### HOW IS THE TRAIN?

How is the train? Is she on time? When is the boat due to arrive? These are common questions showing how much we depend upon our transportation systems. We look for the mail. We expect our milk to arrive from the interior. We want fresh vegetables and meat. We must send our fish to market in New York, Chicago or Montreal. Our very life as a commercial city depends upon our connections with the outside. If there is a hitch in the working of the systems we find our routine life upset and must readapt ourselves to a new condition.

We are told there is a deficit on our railway operations but that affects us very little. What is of moment to us is that we get a good service. Usually we get it but the forces of nature sometimes upset our calculations.

### POSITION OF JAPAN

One of the interesting despatches published this week was that which came through on the wire Wednesday which credited Japan with taking upon herself the responsibility for the peace of East Asia, particularly of re-

senting any foreign interference in China. Many years ago the United States issued a statement through President Monroe in which it was declared that the government of that country would not allow the seizure of territory on the American continent by any European or other country. This doctrine in the time of Presiident Cleveland almost led to war with Great Britain when the British took military action in Venezuela. Now it seems that Japan has gone one step further and is taking objection to other nations taking any action which would help Chinese air and military forces.

This is an assertion of the power and influence of Japan which is very important and which is bound to have an important effect on the action of western countries, none of whom will be anxious to pick a quarrel with the Japan-
