SOME LOGGERS RETURNING TO WORK DISSENSION IN FEDERAL GOVERNMENT OVER GOLD TAX

Industrial Relations Board Instrumental In Settling Disputes

Eight Hundred Men Have Returned to Work in Timber Industry Since it Started Functioning—Fifteen Hundred Are Still on Strike

VANCOUVER, April 20: (CP)—Eight hundred loggers have been re-employed in six camps since the Board of Industrial Relations established the new minimum wage scale while it is estimated that 1500 are still remaining on strike.

There have been conferences in the United States capital during the past few days aimed towards getting under way international discussions on the subject.

LEADER IS CRITICAL

Marketing Act Unconstitutional Mackenzie King Declares

OTTAWA, April 20: (CP)—"Unconstitutional from beginning to end" was the description applied in the House of Commons Thursday night to the government's marketing bill by Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Opposition.

Mr. King proposed an amendment to second reading which, if adopted, would kill the bill. The debate is proceeding.

Prairie Hospital Destroyed by Fire

No Insurance on Institution in Saskatchewan Which Was Burned With Loss of \$50,000

REGINA, Sask., April 20:—Western Canada's first rural public hospital built at Willow Bunch in Southwest Saskatchewan was destroyed by fire yesterday with loss of \$50,000. There was no insurance.

Reich Takes Over Complete Control Of Aerial Affairs

BERLIN, April 20:—Commercial and civil aviation administrations in individual German states have been abolished and a uniform Reich aviation department has been created.

British Pound and Canadian Dollar on New York Exchange

MONTREAL, April 20:—The British pound sterling was trading at \$5.13 1/4 on the local foreign exchange market yesterday afternoon and the American dollar at 99 23-32c.

CONFIRMS ATTITUDE

British Ambassador Substantiates Press Reports in Regard to Jap Policy in Far East Affairs

LONDON, April 20:—The British government received a cable yesterday from its ambassador to Tokyo concerning Japan's warning to other countries against projects for assistance to China, the note confirming the gist of press reports as to Japan's objection to western nations interfering in the Far East.

PHYSICIAN SENTENCED

PERTH, Ont., April 20: (CP)—Dr. Wilton Pratt, 71-year old Smith's Falls physician, was acquitted yesterday on a charge of murdering his housekeeper, Miss Eva Elizabeth McLean.

Dr. Pratt, having pleaded guilty, however, to ten charges of performing illegal operations, was sentenced to five years' imprisonment in penitentiary.

Thieves Disturbed In Prince George Store by Officers

Police officers at Prince George on April 11 disturbed thieves who were engaged in removing butter, ham, eggs, etc. from the Sterling Market butcher shop in that town, the culprits making their getaway but leaving the goods piled up in the lane to the rear of the store. All the goods which had been removed were accounted for and the police are working on clues which may lead to the arrest of the burglars.

OTTAWA, April 20:—Hon. Wesley A. Gordon, minister of mines and labor, complained vigorously and bitterly yesterday that he had not been consulted by the minister of finance, Hon. E. N. Rhodes, before decision had been made, as provided for in the budget, to impose the new ten percent tax on gold.

Wheat Quota Loan Offered By Parley

Canada, United States and Australia Would Give Thirty Million Bushels to Argentina

ROME, April 20:—Delegates to the Rome meeting of the world wheat advisory commission from Canada, United States and Australia offered Argentina a wheat quota loan of 30,000,000 bushels to be repaid in one or two years, it is announced.

HOW IS THE TRAIN?

How is the train? Is she on time? When is the boat due to arrive? These are common questions showing how much we depend upon our transportation systems. We look for the mail. We expect our milk to arrive from the interior. We want fresh vegetables and meat. We must send our fish to market in New York, Chicago or Montreal. Our very life as a commercial city depends upon our connections with the outside. If there is a hitch in the working of the systems we find our routine life upset and must readapt ourselves to a new condition.

We are told there is a deficit on our railway operations but that affects us very little. What is of moment to us is that we get a good service. Usually we get it but the forces of nature sometimes upset our calculations.

POSITION OF JAPAN

One of the interesting despatches published this week was that which came through on the wire Wednesday which credited Japan with taking upon herself the responsibility for the peace of East Asia, particularly of resenting any foreign interference in China.

Many years ago the United States issued a statement through President Monroe in which it was declared that the government of that country would not allow the seizure of territory on the American continent by any European or other country. This doctrine in the time of President Cleveland almost led to war with Great Britain when the British took military action in Venezuela. Now it seems that Japan has gone one step further and is taking objection to other nations taking any action which would help Chinese air and military forces.

This is an assertion of the power and influence of Japan which is very important and which is bound to have an important effect on the action of western countries, none of whom will be anxious to pick a quarrel with the Japanese.

TOLD ABOUT RECENT TRIP

Ed. Lipsett of Vancouver Interesting Speaker at Rotary Club Luncheon

In Central America poverty and wealth exist side by side, the one intensifying the other. The person who is born poor remains poor. The poor are peons who wear scarcely any clothing, live in hovels and do

all the work. They seem happy. Depression or prosperity mean nothing to them. This was some of the information given the Rotary Club by Ed. Lipsett of Vancouver at the luncheon yesterday afternoon, John Dybhavn presiding.

Mr. Lipsett spoke in that delightfully humorous vein for which he is noted. It was a rambling talk on a trip he and Mrs. Lipsett made to ports down the coast during the winter in the course of which they visited San Francisco, Los Angeles, Mazatlan, Guatemala, San Salvador and other places. He told of the

wonderful improvements made at the United States ports and of the oddities and peculiarities of the Mexican and Central American cities. He mentioned the old monasteries and churches, now decayed, the fertility of the tropical soil and told much of the habits of the people.

At the close Mr. Dybhavn thanked the speaker for his extremely interesting talk.

Visitors at the luncheon were, besides the speaker, F. A. MacCallum and F. E. Robertson.

Largest Payment Of Its Kind Ever Taken at Ottawa

OTTAWA, April 20:—The \$5400 payment of "conscience money" made in a bank draft received from Montreal by the Department of National Revenue is the largest amount ever received by the government in such a manner, it was stated yesterday by Hon. R. C. Mat-

thews, minister of the department. "Conscience payments" have been occasionally received by the government in the past but never before was there one so large.

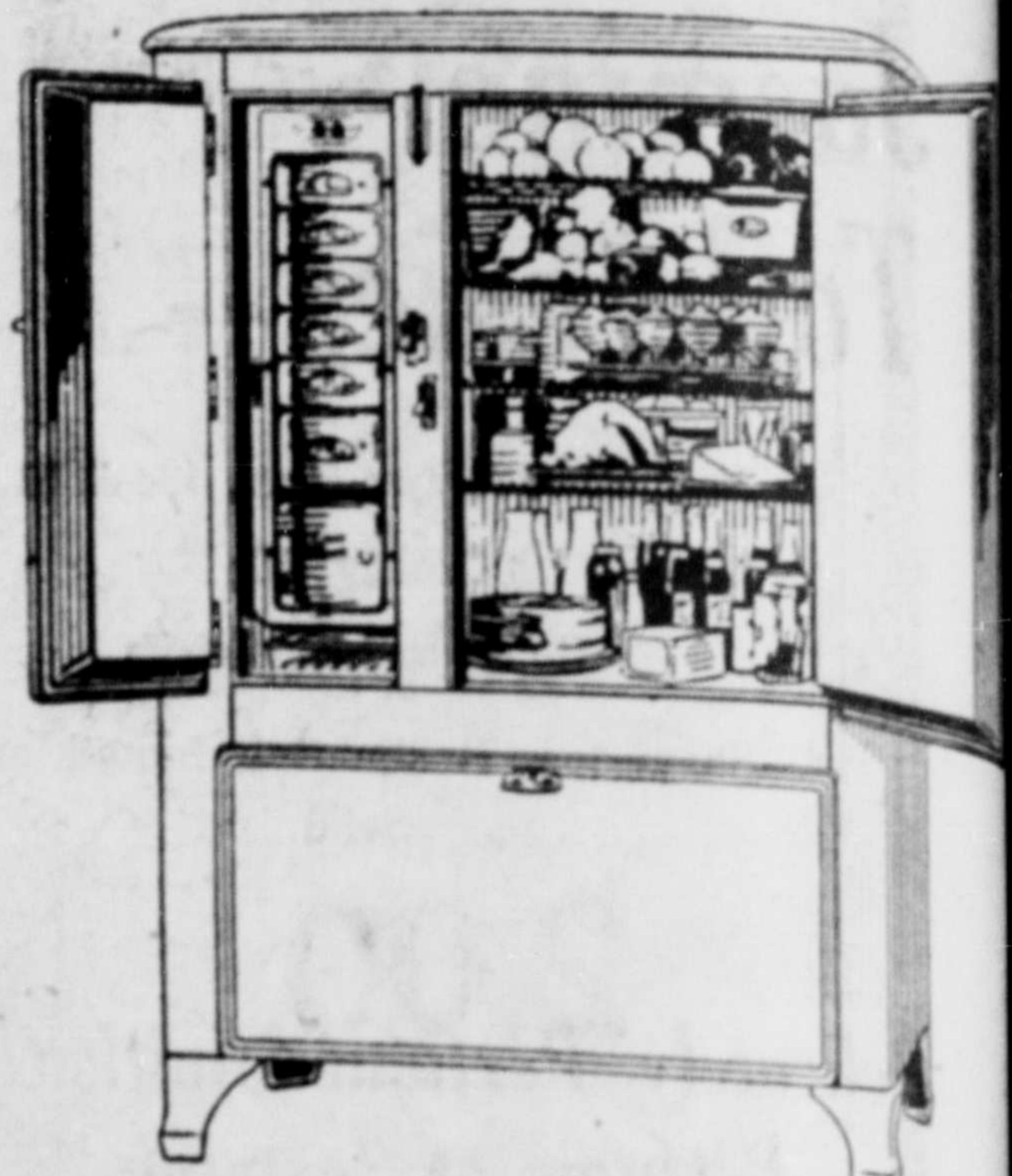
Dave Komonen of Sudbury Victor Out of Field of Two Hundred in Boston Marathon

Hundreds of Sparrows and Finches Beat Themselves Against Triple Island Light

Sometimes the Triple Island lighthouse wharf is fairly littered with dead birds, mostly sparrows and finches, which have beaten themselves against the light in their night flights, states T. Westhead, of the Triple Island light, who is in the city.

It is during the northward flight in the spring and the southward flight in the fall that tragedy ends their lives at a place which is kept up for the protection of shipping.

Triple Island has one of three radio beacons for aiding shipping in foggy weather or on dark nights. It sends out signals every hour in normal times and continuously in foggy weather. Langara and Dead Tree stations have similar beacons and the exact position of a boat can be ascertained if equipped with apparatus for making use of the signals.
