HITLER IS ENDORSED AS PRESIDENT

DR. PROCTOR OF VANCOUVER DIES OF GUNSHOT WOUNDS

Vote of Nearly Ten To One In Favor of Dictator of Germany

Opposition Voice Considerably Greater Than in Voting Of Nine Months Ago When Country Went in Favor Of Dropping Out of League

BERLIN, Aug. 20: (CP)—Thirty-eight million Germans on Sunday sanctioned Adolph Hitler's assumption of the presidency in addition to the chancellorship but 4,200,000, almost twice as many as in the last plebiscite for withdrawal from the League of Nations nine months ago, voted "no." Great crowds gathered in the streets to celebrate the Nazi victory in the plebiscite. On the whole the plebiscite might be taken as a vast demonstration of the dictator's might. Hitler took cognizance of the opposition vote with the declaration: "We must and shall succeed in winning over the last ten percent of the nation for national socialism."

CRACK UP IN WALES

Pond and Sabelli Have Miraculous Escape When Plane Demolished Enroute From Rome To Dublin

NEWPORT, Pembrokeshire, Wales, Aug. 20.—George Pond and Cesare Sabelli, who recently flew across the Atlantic Ocean from New York to Ireland, where they crashed, going on to Rome after repairs had been made to their plane, hopped off from Rome at 7:02 Saturday morning for Dublin, Irish Free State, whence they had intended to make the return crossing of the ocean to the United States, but they ran into a heavy fog on the Irish Sea and turned back inland, crashing near here and demolishing their plane which buried its nose in the earth. Both fliers had a miraculous escape from injury or death. Both aviators were badly shaken up but suffered no serious injuries. It is not known as yet whether a new plane will be provided for Pond and Sabelli to make the return flight.

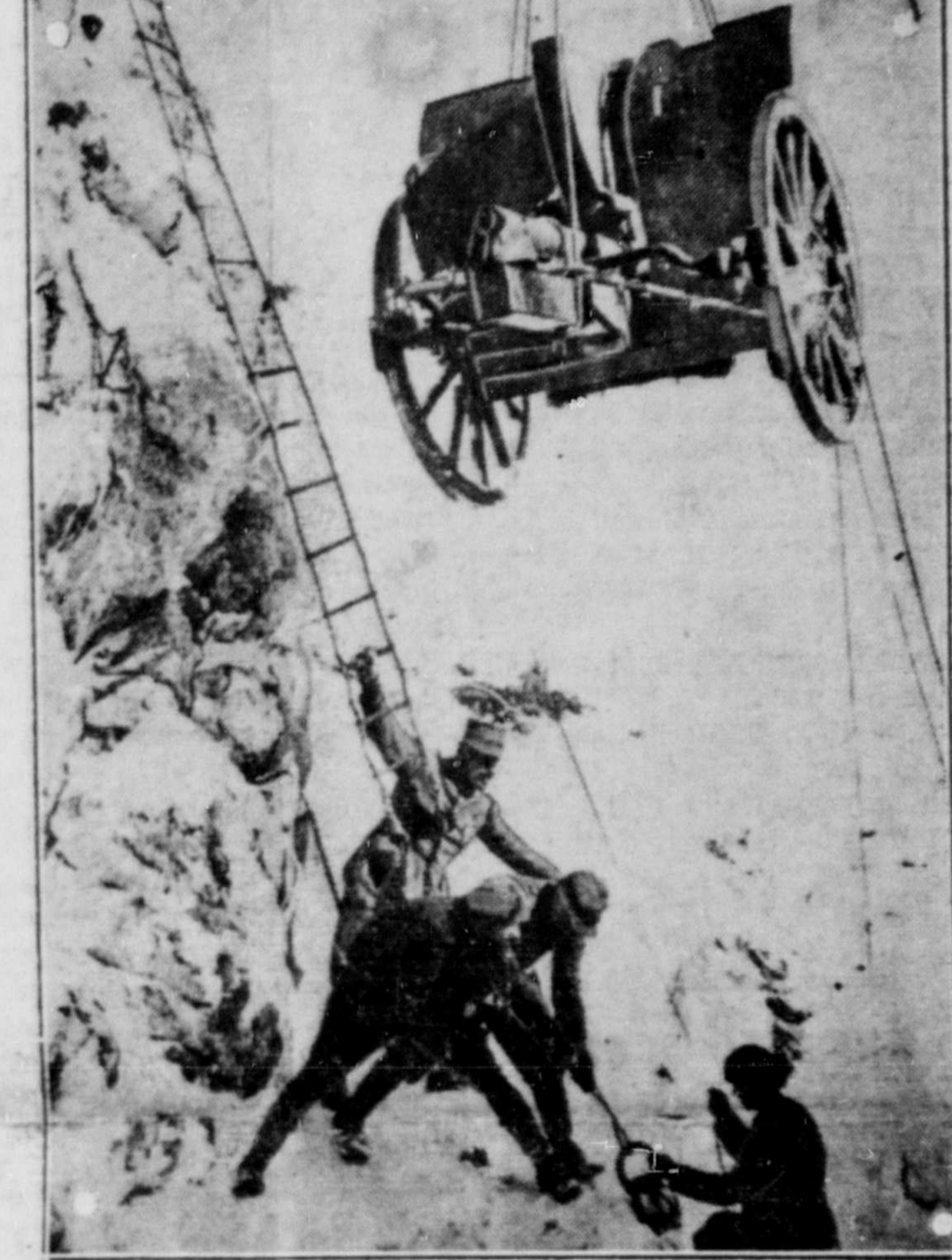
Millions of New Money Daily Now Being Turned Out

THINGS ARE IMPROVING AERONAUTS COME DOWN

Dominion Economic Index Indicates—Favorable Trade Balance Slightly Better

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.—Fundamental factors measuring the trend of economic conditions averaged higher in July than in the preceding month, according to records kept by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

The Dominion's exports exceeded imports by \$58,332,000 for the first seven months of the present calendar year as compared with \$57,126,000 during the corresponding period last year.

INTERIOR TRAGEDY

One Man Supposedly Shot by Accident, Other Believed to Have Taken His Own Life

Bodies of Steve Zadoronosky and Philip Ivanovitch, both with bullet wounds believed to have been fired from the same weapon, have been found in the Pineview district near Prince George. Zadoronosky, who had been berry picking, is believed to have been shot by Ivanovitch on August 12 in mistake for an animal and Ivanovitch is later thought to have committed suicide on August 17.

Details of the tragedy have been received at divisional headquarters of the provincial police here.

Three Killed As Italian Airplane Crashes and Burns

ROME, Aug. 20.—Three members of a crew of four of an Italian army airplane were reported killed when their machine crashed in a hangar of Cascina Malpensis airport, near Milan, and burned.

Well Known Medical Man, Allegedly Shot By Engineer, Passes

Timothy Sargood, Railwayman, Who is Said to Have Nursed Grievance, Continues to Make Recovery From Self-Inflicted Injuries

VANCOUVER, Aug. 20: (CP)—Dr. T. P. Proctor, aged 57, chief medical officer of the Canadian Pacific Railway and head medical examiner of the Shaughnessy Military Hospital died this morning as a result of an abdominal bullet wound allegedly inflicted at his office on August 3 by Timothy A. Sargood, Revelstoke locomotive engineer, who is believed to have nursed a grievance against the doctor for not having him reinstated in the railway service after having suffered an injury.

Ben Gleason Dies In Local Hospital

Was Sixty-Three Years of Age and Had Been Resident of Prince Rupert Three Years

The death occurred at the Prince Rupert General Hospital at 6 o'clock yesterday morning, following a lengthy illness, of Benjamin Gleason, aged 63, who was a baker by trade but who recently had been working on the Queen Charlotte Islands. Although born in Belgium, Gleason had been for years a naturalized British subject and had lived a long time in Canada, having been a resident of Prince Rupert three years. He was a widower and had one son who was killed in action during the Great War.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.—Fire losses in Canada for the week ending August 15 are estimated at \$442,500 as compared with \$140,200 during the preceding week and with \$198,800 during the corresponding week last year.

WINDSOR, Ont., Aug. 20.—Mrs. Sarah Croll, wife of Hon. David Croll, minister of welfare in the Hepburn government, escaped with minor injuries at the end of the week when a car in which she was riding crashed into a ditch near here.

Young Woman Of Port Simpson Is Dead In Hospital

Following an illness of some duration, Mrs. Violet Pollard of Port Simpson died early yesterday afternoon in the Prince Rupert General Hospital. She had been a patient in the institution for a week on the last occasion but had been there previously.

THAT KIDNAPPING CASE

Evidently Canada cannot afford to throw stones at the United States over her kidnapping cases and crime administration generally. In a sparsely inhabited country like ours it is much more difficult to hide criminal operations than in a country like the United States. Yet we find that, even in Prince Rupert district, perpetrators of murders are still at large. In Vancouver a girl was murdered in the best residential district and the perpetrator was never punished. Other crimes have escaped detection and now a kidnapping has been carried out boldly as if in defiance of the Canadian police.

We are evidently much like our neighbors to the south, no better and no worse. Usually we are a little more speedy in our criminal courts but our civil courts are not noted for their speed. We shall have to stop taking the pharisaical attitude and forget to say to Uncle Sam as we so often do: "I am holier than thou."

PROUD OF BRITISH CONNECTION

We are all proud of our British connection. We like to see the Navy here. There is a sense of security under the British flag but we must not hulk ourselves into a feeling of false security. The British Navy is not always here and when the big ships are absent all we have is two police boats, the Skeena and the Vancouver. It does not help us much to have a fleet of warships on the Atlantic, if we should be attacked, as we well might have been during the late war.

The history of the Canadian Navy is something like this: Sir Wilfrid Laurier years ago offered as Canada's contribution to defence of the Empire to start the development of a Canadian Navy.

Two training vessels were secured from Britain, manned at first by British officers and crew which were gradually replaced by Canadians. Then plans were laid for building in Canada some of the smaller warcraft. Tenders were called and figures submitted. But just about that time an election was held and Laurier and his party were defeated. The new Conservative administration cancelled the shipbuilding contracts, disposed of the training ships and introduced a bill into Parliament providing for a cash contribution to the British Navy. It passed the Commons but was defeated in the Senate and since that time little has been heard of the Canadian Navy except the provision of one or two destroyers to act as police boats.

The Naval Reserve and Sea Cadets still carry on and the Navy League does its best to fan the flame of naval value to the country but there has been little popular response throughout the country and no political party has suggested reviving the attempt to build a Canadian navy. The government has not been in a position for some years past to pay even its ordinary running expenses without adding to those expenses by keeping up a navy.

Helen Jacobs Defeats Sarah Palfrey To Capture U. S. Tennis Title

BERKELEY, Cal., Aug. 20.—Helen Jacobs of Berkeley, Cal., won the women's national tennis championship for the third successive year yesterday, conquering little Sarah Palfrey of Brookline, Mass., with vicious chop shots and spinners. She became the third player to win the championship three straight years, equalling the records of Molla Mallory and Helen Wills Moody.

Miss Jacobs' victory gained her permanent possession of the championship challenge cup.

Miss Jacobs and Miss Palfrey won the doubles title.

From the Waterfront

There was some stir on the Canadian National wharf Friday afternoon as H. M. S. Danae was tying up when one of the sailors slipped on a sandpile on the dock and fell off the wharf into the harbor. He was fished out without suffering any injury or ill-effects.

The twin-motored Boeing flying boat, which is accompanying the yacht Taconite on a cruise in northern waters, was in port Friday morning, going out again at 12:30 noon. The pilot is Clayton L. Scott, well known northern flier. The flying boat made a trip last week to Burns Lake district on angling bent with W. E. Boeing, Seattle ship and aircraft builder and owner of the Taconite.

With a good sized list of passengers, Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, arrived in port at 7:40 last evening from the south and sailed a couple of hours later for Anyox, Stewart and other northern points whence she will return here tomorrow morning southbound.

Making the final weekly tourist sailing to Alaska for the company this season, C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. Thomas Cliff, arrived in port at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon from Skagway and other northern points and sailed at 5:30 p.m. for Vancouver. Inaugurating a ten day schedule, the Princess Louise will be here next northbound on Thursday morning of this week. She will continue in service for several trips before being replaced for the winter by the Princess Norah. There were 235 passengers aboard the Louise on her arrival here from the north Saturday afternoon, seven disembarking at this port while one went south aboard her. Of the total 188 were round trip tourist passengers returning south.

H. M. S. Danae was opened to public inspection on Saturday and Sunday afternoons and the visiting light cruiser virtually swarmed with local folk on both occasions. Somehow or other, Prince Rupert people never tire of looking over naval craft and this year it was no exception to the rule. Men of the ship courteously showed the visitors about, explaining the various intricacies of the ship and its fighting equipment.
