Australian Ace Fights Storm In Making Long and Dangerous Flight

Hop From Suva to Honolulu Commenced at Dawn Today And Took Twenty-Two Hours—Next Stage Is to Oakland

HONOLULU, Oct. 29: (CP)—Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith and Capt. P. G. Taylor arrived here at 11 a.m. (Pacific Standard Time) from Suva, a distance of 3197 miles, after completing the most perilous stage of their projected trans-Pacific flight from Brisbane to Oakland.

Fitzmaurice Hops Off Today But Is Forced to Return

LONDON, Oct. 29: (CP)—In the attempt to break the record set last week by C. W. A. Scott and Campbell Black in their flight from England to Melbourne, Col. James Fitzmaurice, Irish Free State ace, hopped off this morning for Australia in his big Bellanca monoplane but had to return owing to undercarriage trouble after reaching Brussels.

Ten Million Being Drawn For in Pool On Horse Race

Local Man Reported to be in Line To Win Several Thousand Dollars

DUBLIN, October 29 (CP)—Drawing in the pool of the Irish Hospitals Sweepstake on the Cambridgehire Stakes started Saturday with \$10,000,000 devoted to prize money. One horse was drawn in Alberta, one in Saskatchewan, one in Juneau, Alaska, and six in California as well as seven in British Columbia. D. Lund of Prince Rupert is among those reported to have drawn a horse. He may win several thousand dollars. There are also three winners in Vancouver and one at Blubber Bay. A large number of prizes remain to be drawn. Officials refuse to divulge names officially in view of Canadian legislation passed last session regarding sweepstake winners.

Deming Sells Out Control in Pacific-American Fisheries

SEATTLE, Oct. 29: (CP)—E. B. Deming of Bellingham has sold controlling interest in the Pacific-American Fisheries Inc. to a group of eastern capitalists for \$1,000,000 cash. Deming said that Frank L. Taylor, who has been long associated with him, heads the purchasers who are chiefly residents of Chicago. Deming is retaining a substantial interest in the company and will remain as chairman of the board.

Severe Censure

OTTAWA, Oct. 29: (CP)—Announcement was made at Premier Bennett's office late Saturday afternoon that the resignation of Hon. H. H. Stevens as minister of trade and commerce and head of the mass buying commission had been accepted. Premier Bennett not only accepted Mr. Stevens' resignation but delivered a severe censure upon the retiring minister of trade and commerce. It had been fundamentally unsound practice, he Prime Minister said, for Mr. Stevens to have publicly discussed the proceedings and evidence of a commission before the hearing of evidence had been completed or a report made. Further, Mr. Bennett stated, that he had found that statements made by Mr. Stevens in the pamphlet which he had made public were at variance with the evidence which had been heard by the commission. Statements which were wholly or in part untrue had been made in regard to various Canadian business concerns. Mr. Stevens' action had been contrary to every principle of British justice and it had placed himself and his colleagues in a very difficult position. Declaring that he intended to have the whole matter threshed out in the House of Commons, Mr. Stevens said that he had been placed in an intolerable position. He charged that the stand of the Premier in regard to the matter had been largely the result of representations made by two large department stores. Although resigning the chairmanship, Mr. Stevens will continue as a member of the mass buying commission. This will give him the privilege to call any witnesses he may desire to testify before the commission.

To Continue Fight

Announcing that he would be present when the commission re-assembles tomorrow to hear witnesses from Nova Scotia in regard to the fishing industry, Mr. Stevens said: "Now that I am free, I will be in an even better position to fight."

Girls Complained That Medicine Tasted 'Nasty' After Which They Died

Government of Tanganyika Bans Use of Laxative Pending Investigation—Medical Aid Being Rushed to Others Who Lie in Agony

DAR-ES-SALEM, Tanganyika, Oct. 29: (CP)—Thirty-three native girl pupils of a school here complained as usual that castor oil tasted "nasty" and then died. Medical relief is being rushed by air in a desperate attempt to save the lives of other children who lie in agony. The government has decreed a ban on castor oil throughout the country pending an investigation.

### WHAT WILL THE OUTCOME BE?

Supporters of the Conservative party will find it difficult to say today whether they are Bennett Conservatives or Stevens Conservatives. Judging from what one hears locally it would seem as if the Stevens supporters are in the majority but most Conservatives are hoping that there will be some way of getting over the difficulty without an open break.

If Mr. Stevens is successful in leading a political rebellion he will be quite different from many political rebels who have preceded him in this country. Usually the gap in the government ranks is closed with scarcely a ripple of dissatisfaction following. The McGeer defection at Victoria had little effect even though the political rebel was an outstanding speaker and also had a large following in the province. So it is to be presumed that the Stevens defection will have little effect on the Bennett government. The administration will probably carry on until next summer or until such time as it sees fit to appeal to the country and, the more active the former minister of trade and commerce becomes, the less likelihood there is of his being taken back to lead the party after Mr. Bennett decides to retire. Much will depend upon the course he takes during the next few months. No matter what the opinion of the electors may be today in regard to Mr. Stevens and his actions, they cannot get away from the fact that he is a political outcast and in Canada a political outcast has never been able to make a mark in political life. Possibly he will be the exception.

Bringing north a light list of passengers, Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Officers of the steamer Catala, arriving here last evening from the south, reported having sighted yesterday afternoon a short distance south of the Skeena River a flock of upwards of fifty large white swan winging their way south in straight line formation. White swan have been reported in the north on various occasions before but not in such large numbers as this.

Leaving plenty of birds behind for the nimrods who may follow—in fact, ruefully admitting that they had been completely "skunked"—a big party of local hunters, who really ought to have done better, returned home last night aboard the Salvage Princess from Welcome Harbor. TORONTO, Oct. 29: (CP)—George Beckett, president of the Young Canada Conservative Club, has resigned, declaring that he was unable to hold the position and extend his undivided support to Hon. H. H. Stevens, retiring minister of trade and commerce. Beckett also said that his resignation was due to lack of confidence in the federal administration.

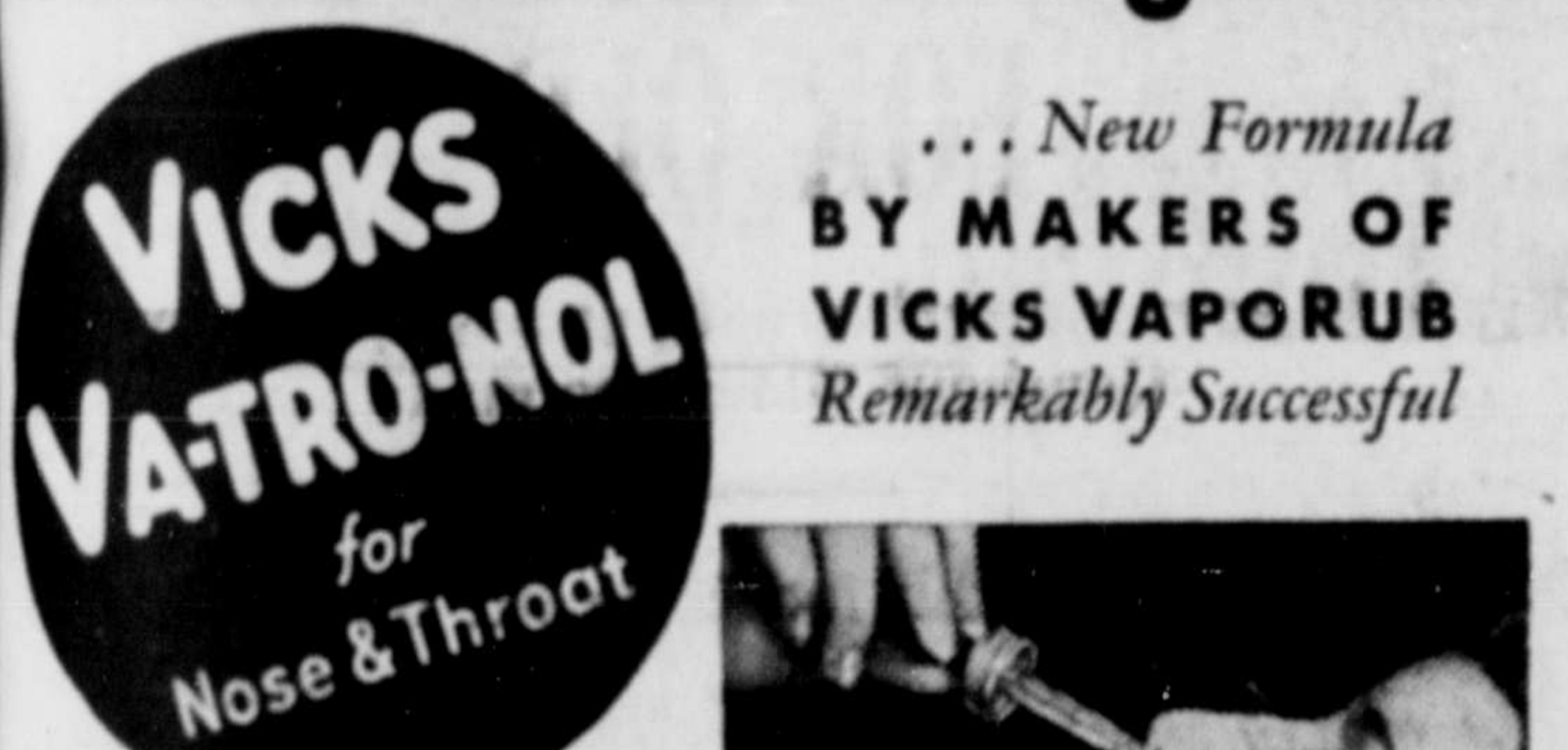
