## DEMAND ON FOR SILVER

United States Requirements Are Enormous-Will be Buying For Two Years

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 12: (CP)-Sharp increase in the purchase of foreign silver has been made by the United States Treasury, it was officially disclosed today.

With a ratio of one to three with gold as backing for currency, it is believed one billion ounces will be required and the buying program will probably extend over two years or more.

There was no trading in United States today in silver, the metal markets being closed on account of the Columbus Day holiday.

### RETIRING LIBRARIAN

Many Prince Rupert people will greatly regret to hear of the retirement from the position of librarian of Miss Alice Cruikshank, who is leaving the city to reside in the east. She has given excellent service to the people and the remuneration has not been large. At the time when the city was hit by the depression and there was danger of the library being closed, Miss Cruikshank willingly offered to take less salary. The Daily News wishes her many years of enjoyment in her new home.

### SLAYING OF ALEXANDER

The assassination of King Alexander of Jugo-Slavia by a fanatic from his own country is an incident to be greatly! regretted but, beyond that, it should have little significance. The King was almost a dictator, made necessary by the unseemly quarrels among the lesser statesmen of the country. Doubtless, it had been found desirable to carry out unpopular measures which annoyed many people. Those who had hoped to foment rebellion similar to that carried out in Russia were undoubtedly bitter against him. On the whole he seems to have been a wise ruler whose efforts in behalf of his country were decidedly beneficial. His death is a loss to the country and to the world.

The death of Louis Barthou, foreign minister of France, evidently only incidental to the death of the King, will have little effect except to embitter his countrymen against those who countenance such acts.

### WORSE THAN KILLING

After all, killing is not the greatest crime in the calendar. There are other crimes that are worse. The crime of whispered lies which blacken a person's character is often far worse than killing.

Yesterday Rev. C. D. Clarke addressed the Rotary Club! on the subject of lies and he mentioned a kind which he called "damned lies." Some of those he classed as such were really not very bad but others, the whispered lies which blacken the character and sometimes blast the lives of innocent people, he did not mention. They are much worse than the political exaggerations, the misleading advertisements and the various other more or less innocent forms of lie that can be detected as such except by the very simple and, even if not detected, are not very harmful.

Mr. Clarke is always interesting and usually humorous and his address was enjoyed by the Rotarians. We suggest to him that, in giving an address of that kind, he speak of the lies passed about because of circumstantial evidence which has hanged many a man and ruined the lives of many a woman but which throughout was a lie.

### Leader in Girls' Work Visits Here


Had Busy Week in City

### Addressed Club On Subject of Lies

Rev. C. D. Clarke Classifies People Who Make False Statements in Entertaining Fashion

Quoting from a book recently published on the subject, Rev. C. D. Clarke, pastor of First United Church, told the Rotary Club yesterday that there are three kinds of liars in this world. There are the plain, ordinary garden liars, there are "damned" liars and statisti-

The more or less innocent liars are those who make such statements as that man is descended from the ape whereas it should be ascended. Mr. Clarke said his grandparents were descended from the Irish but that seemed impossible. He said some people paid five cents for a newspaper but they found only about two-thirds of it was news, the remainder being advertising.

Coming to the second in the classification, these were intended to deceive and defraud and often did untold harm to body and soul. He included in this considerable of the modern advertising. He quoted a number of specific instances and enlarged on them considerably.

Speaking of statisticians as liars, Mr. Clarke mentioned the case of religious denominations. Statisticians said that there were 1200 Presbyterians in Prince Rupert and 1650 Anglicans. Figures did not lie but they could be made to tell different stories. They were like the Bible. You could prove almost anything by quotations from them.

Among the lies intended to deceive people Mr. Clarke instanced the statement attributed to Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King that he would not give a five-cent piece to any Tory government, to Premier R. B. Bennett that he was seeking a title and to the C. C. F. that they were anti-Christian.

The address was replete with bright witticisms and was much appreciated.
