NATIONS MOVING TO RATIFY LONDON SILVER AGREEMENT

Canadian Government Forwards Endorsation to Washington Today

Canada, Australia, United States, Mexico and Peru Co-operating With a View to Holding Up Price of White Metal

OTTAWA, March 26: (CP)—The Dominion government today forwarded to Washington formal ratification of the London silver agreement whereby Canada, in common with Australia, United States, Mexico and Peru, will co-operate in keeping a certain amount of silver off the market in an effort to maintain a reasonable price.

MATCHWOOD LOGS HERE

Shipments of White Poplar From Interior to China Through Here Commencing

Five carloads of white poplar logs cut by M. M. Connelly of Fraser Lake to fill an order from China for matchwood timber arrived here Saturday night on the regular mixed train from Tintagel and are being unloaded today at the lumber assembly wharf whence the timber will be shipped later to the Orient. Twenty-five cars of the timber is expected to arrive here by early next month. The logs run in the vicinity of twenty feet in length with a minimum diameter of ten inches.

It was not known definitely up to this morning as to the arrangements for trans-shipping the logs from here. It was originally planned that they should be sent from here to Vancouver in scows and across the Pacific from the southern port. Later, however, it was reported that a freighter would come here to load them for the Orient direct. Of course, there are not enough here yet to warrant the latter being done.

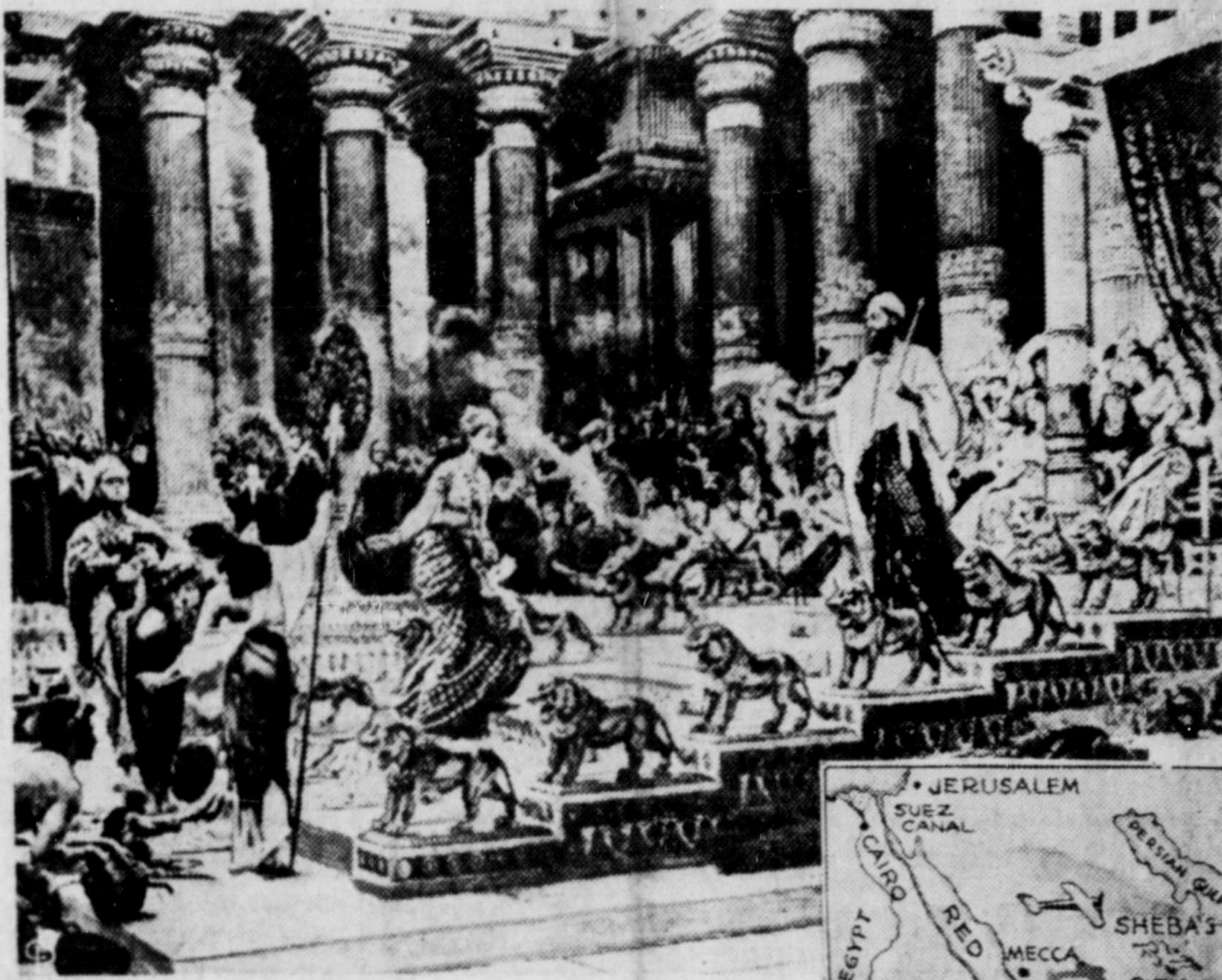

PASSES IN VICTORIA

Roderick F. Tolmie, Brother of Former Premier, Died This Morning

VICTORIA, March 26: (CP)—Roderick F. Tolmie, brother of former Premier S. F. Tolmie, died here this morning. He was in the government service for more than forty years and at one time was deputy minister of mines. He retired from the service seven years ago. Son of the late Dr. William Fraser and Jane Tolmie, deceased was born in Victoria. He received his education here and Victoria was his life-long permanent home.

Former Reeve Passes Suddenly

WEST VANCOUVER, March 26: (CP)—W. W. Vinson, former reeve of West Vancouver, died suddenly on Sunday.

Another Increase At Anyox

VANCOUVER, Mar. 26: (CP)—Employees of the Granby Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. in the company's mines and other operations at Anyox have been given a five percent increase in wages, it being the second advance they have had within recent months. More than a thousand men are affected. The increase goes into effect on April 1.

NEW YORK, March 26:—The New York stock market showed a distinct upward trend during the brief session of trading on Saturday, many of the leaders gaining from one to two points. Closing averages were: industrials, 100.92, up .33; rails, 47.92, up .33; rails, 26.37, up .32, and bonds, 92.55, up .09.

NEW DEAL TO LABOR

Automobile Strike in United States Settled—Works Council Expected

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 26: (CP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt looks for a new order in relations between workmen and employers as a result of his eleventh hour settlement of the controversy which threatened a general strike in the automobile industry. A new agreement reached between executives of the automobile manufacturing companies and labor leaders last night established representation for all employees in dealing with the managements, extending fresh safeguards to all unions against intimidation or interference.

"It is my hope that this system may develop into a kind of works council in industry in which all groups will participate," the President said.

Edmund Lowe Is Deeply Grieved

Well Known Moving Picture Star Reported Near Collapse Following Wife's Death

NEW YORK, March 26:—Remaining in seclusion following the death of his actress wife, Lilyan Tashman, on Wednesday, Edmund Lowe, the well known talking picture star, was reported to be on the verge of collapse over his bereavement. Lowe and Miss Tashman had been married since 1925 and theirs had often been pointed to as one of screenland's few ideal matches.

Western Premiers Are Invited To Parley in Ottawa at Early Date

Assistance Required by British Columbia and Prairie Provinces During Coming Fiscal Year to be Discussed—Pattullo Must Leave Within Few Days

OTTAWA, March 26: (CP)—The federal government moved today towards meeting the demand from the west for assistance in meeting the general economic and unemployment situation with the issuing of invitations to the premiers of the prairie provinces and British Columbia to attend a conference on April 5 for the purpose of discussing financial assistance they will require during the next fiscal year.

PIONEER IS DEAD

George B. White Succumbed to Sudden Heart Attack Saturday At Age of Sixty-Eight

Death came suddenly on Saturday afternoon to a pioneer resident of a quarter of a century's standing in Prince Rupert in the person of George B. White who succumbed to a heart attack on the roof of his home on Fourth Avenue East near McBride Street while engaged in repairing a chimney. Although he had been subject to heart trouble for years, he had apparently been in normal health and spirits right to the end. Only a few minutes before he collapsed and expired he had returned from a trip downtown. It is believed possible that the exertion of climbing on to the roof might have brought on the final attack. Dr. L. W. Kergin was at once called but, by the time the physician arrived, deceased was beyond medical aid and life was pronounced extinct. The fire department was called at 4 p.m. to assist in removing the body from the roof.

Born November 24, 1865, in Kewanee, Ill., of old American stock, the late Mr. White was raised on a farm in Nebraska state and, when a young man, moved to Canada and took up farming at Ponoka, Alta. After a brief residence at Deer Park on the Lower Arrow Lake, Mr. White came to Prince Rupert for the original sale of town lots in May 1909 and bought into real estate here, making his home in the city since. In the early days he was engaged for a time in conducting an iron-works shop and of more recent years had engaged in salmon fishing. A man of great physique, he had been in his younger days in the mid-western states a professional baseball player for a time.

In 1890 the late Mr. White was married to Mary A. Cerveny at Pittsburg. Besides the widow he leaves to mourn his loss two sons, Julius George White in San Francisco and Isaac Cline White in Los Angeles. Marjorie White of Los Angeles is a granddaughter, and Lyle White, also of Los Angeles, is a grandson. Other surviving relatives include a sister, Mrs. Charlotte Blevens of Los Angeles, and two brothers, Charles White in Florida, and Isaac White of Yakima, Wash. To the bereaved the sympathy of many friends will be extended.

The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon from the chapel of Hayner Bros., undertakers, with Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth, pastor of First Presbyterian Church, officiating.

May Shorten Session

VICTORIA, March 26:—To be in Ottawa in time for the opening of the conference between the federal government and the premiers of western provinces on Thursday of next week, Premier Pattullo will have to leave here at the end of this week or the very first of next week. In the event of the session of the Legislature failing to prorogue by the time of his departure, the Easter recess will probably be extended until after his return.

KILLED IN CAR CRASH

Miss Barbara Wood, Daughter of Well Known Vancouver Barrister, Loses Her Life

WEST VANCOUVER, March 25: (CP)—Barbara Wood, 18-year old daughter of H. S. Wood K.C., well known Vancouver barrister, was instantly killed yesterday when an automobile in which she was driving overturned in gravel on the highway between North and West Vancouver.

Alex McArthur, aged 26, who was driving the car, suffered shock and bruises.

CITY OF ROSES

Several people interested in flowers and gardening were swapping experiences recently when one suggested that Prince Rupert should concentrate on a flower that all would grow and for which the city would become noted. It was suggested that it would be a good antidote to the wet weather propaganda under which the city suffers to have everybody grow roses and hold a rose show in July.

One of the group said that roses grew better in Prince Rupert than in Victoria because there were fewer pests and the flowers developed better and had a larger number of perfect blooms. He was strong for making Prince Rupert a city of roses.

Make Prince Rupert noted for her roses which would bloom during the height of the tourist season. It might not be a bad idea.

FISHERY PROBES

Another fishery probe is to be held. It will meet and hear evidence and possibly make recommendations. These recommendations will be embodied in a report which will be printed and possibly discussed. Then it will be for the government to decide whether or not they will be adopted and implemented in legislation.

Few people can remember when the first investigation into the fisheries was held. Since that they have been held periodically but they have done little good. The investigators go around the country, listen to more or less important evidence, look wise and try to separate the wheat from the chaff. Usually they have drawn fees for their work and incurred all sorts of expenses which the country paid.

In the fourth game of the Northern British Columbia basketball championship series at Anyox Saturday night, the Vandals of the smelter town defeated Canadian National Recreation Association of Prince Rupert by a score of 34 to 29. It was a close and exciting contest, giving the series to Anyox three games to one. The local team returned home yesterday on the local service boat F. H. Phippen. Capt. James Morrison, aboard which the trip was made. The trip, although the outcome was not all that the locals might have hoped for, was an enjoyable one and the players were hospitably received and entertained at the smelter town. A dance in honor of the Prince Rupert team followed the first game on Friday night.

Albert Stiles started the ball rolling for Prince Rupert in the first minute of the game Saturday night when he sank a basket after a pretty bit of combination. In fact, Rupert had a five-point lead before Anyox had anything on the sheet and then the battle raged and, when the gong went at the interval, the halibut handlers had a slender two-point lead over the smelter crew. The score was 19-17 and all indications pointed to Rupert repeating the same stunt as they pulled down here. However, they failed to do so.

Second Half

When the boys went back to work in the second half it was anybody's game right up to the final gong. There was never more than three points difference in the score, which doesn't mean a thing in a basketball game. If the scoring acts of the C. N. R. A. had not had such bad luck in their shooting, Rupert might have come back with the championship and the new cup, which has been donated by the Sun Life through their local representative, S. J. Jabour. But it didn't happen that way.

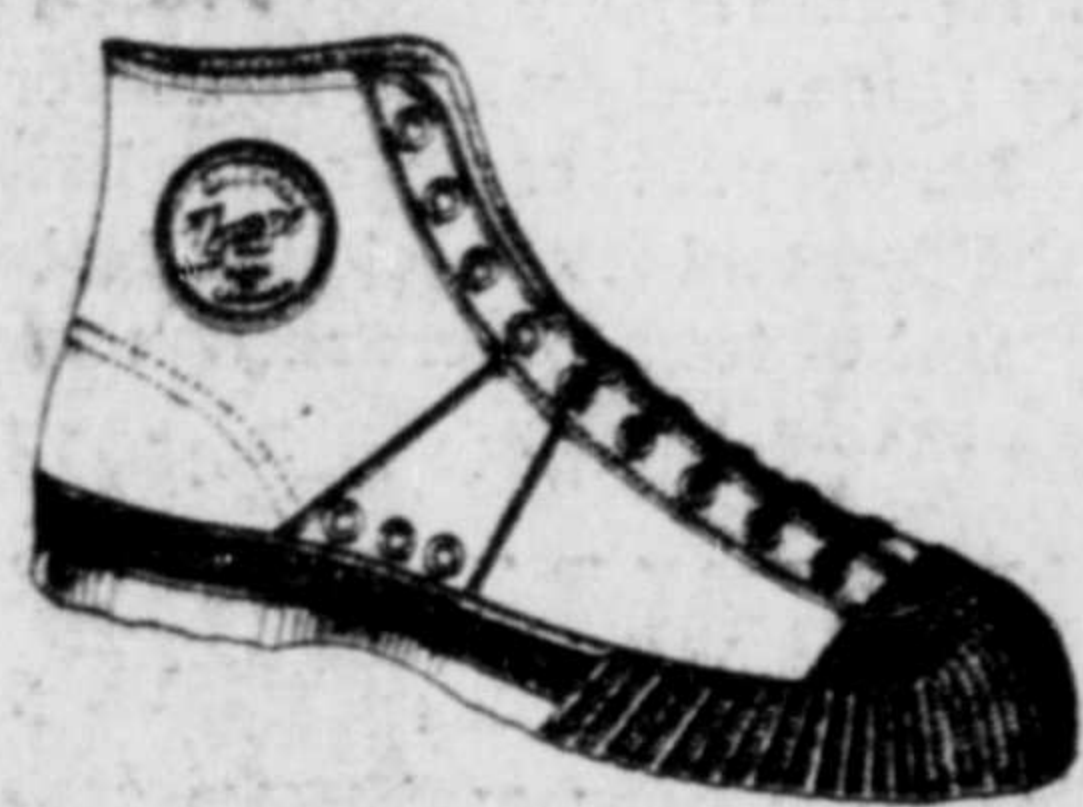
