UNITED STATES CONGRESS IS OPENED

ALASKANS TOLD THEY ARE STILL UNDER VOLSTEAD ACT

President Roosevelt Makes No Legislative Recommendation Today

Chief Executive of United States, in Message, Deals With Recovery Program and Progress Made During Last Six Months

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 3: (CP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt, in a message at the opening of the session of United States Congress today, refrained from specific recommendations of legislation but dealt with the economic recovery program and progress during the last six months. The President, apparently, plans to deal later with the exact legislation he proposes to recommend.

Reviewing his stewardship, the chief executive referred to the gold recovery monetary program, having the twofold purpose of "strengthening the whole financial structure and of arriving eventually at a medium of exchange which will have less variable purchasing and debt paying power for our people."

Peter Lakie, who has been appointed District Freight and Passenger Agent, Prince Rupert, for the Canadian National Railways. He is a native of Winnipeg and entered the service of the Canadian Northern Railway at Winnipeg in 1904, occupying various positions in the General Freight Office there until September 1915, when he went overseas with his regiment, the 90th (Winnipeg Rifles) and served overseas with the 78th Battalion. He was demobilized in 1919 and re-entered the General Freight Department of the Canadian National Railways at Winnipeg. He was transferred to Vancouver in 1920 to the position of Chief Clerk in the General Freight Department, which position he has occupied until the present time. At Prince Rupert he succeeds H. McEwen, who is being transferred to Brandon, Man. Mr. Lakie arrived this morning on the Prince Rupert from Vancouver to assume his new duties. His wife will be here later.

IS OFF FOR TRIP WEST

Premier Bennett Leaves Ottawa For Calgary and Vancouver

OTTAWA, Jan. 3: (CP)—It was learned today that Prime Minister R. B. Bennett plans to leave tonight on a trip to Calgary and Vancouver, intending to be back in Ottawa within two weeks in time for the interprovincial conference.

OTTAWA, January 3 (Canadian Press)—The projected trip of Premier R. B. Bennett to Calgary and possibly to Vancouver was not decided yesterday and it seemed doubtful if he would make the trip in view of the approaching Dominion-provincial conference.

PASSING OF BARRISTER

Clarence Wilton Bradshaw, Well Known Victoria Lawyer, Dead At Age of Seventy-Six

VICTORIA, Jan. 3: (CP)—Clarence Wilton Bradshaw B.A., well known barrister, is dead here at the age of seventy-six years.

Born at Bequec, P.E.I., August 27, 1857, the late Mr. Bradshaw was educated at Acadia University and was called to the Manitoba bar in 1886, practising in Winnipeg from then until 1907 when he moved to Victoria, being called to the British Columbia bar in 1908 since which time he practised in Victoria.

Mr. Bradshaw was married to Miss Ruth McLaren in 1897 and they had two daughters. Deceased's recreation was motorboating.

BIG FIRES IN SCHOOLS

THREE RIVERS, Que., Jan. 3: (CP)—Fire in St. Phillippe's Convent here on Saturday threatened to destroy the institution completely and, as it was, did \$80,000 damage. Several hundred girl inmates were away at their home for Christmas at the time. Fifty below zero weather prevailed at the time of the fire.

Beer Exceeding 3.2 Percent and Spirits Illegal in Territory

Any Shipments of Such Beverages Are Subject to Seizure And Confiscation, District Attorney Kehoe Announces

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Jan. 3: (CP)—United States District Attorney Joseph W. Kehoe yesterday warned Pacific Coast shippers and Alaskan dealers that the Volstead Act is still effective in Alaska and that any shipments of beer exceeding 3.2 percent strength or spirits into the territory are subject to seizure and confiscation.

DEATH OF MINISTER

Hon. E. A. Dunlop, Provincial Secretary of Ontario, Passes Away

TORONTO, Jan. 3: (CP)—Edward Arunah Dunlop, provincial treasurer for Ontario and president of Dunlop & Co. Ltd., wholesale hardware dealers, passed away here on Monday following a serious illness from which it had been realized for a few days previous he had little chance of recovery. The late Mr. Dunlop was one of Ontario's most prominent businessmen and industrialists and, in addition to Dunlop & Co. Ltd., he was president of the Pembroke Lumber Co., the Steel Equipment Co., and the Pembroke Electric Light Co. He was vice-president of the Thomas Pink Co. Ltd., and the Jocko River Improvement Co. Ltd. and director of the Pembroke Woolen Mills Ltd., Massey Lumber Co. Ltd., Canadian Electrical Association, Pembroke Southern Railway, Continental Bag & Paper Co. Ltd., and Canadian Lumbermen's Association.

Born at Pembroke, Ont., October 26, 1876, he was educated in that city and began his business career as a clerk for Dunlop & Chapman in 1892. In 1897 he took charge of the business, changing the name to Dunlop & Co. He declined nomination to the Ontario Legislature for North Renfrew in 1899 but was elected at a by-election in 1903. He was re-elected in 1905, declined nomination in 1908, was re-elected in 1911 and 1914 and had been a prominent figure in provincial politics ever since that time, eventually being called upon for cabinet service. He also served as councillor for the city of Pembroke for five years.

Mr. Dunlop was connected as an officer with the 42nd Regiment of the Canadian Militia since 1897. He married Miss Mabel Ferguson at Beamsville, Ont., in 1908 and they had three daughters. He was a Conservative and a member of the Presbyterian Church.

At Skagway while the vessel was there it was 26 below zero with a bitter fifty-mile gale roaring down White Pass into Lynn Canal. In White Pass at Summit it was 43 below zero and, owing to the cold, no trains had been able to run since before Christmas.

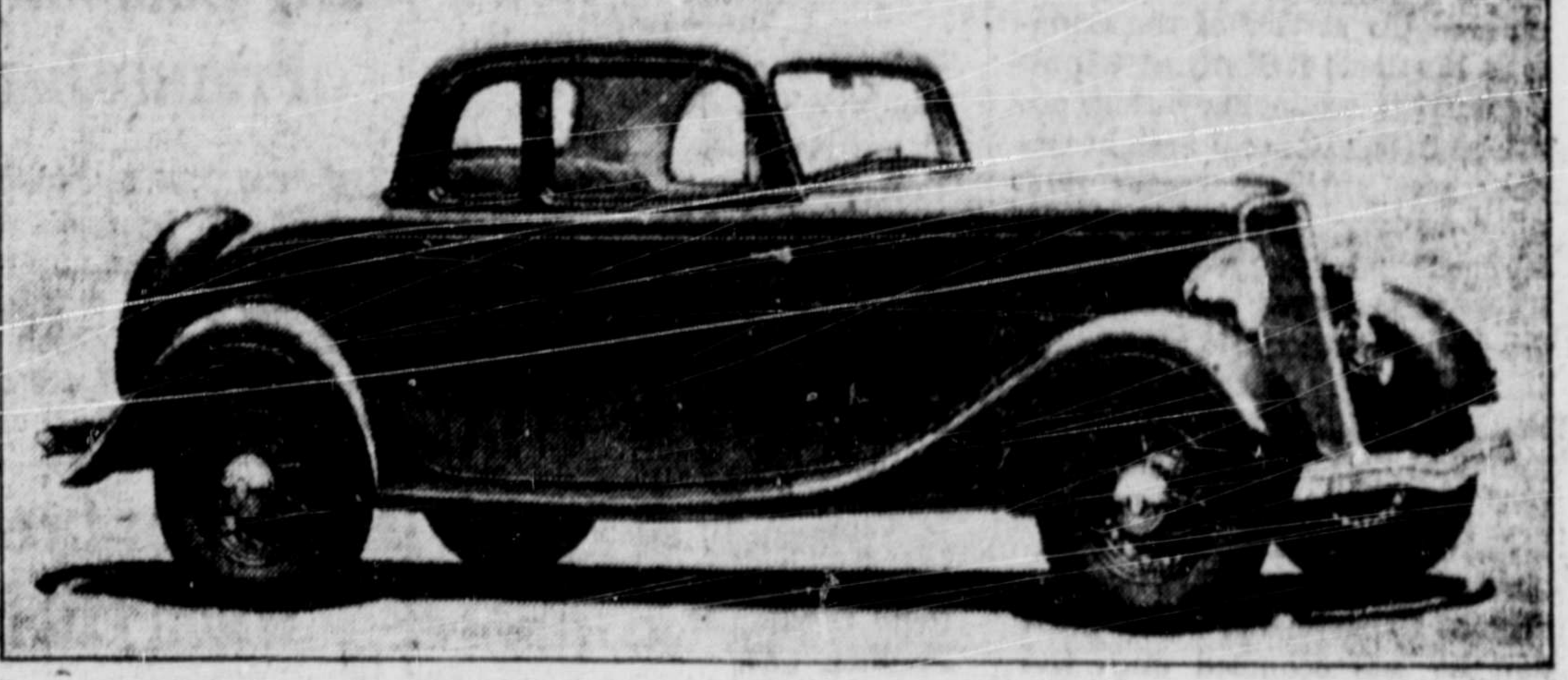

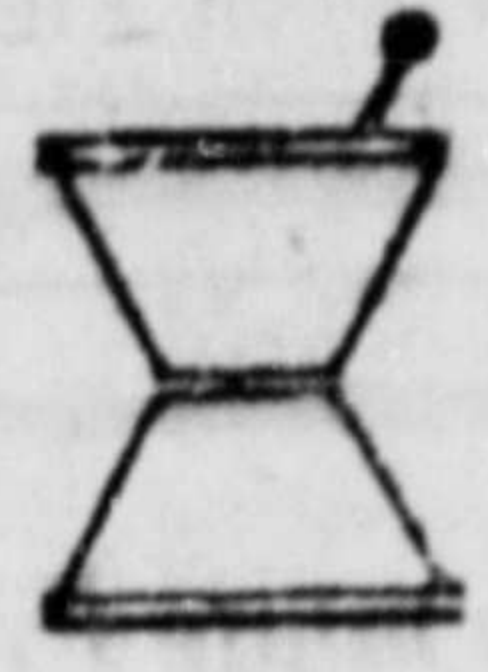

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Former Master of Newington Dead

Further Particulars of Death of Capt. W. L. Butler Contained In Private Advices

Private advices received in the city confirm the announcement published in the Daily News last week of the death of William Laurence Butler, former skipper of lighthouse tender Newington until his vision failed in 1924 after which time he remained with the vessel as watchman until the summer of 1932 when his health started to fail following a fall on a slippery sidewalk in Prince Rupert. He passed away in King's Daughters' Hospital at Duncan, Vancouver Island, on December 18, a victim of cancer of the left lung.

The late Capt. Butler was born in Northumberland, Eng., March 24, 1866 and came around Cape Horn to the United States in 1889. He later came to British Columbia and married Charlotte Rutledge in 1898. She died in 1924. He joined the government marine service in 1915 and has been a well known figure on the waterfront of Prince Rupert since 1926. He obtained leave in November 1932 to return south for rest and recuperation from the indisposition caused by the fall. He never fully recovered. He leaves three daughters and one son also one grand-daughter and three grandsons.
