Plan of Hon. Robert Weir, Minister of Agriculture, Seen As Solution For Plight of 40000 Families Suffering Fourth Straight Crop Failure

TORONTO Aug. 23: (CP)-Hon. Robert Weir, minister of agriculture, announces, according to the Toronto Mail and Empire, an agreement with the provinces and railways whereby settlers and livestock will be transported at reduced rates from drought-stricken southern areas of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta to the

north. The movement holds out some hope for the solution of the problem of forty thousand families facing their fourth successive year of crop failure.

It is estimated that half a million livestock will be moved.

Under the terms of the agreement the railways will transport the cattle to feeding grounds in the north at forty percent of the normal freight rates, and settlers and effects at sixty-six and two-thirds percent. 


