FIRE TAKES SIX LIVES

Mrs. Walsh and Five Children Perish When Home Destroyed In Manitoba

SWAN RIVER, Man., Sept. 10: (CP)—A mother and five children were burned to death Sunday night when fire believed to have started from a cookstove destroyed their farm home in the Bigwoody district thirteen miles west of here.

The dead are Mrs. Walsh, aged 48, Kenneth, 14; Mabel, 13; Rita, 12; Dorothy, 8, and Mary, 2. Three other children were saved. Ada, aged 10, jumped from a window to safety. The father rescued Nita, aged 4, and Evelyn, 6.

Fire Escape At Local School Is In Good Repair

J. Alder. There is no danger of such an accident there as occurred in the Simon Fraser School at Vancouver last week when several pupils were seriously injured.

FASCISTS AND ANTI-FASCISTS IN CLASH SUNDAY IN LONDON

LONDON, Sept. 10:—Sir Oswald Mosley's British Fascist party held its greatest demonstration in Hyde Park yesterday, excitement developing when anti-Fascists also put on a counter-demonstration. The police were able to control the confusion which ensued and in which it was estimated that 100,000 persons took part. There were sixteen arrests and at least thirty persons were injured.

Dale L. Pitt, General Manager Of Premier Gold Mining Co., Changes Headquarters

After having made his headquarters as general manager of the Premier Gold Mining Co. at Premier for the last fifteen years, Dale L. Pitt, one of Western Canada's most prominent and popular mining men, was here Saturday evening aboard the steamer Prince Rupert going through to Vancouver whence he will proceed to San Francisco where he will embark September 18 for Cue, Western Australia, where he will take up his future headquarters in active charge of the company's Big Bell mine, a famous property, upon which a \$2,500,000 development program is to be carried out including the installation of a 1000-ton concentrator.

Mr. Pitt was accompanied by Mrs. Pitt and daughter, Elizabeth, and son, Bobby, who will take up residence in Honolulu, Miss Pitt entering the University of Hawaii and Bobby attending Pinahou Preparatory College.

Following the departure of Mr. Pitt from Canada, B. F. Smith assistant manager, will be in charge of operations at Premier.

THE FEDERAL BY-ELECTIONS

In view of the imminence of the federal general election, which the Conservatives, and they should know, say will not be held for a year but which a number of Liberals seem to think may be brought on in a hurry, possibly before the end of this year, special significance will attach to the forthcoming five by-elections in Ontario on September 24.

Of the five seats involved in the by-elections two were held by Liberals and three by Conservatives. Elgin West was vacated by Mitchell Hepburn, now Premier of Ontario, and Kenora-Rainy River by Hon. Peter Heenan on entering the Hepburn cabinet. Toronto East, made vacant by the death of the late Hon. E. B. Ryckman, and Frontenac-Addington, where Dr. W. Spankie M.P. recently died, are traditionally Conservative seats. Historic North York, which in its day has had both Conservative members and Liberal, having been made vacant now by the death of the late Col. T. H. Lennox, Conservative, may be considered the best fighting ground of the five contests.

Even if the Conservatives lost in all five contests, their control of the House would not be affected. If such happened, however, it would be very discouraging as far as the political outlook for them is concerned. The results in the five by-elections will be awaited with much interest by all political observers. They may possibly have some bearing on the government's selection of a date for the general election.

CITY COMMISSIONER'S APPEAL

We would suggest to our ratepayer readers that they consider earnestly the appeal being made by City Commissioner W. J. Alder for prompt payment of current taxes and arrears and the special inducement of cancellation of penalties and interest being offered to those paying up in full. Doubtless, those who are in a position to do so and desire to save their property will respond without delay. Possibly, some may consider it advisable to sacrifice meantime in some other direction in order to pay up their taxes. In any case, the proposition looks like a reasonably generous one and should appeal particularly to the owners of improved property.

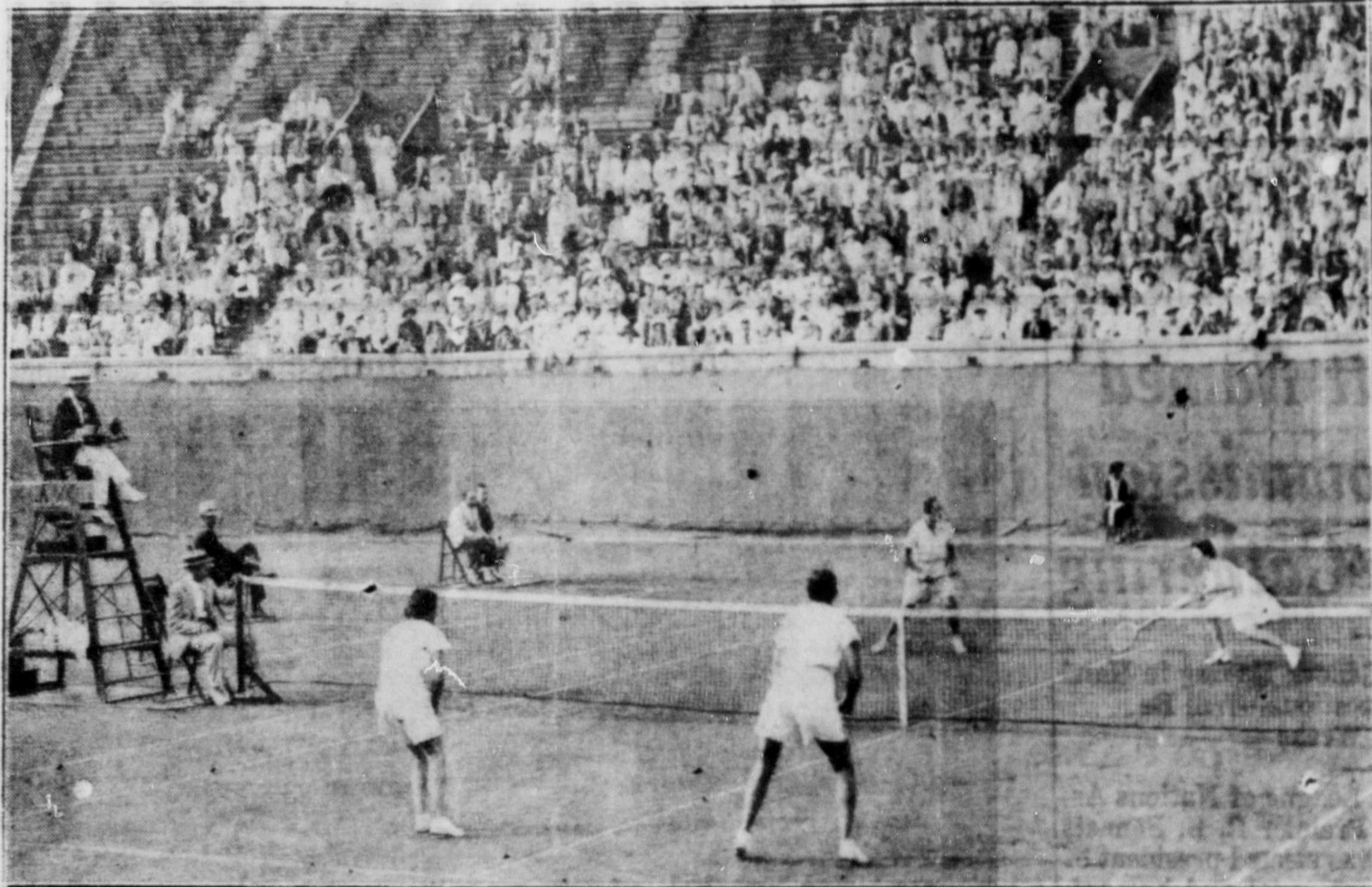
THE MORRO CASTLE DISASTER

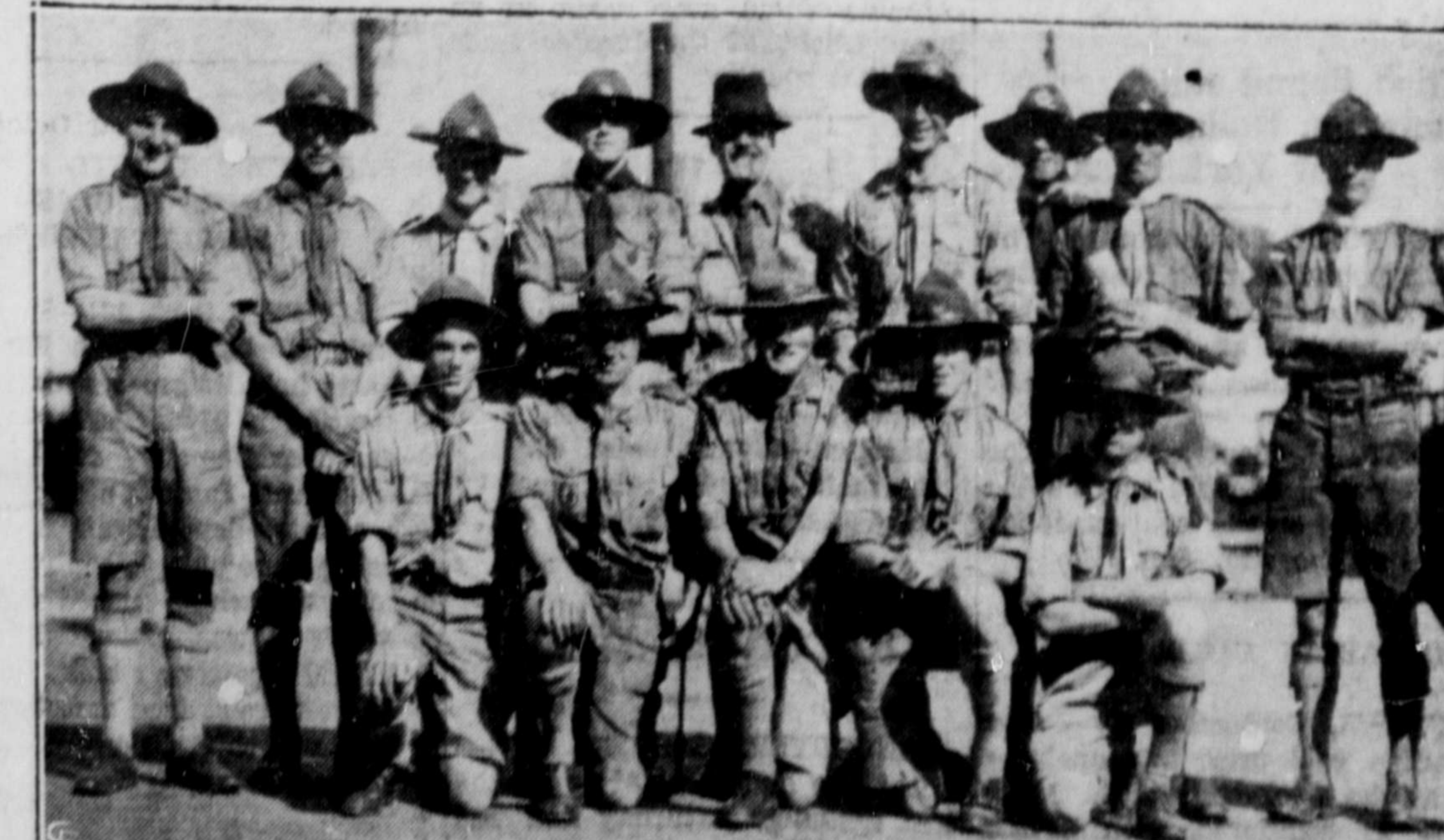

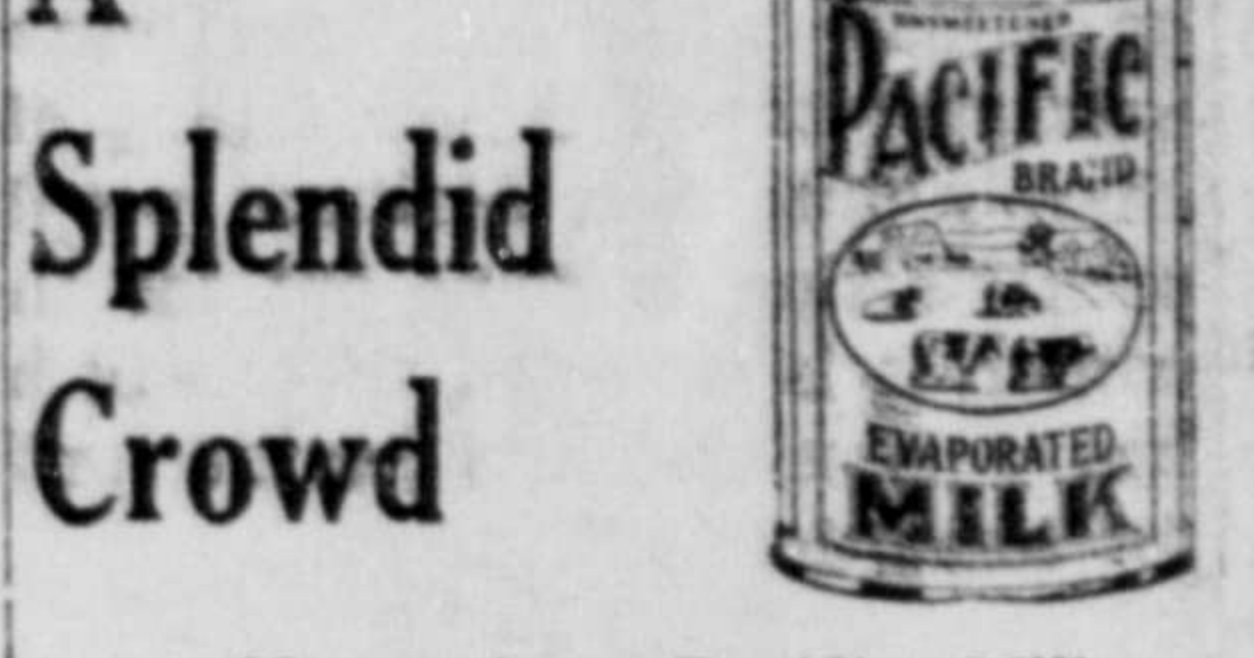

KARLOFF IN THRILL FILM

"The Ghoul" and "The Poor Rich" Being Presented at First of This Week at Capitol

"The Ghoul," a British picture which comes to the Capitol Theatre here at the first of this week, is a thriller of the eerie type in which Boris Karloff excels. It is said to be about the best picture Karloff has made to date, mainly because the story is not so incredible as have been some of his previous horror efforts. It tells of a half-crazed professor, a famous Egyptologist, who requests before he dies that he shall be buried in a sarcophagus of his own design and with a valuable jewel supposed to endow its wearer with powers of immortality. Some excitement is also introduced into the picture in which Andy Devine, Grant Mitchell, Leila Hyams and Thelma Todd are important members of the supporting cast.
