FIGHT FOR PUBLICLY OWNED BANK

GEN. McRAE URGES CANADA TO WITHDRAW FROM LEAGUE

Vancouver Senator Predicts European War Within Five Years

Declares That Geneva Has Failed in Principal Objective Of Ensuring Peace—Versailles Treaty But Provoking Conflict—Dandurand Appeals to U.S.

OTTAWA, Feb. 2: (CP)—League of Nations affairs, disarmament and the European situation have been much to the fore in the Senate during the past couple of days. Something of a sensation was created yesterday by Senator A. D. McRae of Vancouver who, in speaking in the Red Chamber, declared that another European war within five years was a certainty and urged that Canada withdraw from the League of Nations which had failed in its main objective of ensuring permanent peace in Europe.

Senator Raoul Dandurand, also speaking in the Upper Chamber, appealed to the United States to join the League of Nations. The famous elder statesman told how soon after the last presidential election, he had urged President Franklin D. Roosevelt to have his country join the League. Without the United States, Senator Dandurand declared, the League could never have proper effectiveness.

PRESIDENT OF UNION

Thomas Love New Municipalities Head—Mortgage Moratorium Extension

VICTORIA, Feb. 2.—Mayor Thomas A. Love of Grand Forks was elected president of the Union of British Columbia Municipalities at the close of the annual convention here.

P. R. F. Sewell of Saanich was elected secretary-treasurer of the Union in succession to Hon. A. Wells Gray, now minister of lands and municipalities.

The next convention of the union will be held in Kamloops, it was decided.

Before the close of the convention members of the cabinet met with the union and Hon. John Hart, minister of finance and acting premier, promised to lay its representations before Premier T. D. Pattullo, stating that "something will be done for the municipalities if at all possible."

Extension of mortgage moratorium legislation to include interest as well as principal within the discretion of judges was asked for in a resolution adopted by the union.

NEW COLD STORAGE IS INCORPORATED

VICTORIA, Feb. 2: (CP)—Provincial incorporations announced this week include the Northern Fisheries Cold Storage Ltd. of Prince Rupert with a capitalization of \$60,000. The company has been formed in connection with a new ice manufacturing and cold storage plant which has been established at Prince Rupert under organization of M. P. McCaffery.



CURTAILING OF FISHING

Plan of Halibut Fishing Vessel Owners' Association is Adopted At Ketchikan

KETCHIKAN, Feb. 2: (CP)—The Fishing Vessel Owners' Association yesterday agreed to a halibut fishing curtailment plan presented by Harold Lokken of Seattle, manager of the Association.

The curtailment lay-out plan allows Seattle halibut boats three thousand pounds per man, Ketchikan boats 3500 pounds and western boats four thousand pounds to offset price differences for the fish.

Following the conference here, Mr. Lokken left for Petersburg and Juneau to offer the plan there.

HON. ROBERT FORKE DIES IN WINNIPEG

He made his home at Pipestone, Man., where he had engaged in farming for many years. He was a former leader of the Progressive Party and later minister of immigration in the Liberal government of Canada. He had been a member of the Senate since 1929.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 2:—Justice Department officials indicated yesterday that no evidence had been found so far tending to link Verna Sankey, 42-year old rancher, with the Lindbergh kidnapping.

OFF TO SIOUX FALLS

CHICAGO, Feb. 2:—Verne Sankey, notorious bandit "Public Enemy No. 1 and former Canadian railway employee at Melville, Sask., who has long been sought by the police in connection with kidnappings and other crimes throughout the country, was finally arrested Wednesday by federal officers without a struggle in a barber shop here.

Following his capture, Denver, Colo., authorities took immediate steps to extradite him to face trial on a charge of kidnapping Charles Boettcher II and Sankey, waiving extradition proceedings at a brief hearing, was soon on his way to Sioux Falls, S.D. Sankey has already admitted staging two sensational kidnappings, it is said by police, but has denied knowledge of kidnapping little Charles A. Lindbergh Jr.

The central bank to be established under the legislation as proposed by the government would not deal direct with the people, it is stated, but rather with the chartered banks and the government. It would not finance the Canadian wheat crop and would have the power to issue currency up to \$100,000,000. It is being said in circles close to the government that further important fiscal legislation may be introduced at the present session. This is taken to refer to refunding measures.

HEALTH INSURANCE

While we agree with Dr. Weir that, if the Federal Government does not undertake to establish a system of health insurance the province should do so, we think it would be far preferable for the Dominion to act. Similar conditions exist in all the provinces and all should be parties to changes of this kind. The advantage in having the province start the plan is that the other provinces and the Dominion Government will be bound to follow sooner or later. It has to start somewhere and British Columbia has had the honor of starting most of the social reforms so far in force.

MR. HUNGERFORD AND RAILWAYS

S. J. Hungerford is now appointed permanently to the position of president of the Canadian National Railways. Since his appointment as acting president, following the resignation of Sir Henry Thornton he has had a difficult and unpleasant task. It has been necessary to cut down the expenditures in all departments and he has done it, although often at great sacrifice to the employees. Now it is to be hoped that the period of cutting has ceased.

There have been rumors that the president planned to remove the superintendent from Prince Rupert and that other employees would have to go. We hope these rumors are not true but that those recently dismissed from the service will be reinstated at the earliest possible time. If the morale of the railway service is to be maintained the employees must feel that they are being justly treated and many are not feeling that way today.

As we have already said, these have been difficult times but an era of improvement is not far distant and we shall hope to see the railways busy in the near future. Then, doubtless, all the railwaymen will return to their positions.
