## **PROTEST** IS MADE

Countermand New Scavenging Service Fee Here

## Meeting Held

Ratepayers and Householders Feel That They Are Already Paying For Collection

At a meeting of east end ratepayers and householders in Rupert East United Church Hall last evening it was decided to send a petition to Premier T. D. Pattullo urging his intervention and countermand of a bylaw which has been put into efect by City Commissioner W. J. Alder imposing a monthly charge of \$1, with 25c discount for prompt payment, for nightsoil collection service. The petition is now being circulated and will be forwarded to Victoria by the end of this week. There will also be an interview with the Premier on the subject on the occasion of his forthcoming visit to the city.

The meeting followed a recent ultimatum sent out by the City Commissioner to persons affected demanding that they pay up arrears under the new impost by September 15 on pain of having pro-DESCRIBED ceedings instituted against them in event of failure to do so. Thomas Elliott was voted to the chair and took charge of the meeting. Various speakers protested emphatically at the new charge, holding that it was

> unfair, unjustified and excessive. One of the principal speakers of the evening was Ex-Ald. James Black who declared that ratepayers and householders receiving the scavenging service were already paying for same by contributing in general taxation to maintenance of the Section One sewerage system and intersections on other systems as well as by a ten cent increase which had been added a year and a half ago to the monthly general garbage fees designed specifically to cover the cost of nightsoil collection and which had never been rescinded. Now the new service harge had been imposed. Mr. Black claimed that the garbage and scavenging service was being operated with a large profit and it was unfair that a new fee should be imposed upon people many of whom could not afford to pay it. Mr. Black also felt that people using the service should receive some benefit in the way of reduced fees from the annual telephone department surplus of \$11,000.

Mr. Elliott stated that, if he were forced to pay the new scavenging fee, he intended to have his telephone removed and urged others to do the same. This might have some effect on the commissioner.

## THE TEXTILE WORKERS' STRIKE

With 17 men dead and many injured as a result of disorders in connection with the dispute, the textile workers' has there. strike takes on the complexion of the most serious of the numerous conflicts with which the United States has been beset during the past year or so since the NRA went into operation. 
