New York Quotation Jumps Two and a Half Cents to 53 3/4c Today Following Strong Advance in London—Highest Price Since 1929

NEW YORK, Oct. 11: (CP)—One of the sharpest increases in the price of bar silver for a single day's trading on record occurred today in the world markets. Bullion brokers here quoted an advance of two and a half cents to 53 3/4c per ounce following a one and an eighth pence advance in London. Today's price here was the highest since 1929 and was more than double the low price of 24 1/4c which was touched in December 1932.

#### ITALIANS IN WRONG

Jugo-Slavs Make Charges in Connection With Attempts on Life of King—Rioting

LJUBLJANA, Jugo-Slavia, Oct. 11: (CP)—Anti-Italian riots broke out here today after a meeting at which speakers alleged that all attempts against the life of King Alexander, including that at Zagreb last March, had been financed and prepared in Italy. The police fought back an attack upon the Italian consulate.

#### INTEREST RATE CUT

Only Two Percent to be Paid on Savings After November 1

OTTAWA, Oct. 11: (CP)—Interest paid on savings deposits will be reduced to two percent as from November 1 by all chartered banks in Canada, the Dominion government post office savings banks and Ontario government savings banks. Hon. E. N. Rhodes, minister of finance, announced today.

#### EXPORT IS INCREASED

Million More Bushels of Wheat Sent Out of Canada Last Week Than Week Previous

OTTAWA, Oct. 11: (CP)—The Dominion Bureau of Statistics announced yesterday that four million bushels of wheat had been exported from Canada last week as compared with three million bushels in the week previous. The visible supply in Canada today is 230,000,000 bushels, five million bushels less than a year ago.

#### BURGLARY OF STORE

Jabour Premises Broken Into During Night—Goods Taken—Clues Left

Between the hours of 2 and 8 a.m. today, the premises of Jabours Limited on Third Avenue were broken into and some ladies' wear, including shoes and gloves, taken. The premises were in order when checked up by night patrolmen at 2 a.m. On the store being opened for business at 8 o'clock this morning, it was found that entry had been made by removing the window pane in the main door. The person making entry evidently sustained cuts from broken glass as there was blood around. Fingerprints were also obtained.

#### Louisville Woman Is Roughly Abducted and Big Ransom Demanded

Mrs. Berry Stoll Beat Over Head With Iron Pipe and Dragged Away in Negligee—Had Risen From Sick Bed on Hearing Disturbance

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 11: (CP)—A lone kidnapper entered the home of Berry V. Stoll, leading Louisville oil company executive, late yesterday afternoon, beat his young wife over the head with an iron pipe, dragged her away dressed in negligee and left a note demanding ransom of \$50,000. According to Mrs. Stoll's maid, the man came ostensibly to repair a telephone, finally tearing out the instrument. Mrs. Stoll, who was ill, heard the noise and came downstairs. The kidnapper forced the maid to tape Mrs. Stoll's hands. He then trussed the maid herself up in a chair and carried off the captive. Up to noon today there was no trace either of Mrs. Stoll or the kidnapper.

#### CONFERS EARLDOM

Prince George Gets New Titles in Anticipation of Marriage to Princess Marina

LONDON, Oct. 11: (CP)—The official gazette announced yesterday that King George had conferred upon Prince George the titles of Baron of Down Patrick, Earl of St. Andrew's and Duke of Kent in honor of his forthcoming marriage to Princess Marina of Greece.

#### Escort Awaited

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 11: (CP)—Harold Vermilyea of Ontario, Cal., charged with the "hatchet murder" of his aged mother at Belleville, Ont., last week, is being held here under special guard pending arrival of escort to take him to Canada. It was denied by Los Angeles police that Vermilyea, who has waived extradition proceedings, had confessed to the killing.

#### EXPLOSION IN HALIFAX

Six Persons Lose Their Lives When Three-Storey Building Is Blown Up Today

HALIFAX, Oct. 11: (CP)—Six persons were killed in an explosion and fire which wrecked a three-storey building here early this morning. The dead are Mrs. Daniel Dudas and her two young sons and Mrs. Robert Cruse and her two children. A fourteen-year old Dudas girl was blown into the street and slightly injured. The cause of the explosion is unknown.

#### IS KILLED BY TRAIN

This is Finding of Jury at Inquest Into Death of Valentino Colussi

That Valentino Colussi, section hand at Tye station, twenty-five miles east of Prince Rupert on the Canadian National Railways line, met his death on Sunday, September 30, at 9:05 p.m. on the track about a mile east of Haysport by being struck by an extra train and that, in the opinion of the jury, no blame can be attached to members of the train crew was the verdict returned Tuesday night by a coroner's jury after all evidence available in connection with the tragedy had been presented by the provincial police, Dr. L. W. Kergin, who performed an autopsy, testified that all the injuries sustained by deceased had been inflicted prior to his death. A suggestion had been made that deceased might have been dead before being struck by the train which inflicted extensive injuries upon him. Members of the engine crew had testified that the man was lying face downwards on the track when the train ran over him after rounding a curve. The jury consisted of W. L. Coates, foreman, R. E. #### KING'S BODY GOING HOME

Jugo-Slavia Prepares to Pay Final Tribute to Memory of Monarch, Victim of Assassin's Fire

#### State Funeral

National Mourning For Sovereign of Greatest South Slav Kingdom In History

PARIS, October 11 (Canadian Press)—Europe was still calm and perplexed last night after more than twenty-four hours had elapsed following the double assassination at Marseilles of King Alexander of Jugo-Slavia and Foreign Minister Louis Barthou of France.

In a number of European capitals search was being made for a supposed band of international terrorists who, it was suggested, might have been responsible for the plot to kill King Alexander and who might have other activities of a similar kind in mind. Others believed that the slaying of King Alexander was the outcome of internal feelings in Jugo-Slavia of which country the dead assassin was a native. There were no political disorders anywhere in Jugo-Slavia yesterday, it was stated.

#### Body Going Home

BELGRADE, Jugo-Slavia, Oct. 11: (AP)—Jugo-Slavia was preparing today to pay final honor to her sovereign, Alexander I, victim of a countryman-assassin's bullet fire in Marseilles, France, on Tuesday. The body of the monarch, aboard a Jugo-Slavian destroyer, is due to arrive tomorrow from France, the boat being the same on which he left. A state funeral will be held and the entire country is in national mourning. The shock at the tragic death of the king has, for the time being at least, overshadowed the internal strife which has long characterized this troublous Balkan nation.

Queen Marie left Marseilles yesterday for Paris to meet her son, King-Designate Peter, on his arrival from England, where he had been attending Eaton College, and will accompany him home to Belgrade. The eleven year old King was accompanied from London to Paris by his grandmother, the Dowager Queen Marie of Roumania.

Alexander I, born the second son of an exiled prince of Serbia became by dint of successive wars first the regent of an expanded Serbia and then monarch of the greatest south Slav state in history, the modern kingdom of Jugo-Slavia. Created first as "the kingdom of the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes," the (Continued on page five.)

#### PRINCE RUPERT'S DIFFICULTIES

There has been a lot of loose talk about the difficulties of the city of Prince Rupert and the people who spent the money. As a matter of fact the history of our financial difficulties goes back to the time when the city lots were auctioned off for the benefit of the Grand Trunk Development Company and the Provincial Government. At that time millions of dollars were realized from the sale and a few thousands only were expended in building streets. The money realized from the sale was taken away and never returned and the new city was left to finance its own public works.

Owing to the fact that the townsite was chiefly rock and muskeg, the cost of street grading was very great and, when the original plank roadways rotted, the city was faced with the problem of either rebuilding the plank roads or carrying out very expensive grading.

If the townsite promoters had been forced to grade the streets before marketing the lots, a very reasonable request considering the prices realized, there would have been no financial difficulty to face when the depression came. The city had to have roads and sidewalks, no matter what the cost. True some of the expenditures were high such as those on one of the main city sewers but, on the whole, the public works were fairly well carried out, comparatively as well as in other cities. Now that the city has roads and sidewalks sufficient for present needs, it can, with reasonable economy such as that being used today, carry on and gradually rehabilitate itself.

## LIBRARIAN IS LEAVING

Miss Cruikshank plans to pay a visit with relatives in New York and will then remain in the east to take up future residence.

which had been \$940. It was taken to carry out certain precautionary work at the main entrance of the building.

## COALITION COLLAPSES

United Australia and Country Parties Unable to Get Together

CANBERRA, Australia, Oct. 11: (CP)—Negotiations for the formation of a coalition government between Premier J. A. Lyons' United Australia party and Dr. Earle Page's Country Party having collapsed, Premier Lyons yesterday announced the formation of a new cabinet composed entirely of members of his own party. It is anticipated that this administration will receive the support generally of Country members who are diametrically opposed to Labor Party policies. The most notable feature of the new cabinet is the inclusion of former Premier William M. Hughes as vice-president of the executive council.

Negotiations for a coalition collapsed after the United Australia and Country parties disagreed over the tariff question and on the allotment of cabinet seats. The Country party had demanded proportional representation according to number of seats won at the election

# King's Body Goes Home

(Continued from Page 1)

domino's title was changed by Alexander on October 3, 1929, to conform to his program of wiping out centuries-old racial antagonisms among the various branches of the south Slavs and knitting them together under a new national consciousness. It proved a prolonged and troublesome task.

After struggling for eight years with political parties whose quarrels culminated in a shooting affray on the floor of parliament, the king on January 6, 1929, proclaimed himself dictator, clapped on a strict censorship, abolished all political parties, wiped out the ancient provinces and divided the country instead into nine "banats" and the federal district of Belgrade. A new constitution, put into effect by decree September 3, 1931, restored a parliamentary form of government but concentrated executive powers in the monarch.

In the international field the new kingdom encountered difficulties with its neighbors—Italy, Albania, Bulgaria and Austria—over frontier questions, the rights of alien residents and activities of subversive Jugo-Slavians across the borders.

The brighter side of this picture was found in the little entente, an alliance of Jugo-Slavia, Roumania and Czechoslovakia, backed by France and pledged to perpetuation of the international boundaries established by the post-war treaties. From this political background the entente developed a considerable measure of economic unity and Alexander played his part in both fields.

Opposition to Alexander several times took violent form. On three occasions attempts were made to assassinate him and he was the intended victim of numerous plots, but he escaped harm.

**Czar's Page Boy**  
Alexander was born December 17, 1888, at Cetinje, capital of the now extinct kingdom of Montenegro. He was the second son of Prince Peter Karageorgevich, then in exile from Serbia. His mother was a daughter of King Nicholas of Montenegro. As a boy he was frail.

The family purse was far from plump and the second son was sent to St. Petersburg where he

was admitted to the corps of pages of Czar Nicholas II, last of the Romanoffs. In 1905 Prince Peter was elected king of Serbia following the savage assassination of King Alexander Obrenovich and Queen Draga, and the family assembled in Belgrade. Six years later the elder son, George, killed a servant in a fit of anger, gave up his right of succession and Alexander became crown prince.

In the first Balkan war in 1912 in which Serbia, Greece and Bulgaria defeated the decaying Turkish empire, Crown Prince Alexander commanded the army which drove the Turks out of southern Serbia and Macedonia. When Bulgaria tried to occupy the lion's share of the fixed territories, Alexander's troops broke through and assured Serbia victory in the second Balkan war.

Following the assassination in Sarajevo on June 28, 1914, of Archduke Ferdinand, heir to the Austro-Hungarian throne, Alexander sent a telegram to Czar Nicholas II asking help for Russia's fellow Slavs. Assured of St. Petersburg's aid he rejected the Austro-Hungarian ultimatum that the big empire should conduct on the Serbian soil the official inquiries into the assassination. The act precipitated the world war.

In that conflict Alexander, wounded and defeated in the early fighting, led his troops in the terrible retreat through Albania to the sea and reformed them on the Island of Corfu. He rejoined the allied cause at Salonika and helped by the French, thrust the Austrians from Macedonia in 1917. Nine days later Montenegro united itself to Serbia.

**New State Formed**  
On November 26 King Peter, then 76 years old, relinquished his powers, vesting them in Alexander as prince regent. A month later the former Austro-Hungarian provinces of Croatia, Slovenia, Bosnia and Herzegovina voted to unite with Serbia and the kingdom of the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes came into being. All sections hailed Alexander as "the liberator."

Peter died August 16, 1921, and Alexander, then ill in a French hospital, was proclaimed king.

The following June he married Marie, daughter of the late King Ferdinand and the Dowager Queen Marie of Roumania. Three sons were born to them, Crown Prince Peter, September 6, 1923; Prince Tomislav, January 18, 1928; and Prince Andrew, June 29, 1929.

**Burying Barthou**  
PARIS, Oct. 11.—The body of Jean Louis Barthou, foreign minister, victim of an assassin's bullet at Marseilles on Tuesday, has been brought here for burial. There will be a state funeral.

Born in 1862, Barthou was a prominent member of many French ministries and was Premier from March to December 1913. He was foreign minister during the latter days of the Great War and for many years had taken a prominent part in foreign affairs.

### KILLED BY TRAIN

(Continued from Page 1)

Undertaker Testifies  
The first witness upon resumption last night of the inquest, which had been adjourned for a week pending further investigation of the fatality, was Frank Morris, undertaker. He testified that the body was still warm when he received it some six hours after the time the train had passed over it. Rigor mortis had not set in at that time. The undertaker estimated that the man had been dead for some six or seven hours before he received the body.

Provincial Constable Victor Bond corroborated Mr. Morris' evidence regarding the body being warm when it was turned over to the undertaker.  
Kimi Muramatsu, young Japanese girl of Haysport, told of seeing deceased walking eastward along the track about half an hour after she had returned home from a trip to Prince Rupert. Mrs. Waka Muramatsu, mother of Kimi, testified that her daughter had arrived home a little after 5 o'clock on the afternoon in question. This was the last, as far as could be learned, of Colussi being seen alive. There was no evidence to shed light on his movements between that time and when he was struck by the train about four hours later.

Dr. L. W. Kergin, who re-examined the body following the original autopsy, gave his opinion that all injuries had been sustained at one and the same time and all had been inflicted before death.

Further Investigation  
Corp. Robert Gibson told of further investigations made by himself in connection with the tragedy. He presented a sketch of the track in the vicinity. There was not the slightest evidence of any one else having been along the track that evening.

G. Colussi, brother of deceased, said he had never heard of the latter having been sick or having fainting spells. He was a hard worker and was not addicted to the excessive use of liquor.

Matt Pedersen, Byron Beamer and Oscar Olsen, C. N. R. bridge-men, testified that they had passed the vicinity of the fatality in a gasoline speeder about 6 p.m. on the evening in question and had seen no one on the track.

The jury, after Coroner Norman A. Watt had reviewed the evidence, retired at 9:20 p.m., returning exactly an hour later with its verdict.
