a program for next month arranged.

## NEW BODY IS FORMED

Prince Rupert Horticultural Society Comes Into Being Here

At a meeting of those interested in gardening in Prince Rupert last night in the City Hall, it was decided to organize "The Prince Rupert Horticultural Society." Officers for the year were elected and a number of brief speeches were made after which those interested in rose bush importation formed a circle and chose varieties they thought most suitable for local gardens. In this they received the expert advice of F. J. Fuller, who is a member of the Ontario Rose Society and is familiar with a number of the newer varieties. An order of 1,000 bushes was decided upon, the price to be \$180.

Officers chosen were: President, H. F. Pullen. Vice-president, Frank Dibb. Secretary, Charles V. Eviitt. Executive Committee—T. Silversides, Horace Duhamel, Commissioner W. J. Alder, W. M. Brown, Theo Collart and Foster Willan.

The membership fee was set at 50c per year.

Among those making suggestions were Dr. and Mrs. J. T. Mandy who urged that a flower emblem be chosen for the city. If it was decided that this emblem should be the rose it would help to remove the unhappy stigma on the city as being a city of rain.

Dr. Mandy suggested that a strong canvass be made for membership and he saw a great sphere of usefulness in their new organization.

Frank Dibb urged that the main work of the organization should be of an educational nature, particularly in the way of collating and passing on information which would be of use to the members and to citizens generally in regard to what to do and what not to do in the garden.

W. M. Brown, who, it was mentioned, had been very successful with his own roses in his garden on Graham Avenue, stated that he had lost scarcely any bushes. He had his land well drained. Then he dug a hole about three feet deep, put a foot of manure at the bottom and covered it with earth. The bushes were planted in the hole about this. In winter he heaped earth around the roots of the trees to a depth of six to nine inches.

T. W. Silversides outlined a number of the activities in which the society might engage, the great feature being the dissemination of information in regard to local possibilities. They could prevent people trying to grow zinnias which would not grow here. They could encourage the planting of lilacs and mountain ash and other shrubs suitable to the soil and climate.

The question of whether or not the society shall stage a rose show this year is left for discussion at the next general meeting.

## WILL ORDER 1,000 ROSES

Newly Formed Horticultural Society Opens Its Activities by Deciding to Import Trees

The newly formed Prince Rupert Horticultural Society, at its organization meeting last night, decided to order from a Vancouver Island grower a thousand rose trees, the cost to be 18 cents a tree. At the meeting the number of orders for roses was brought up to more than 700 and it was the opinion that there would be no great difficulty in securing orders for the remainder before tomorrow. These will be allotted in the order in which they are received and orders not placed in good time for mailing may have to be ignored.

C. V. Eviitt, secretary of the society, is making up the order and telephone orders for roses may be sent to him or to the Daily News.

The price of the roses is 18 cents net at Victoria and it is probable that the freight may be absorbed by the society. While it is not obligatory, those who take advantage of the offer will have an opportunity to join the society, the fee for membership in which is 50 cents. This is purely optional, the importation of the roses being a public service to the city.

Many of the roses ordered are rated among the newer originations, winners of gold medals and listed at 75 cents each. Most of the old favorites are missing from the list.
