NEW ATLANTIC OCEAN FLIGHT IS ON EAST PRAIRIES LASHED BY RAIN AND ELECTRIC STORMS

Ayling and Reid Hop Off Today From Lake Ontario For Bagdad

Weather Reported Favorable Throughout Route of Long Hop of 6300 Miles—Plane Passed Quebec in Four and a Half Hours

WASAGA BEACH, Ont., Aug. 8: (CP)—On a projected 6300-mile flight to Bagdad, Iraq, James Ayling and Leonard Reid hopped off at 6:30 this morning in a twin-motored biplane "Trail of the Caribou." Weather was reported favorable all across the Atlantic Ocean. The plane passed over Quebec at 11 a.m. daylight time.

Hapsburg Restoration May Be Next Move in Austria



An exiled royal family, the former Empress Zita and her eight children, were pictured at Steenockerzeel castle. The royal hopes of this family are vested in the 21-year old Archduke Otto, extreme left, who is being groomed as claimant for the throne vacated by his father, the late Emperor Karl, according to observers of monarchist activities in Austria. The monarchists are said to be planning a coup in his favor. Archduke Otto has just left Steenockerzeel presumably for Italy where it is reported he will press suit for the hand of Princess Maria, youngest daughter of King Victor Emmanuel.

Three Men Are Killed By Lightning While At Work in Wheat Fields

Middle West States Report Heat Wave Unabated With Temperatures of Over One Hundred Degrees—Manitoba and Saskatchewan Get Moisture

WINNIPEG, Aug. 8: (CP)—Wild electrical storms followed by rain of torrential proportions in some sections lashed the arid areas of Manitoba and parts of Saskatchewan last night. Three men were killed by lightning while working in the fields.

From the Middle West of the United States last night came reports of temperatures of well over 100 degrees in Iowa and other agricultural states as the heat wave continued unabated.

IS LEFT FORTUNE

John F. Gallagher Leaves Toronto To Collect \$500,000 Left Him By Aunt If He Settles Down

To Clear Self

Served Ten Years in Alberta On Arson Charge and Sentenced To Hang But Later Freed

TORONTO, Aug. 8: (CP)—John F. Gallagher, convicted in 1922 of the murder of John G. Coward in Alberta, sentenced to be hanged and later acquitted, left here yesterday for England to claim a fortune of \$500,000 which an aunt, who died three months ago, promised him if he settled down and married before December 25, 1933. Gallagher had been living for the past three months in Toronto under an assumed name.

Gallagher served a ten year prison term for arson in connection with the burning of his home in Alberta. He says he will use part of the fortune in an effort to establish his innocence on the arson charge and to bring to justice the murderers of Coward and I. Fuller, friends and neighbors in Carbon, Alta., both of whom were killed within a year.

CHILE TO JOIN WAR?

Spread of South American Conflict Seen in Withdrawal of Diplomatic Representatives

SANTIAGO, Chile, Aug. 8:—The possibility of Chile joining with Bolivia against Paraguay in the war over the Gran Chaco territorial dispute was seen yesterday with the withdrawal of diplomatic representatives between the two republics. Whether diplomatic relations were being broken off or merely the respective representatives changed did not seem to be clear. Chile is known to have been in sympathy with Bolivia in the dispute.

SERVICE IS IMPRESSIVE

Colorful Ceremony in Connection With Canadian Corps Reunion in Toronto

TORONTO, Aug. 8:—A drumhead divine service in connection with the Canadian Corps reunion was a colorful ceremony. Fifty thousand Great War veterans and 200,000 spectators took part in the service which was attended by many distinguished visitors including Admiral of the Fleet Tyrwhitt and Viscount Field Marshal Lord Allenby.

Negotiations Are Denied By United States Secretary

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 8:—Secretary of State Cordell Hull denies reports that the United States and Great Britain have been in negotiation looking for a possible united front in the Pacific after next year's naval conference.

Is Put To Death For Taking Part In Assassination

VIENNA, Aug. 8:—Ernest Felke was hanged on the gallows here last night for participating in the putsch last month in which Chancellor Englebert Dolfuss was slain.

Pattullo Is Hopeful Yet Of Work Plan

VICTORIA, Aug. 8:—Premier T. D. Pattullo announced yesterday that he was still negotiating with Ottawa for a loan of \$5,000,000 with which to put into operation his "work and wages" program and that he had strong hopes of being successful in getting the loan.

ELECTED BY ACCLAMATION

Peter Heenan Enters Ontario Legislature Without Opposition, Being Named Minister

KENORA, Ont., Aug. 8:—Hon. Peter Heenan, minister of lands and forests in the cabinet of Premier Mitchell F. Heppburn, was last evening elected by acclamation to the provincial house for Kenora-Rainy River, there being no other nominations for the by-election. He was formerly federal minister of labor.

PREMIER MACDONALD ENDS CANADA VISIT OFF TO NEWFOUNDLAND

HALIFAX, Aug. 8:—Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald of Great Britain and his daughter, Miss Isabel MacDonald, ended their vacation in Nova Scotia and Canada today when they sailed for Newfoundland where they will spend a week before proceeding home to England. The Premier is greatly improved in health.

VON PAPEN ACCEPTED

VIENNA, Aug. 8:—Chancellor Schuschnigg announced yesterday that Franz von Papen had been formally accepted by the Austrian government as ambassador extraordinary of Germany to Vienna.

AN UNPRECEDENTED INCIDENT

Evidently the relations between Hon. H. H. Stevens and Premier Bennett have not improved very greatly of late. The minister of trade and commerce has been making serious attacks on the big business people who have usually backed the Conservative party. He has brought out a number of pertinent facts in connection with the conduct of a good many lines of business including the mail order business. He has showed up the sweat shop methods that have been employed, his committee of inquiry being the centre of interesting news during the last session of Parliament at Ottawa.

The session over an dhdoliday time having arrived, Mr. Stevens, instead of retiring to the seaside or spending his time on the banks of a fishing stream, sets to work to summarize the mass of evidence which had been recorded and gave his impressions of the same. This summary, running into some seven thousand words, was mimeographed into a booklet and was used as the text for an address before a parliamentary study club and copies were distributed.

Word was carried to the Premier of what his minister of trade and commerce was doing and the fat was in the fire. The booklet was condemned, ordered withdrawn from publication and the copies on hand destroyed. In other words the minister of trade and commerce was publicly spanked for his audacity and he seems to have taken it as a deserved punishment and is carrying on.

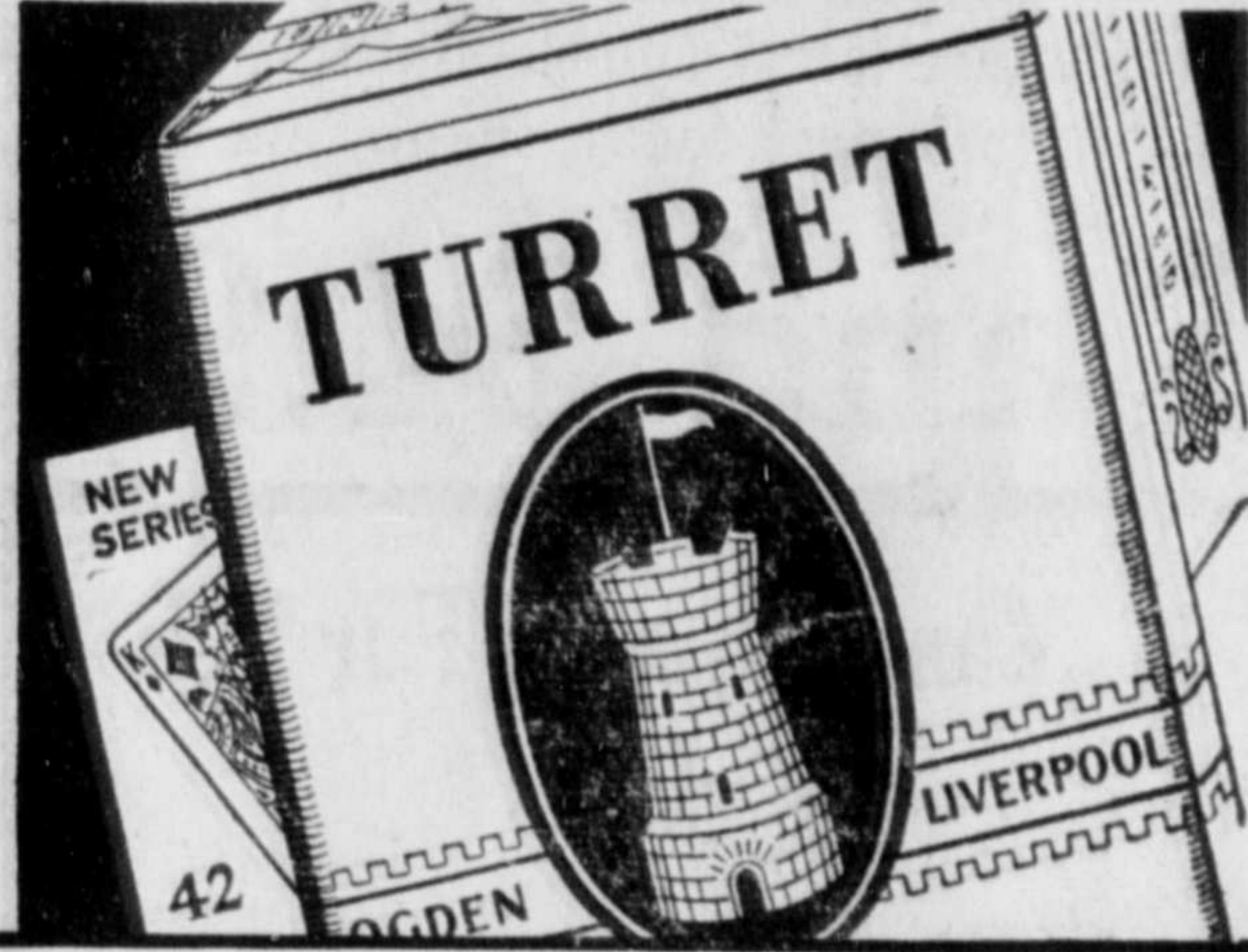

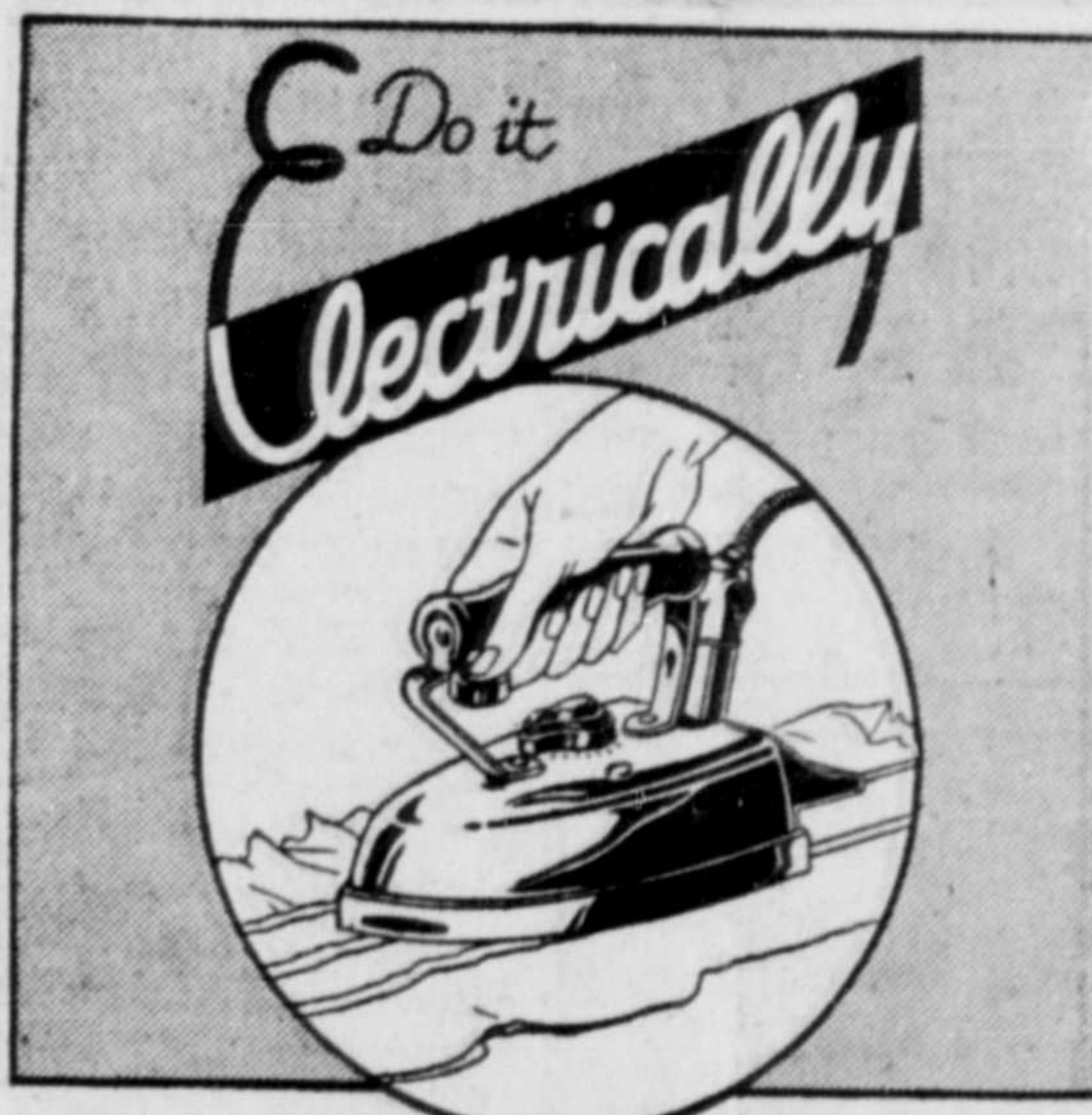
