FRANCE SLASHING BUDGET HEAVILY NEW RECORD GOLD PRICE IS REACHED IN LONDON TODAY

British Purchases of Yellow Metal Big In Spite U.S. Premium

Jump For Day Was Ten and a Half Pence to \$35.30, Three Pence Over Previous High Mark Set on February 5 Last

LONDON, Aug. 30: (CP)—The price of bar gold reached a record of 140 shillings three pence (\$35.30) per fine ounce today, an increase of ten and a half pence over Wednesday and three pence over the previous record set on February 5. Gold purchasers bought metal valued at \$1,735,000 although the price included a premium of twenty-six and a half pence over the American dollar and seven pence over the French franc.

Montreal Price Up Too

MONTREAL, Aug. 30: (CP)—Bar gold in London was up fourteen cents today at \$34.40 per ounce in Canadian funds. The Washington fixed price was \$34.12 in Canadian funds.

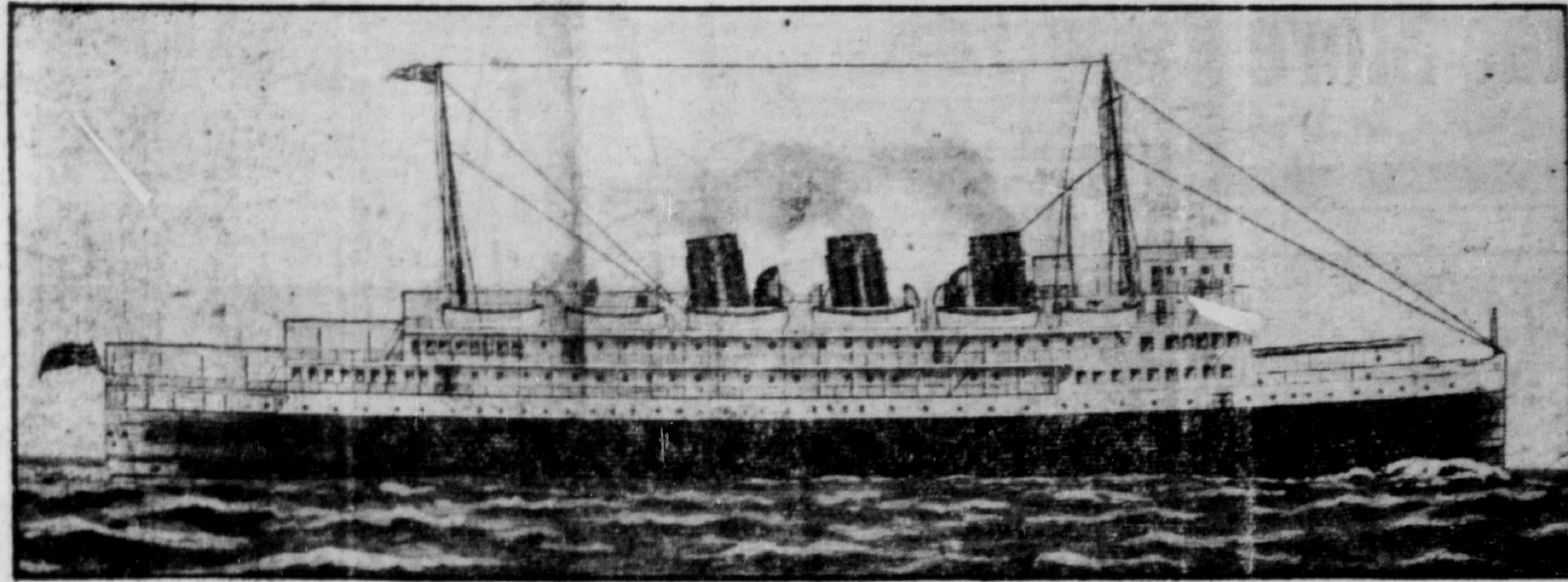

To Be Recommissioned

VANCOUVER, Aug. 30: (CP)—Negotiations are under way for the chartering of the steamer Prince Robert, which has been idle for months in Vancouver, to interests which propose to operate the ship on the Pacific Coast, presumably on a run southwards from Vancouver to Southern California and Mexico, officials of the Canadian National Railways said here yesterday. Before the ship can be recommissioned she will have to be given an extensive overhaul and reconditioning which work, it is said, may be done at Prince Rupert.

FAILED TO MAKE MARK

Pleads Guilty To Biting Policeman

John Duggan, Who Figured in Scene Downtown Last Week, Fined \$50 With Option of Two Months

John Duggan, who figured in a fracas on Third Avenue and Sixth Street one evening during Carnival Week, appeared in city police court last evening before S. D. Macdonald and G. H. Munro, justices of the peace, and, pleading guilty to a charge of assaulting a police officer, was fined \$50, with option of two months' imprisonment. Duggan bit Constable Harold Staines of the city detachment of the provincial police in the wrist while the officer was placing him under arrest.

After having spent a few days in the city, Mr. Webber left on last evening's train for the interior. After paying official visits to the lodges at Terrace, Smithers and Prince George he will proceed to Vancouver.

CUBS BEAT GIANTS IN BASEBALL

Chicago Goes One Up in Crucial Series—Detroit Tigers Improve American Lead

CHICAGO, Aug. 30: (CP)—Chicago Cubs shut-out New York Giants with a single run yesterday in the crucial National League leadership series which is in progress at Wrigley Field, the Cubs so far having won two games with the Giants taking one. The margin of leadership of the Giants is now four full games. St. Louis Cardinals continued their eleventh-hour threat by defeating the Brooklyn Dodgers at Sportsmen's Park and are but two games behind the Cubs.

In the American League, the first place Detroit Tigers divided honors with Philadelphia Athletics in a double-header at Shibe Park but their margin of leadership was increased to five full games as a result of the defeat of the New York Yankees by the Chicago White Sox at Yankee Stadium. The St. Louis Browns defeated the Washington Senators in a close game at the National Capital and displaced them from fifth place.

MEETING ON SHIP

Sub-Executive of Biological Board In Session Aboard Fisheries Patrol Steamer Givenchy

A meeting of the Pacific Coast sub-executive of the Biological Board of Canada was held at the first of the week aboard the fisheries patrol steamer Givenchy as the vessel steamed up Massett Inlet, Queen Charlotte Islands, carrying officials of the board and members of the scientific staff to McClintock Bay where an inspection was made of special research work being carried on there to determine the habits and movements of the pink salmon. It was probably the first time that a meeting of the board or any of its branches had been held under such circumstances. Present at the meeting were Prof. A. T. Cameron of the University of Manitoba, Winnipeg; Dr. A. H. Hutchinson of the University of British Columbia, Vancouver, and John Dybhavn of Prince Rupert, members of the board; J. J. Cowie of Ottawa, secretary-treasurer of the board; F. Weeks of Ottawa, Department of Finance; Dr. W. A. Clemens, director of the Department of Biological Station, Vancouver Island, and Dr. Neal Carter, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station.

Business of the meeting was largely of fall routine nature and such decisions as were arrived at were merely tentative and subject to confirmation by later meetings of the general executive and the annual meeting of the Biological Board in Ottawa next January.

OTTAWA, Aug. 30: (CP)—The first marketing scheme approved under the new federal legislation is announced by Hon. Robert Weir, minister of agriculture. It applies to British Columbia fruit growers.

PARIS, Aug. 30: (CP)—The French cabinet today announced economies totalling \$60,000,000 for 1935 in the budget and promised that there would be no further additional taxation regardless of opposition contention. The deficit, it is estimated, will probably approximate \$240,000,000.

LEGISLATE ON HEALTH

Provincial Government Carrying Out Actuarial Work Preparatory To Insurance Bill

VICTORIA, Aug. 30: (CP)—Fifty thousand hospital cases have been already examined and twenty thousand more are to be examined in connection with actuarial work undertaken by the provincial government in preparation for presentation of a state health insurance bill before the next session of the Legislature, Hon. Dr. George M. Weir, provincial secretary, announced yesterday.

SCULL RACE IS DELAYED

Bobby Pearce and Bill Miller Not Latter's Illness

TORONTO, August 30 (Canadian Press)—The world's professional sculling race scheduled for tomorrow between Bobby Pearce, giant Australian holder of the title, and Bill Miller of Philadelphia has been indefinitely postponed owing to the sudden illness of Miller. Besides the championship, a purse of \$5,000 is involved. The men's fifteen mile swim with \$8000 in prizes has been set back to Friday.

MORE SUGGESTIONS ARE MADE

This morning we received more suggestions as to Prince Rupert's needs in response to the advertisement asking for them. One was that the citizens of Prince Rupert take a pride in telling the world that their city is the best place in which to live and that they work for the advancement of the city and citizens.

This is an excellent suggestion. It is one that, if followed out, would prove of great advantage to the place and the people generally. We are here because it is the best place in the world for us. If it were not, we should be elsewhere. We exercise our right of protest against the weather, against those who administer public affairs, against the people and the political system and the rest of the world, especially any who happen to be more successful than ourselves. We have inherited this right to grumble from our British ancestors. Something like fifty million people live in Great Britain because it is the best place in the world for them and they enjoy grumbling at their hard lot. They point to the delights of other climates but they do not go there to enjoy them except for a holiday.

So Prince Rupert, with its population of something over six thousand, is becoming more stable because most of the people who live here are here to stay. They have adopted the city as their home. Many of them own their places and are improving them. The difficulty is that we sometimes magnify the disagreeable things and minimize the pleasant things of life and forget that every place has its unpleasant features. What we need to do is to meet in the best possible way the conditions that exist so that they will not injure or annoy us.

And above all let us follow out the suggestion and present to strangers the best features of our city and let us work individually and collectively to build a real city that will serve the whole north country, one that tourists and others will like to visit.

OTHER SUGGESTIONS

Other suggestions are that a mill at Port Edward be established to handle ores from the mines of northern and central British Columbia and that Prince Rupert become a naval base and a free port. These matters presumably would call for governmental action but it is all right to call attention to them and to interest the authorities in them.

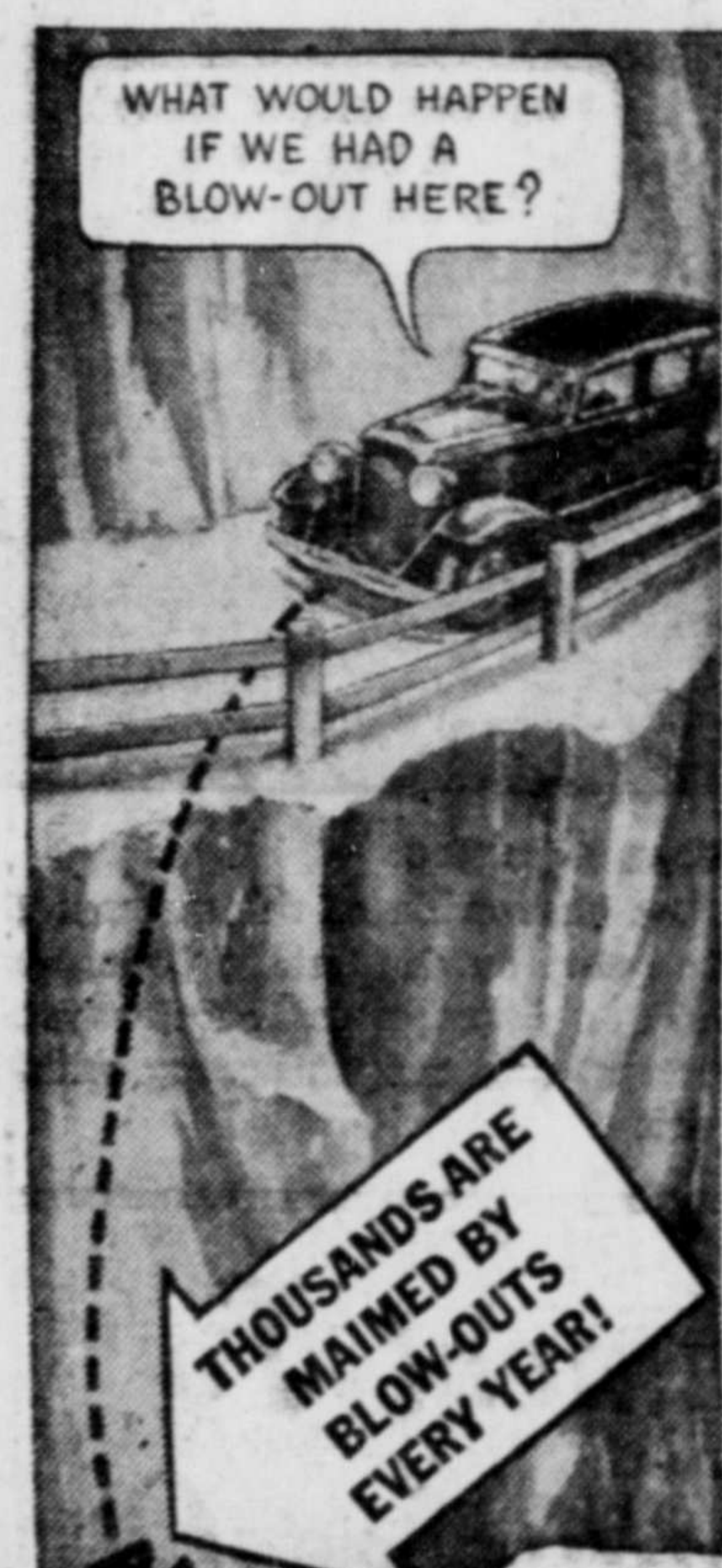

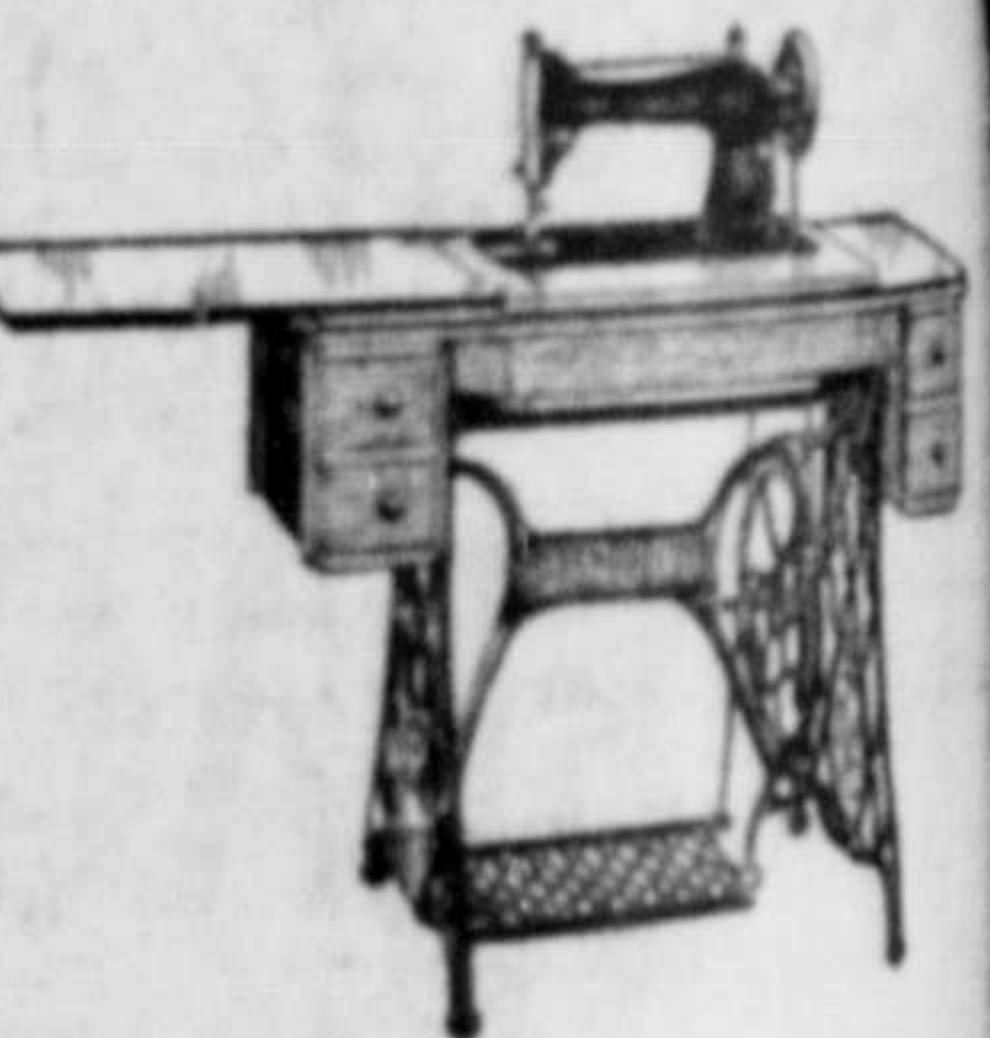
