King Moves Straight Want of Confidence-Resignation Demanded

OTTAWA, Jan. 30: (CP)-Parliament was in the midst of a strenuous debate last night after Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Leader of the Opposition, had moved a straight want of confidence vote against the government.

The amendment of the Liberal leader on the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne "respectfully submits to Your Excellency (the Governor General) that Your Excellency's present advisers do not possess the confidence of this House or of the country."

Mr. King, in the course of his speech, challenged the government to hold a general election at once, stating that the government had lost its moral authority to govern.

Forty Below Zero at Kenora-Snow Blizzards Accompany Frigid Temperatures

WINNIPEG, Jan. 30: (CP)-Manitoba was in the grip yesterday of a bitter cold wave with the thermometer here showing 38 below. Kenora registered 40 below while in Saskatchewan zero temperatures were accompanied by snow and high winds.

From the Middle West States also came reports of bitterly cold weather. In Chicago, where the cold had caused seven deaths and widespread suffering last night there was a snow blizzard with the thermometer registering seven below zero in the city and 10 below in the suburbs and moving lower. On the Michigan Peninsula it was 15 below zero. At Detroit it was zero and at Sault Ste. Marie 18 below. Minnesota had 17 below.

Provincial Government Not In Favor of Commissioners For Cities, Minister Says

IS FASCISM THE ANSWER?

A book has come to the editorial desk recently for review, It is by S. Alfred Jones K.C., LL.B. and is entitled "Is Fascism the Answer?" The writer claims to have made a close study of Fascism in Italy and as a result he is certainly favorable to it. In the book he explains the system which was last year laid before readers of the Daily News by Victor Basso-Bert of this city.

The writer explains that the Fascist plan does not provide for a dictator but that it is a democracy of the brains of the nation. He describes it as a mass movement with the state supreme while at the same time respecting the life and work and property of the individual.

After describing the work of the Fascist government in detail and in a most illuminating manner and giving a very interesting sketch of the life and work of Mussolini, the writer compares the system with the New Deal of President Roosevelt. In this section of the book he says:

"The Roosevelt Revolution, as it has been termed; was a distinct revolt against the doctrine of 'Let well enough alone,' under which the nation had been drifting far too long. The old rule of government non-interference had long since been outlived. During good times it was difficult to get-support for a policy of change and when the evil; days came the tendency was to wait for the turn of the tide. The President's action seized the popular mind at a time when it was vitally necessary for the very life of the nation to capture the people's thoughts. The personal popularity of the President played no small part in securing the almost unanimous acclaim with which his proposals were received. One writer has in six words well expressed the underlying basic principles upon which the N. R. A. is founded, and the great mass of the people have realized that selfishness must be forgotten in the duty of every loyal citizen to sincerely subscribe to those words namely, 'The public interest must be supreme.' Capital must give as well as take, labor must be reasonable and the consumer must expect to make sacrifices for the country's welfare."

YEAR'S WORK OF POLICE

Fines Less In 1933 Than 1932 But Number In Jail Greater

According to a report covering police activity in this city during 1933 which has been presented by Corp. G. A. Wyman to City Commissioner W. J. Alder receipts of the department for the year totalled \$3,263.57 and disbursements \$2.446.42 (not including salaries). During the year the department made 254 arrests, conducted 292 prosecutions, secured 251 convictions and handled 426 complaints. 3.261 meals were supplied during the year in the lock-up at an av-

erage cost of 10.06c, per meal. Fines during the year were of persons confined in the lock-up during the year.
