INSULL LEAVES FOR AMERICA TODAY

DRAYTON PLEADS ON BEHALF OF FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

Eastern Financier Is Alarmed At Situation In B.C. He Declares

Government of This Province is Said to be Throwing Away \$860,000 in Revenue and Increasing Services and Expenditures in Excess of One Million

OTTAWA, April 12: (CP)—Expressing the hope that the provincial governments were not going to make it hard for the federal government to carry on, Sir Henry Drayton, former minister of finance, last night said he was alarmed with the situation in British Columbia. There, if figures he said he saw were true, the government was throwing away \$860,000 in revenue and increasing services and expenditures by a sum in excess of \$1,000,000.

St. Louis Judge Who Prosecuted James Fahey Is Heard From

OMAHA, Nebraska, April 12.—Hon. Frank S. Howell, former judge of the District Supreme Court of St. Louis, Missouri, who argued the case against Frank Grigware or James Fahey twenty-five years ago, says he doubts that Fahey is guilty. He recalls that, at the time of the trial of Grigware on a charge of mail robbery he was sentenced to life imprisonment, he (Howell) had a hard time convincing the court of Grigware's identification. Fahey, who was recently arrested at Jasper Park and is now being held at Edmonton for extradition proceedings on a charge of jail breaking, has denied the mail robbery although admitting that he escaped from penitentiary.

Wedded in Haste; Already Parted

NEW YORK, April 12.—Nila Cran Cook, former disciple of Mahatma Gandhi and her new husband, Albert N. Hutchins, whom she married after a whirlwind courtship on an ocean liner, are separated on their honeymoon, it is reported here.

Former Head Of Amps Ass'n Dies

Sergeant Richard Wilkinson Passes Away in Toronto at Age of Forty-Six Years. TORONTO, April 12.—Sergeant Richard Wilkinson, former president of the Dominion Amputations Association, died here yesterday at the age of 46 years.

Where Monoxide Gas Killed Nine Students



The Theta Chi fraternity house at Dartmore College, Hanover, N.H., where carbon monoxide gas killed nine students as they slept in their dormitory. A gas-connected pipe on the heating furnace in the basement permitted escape of gas. Owing to zero temperature all dormitory windows were tightly closed, which fact contributed to the fatality.

LINDBERGH CASE AGAIN

Ransom Money Said to Have Been Found on American Being Held in France

NEW YORK, April 12.—New developments in connection with the two-year old Lindbergh baby kidnapping mystery were rumored here yesterday in connection with the departure of two New York detectives for France to bring back a man giving the name of Stu Donnelly on charges of theft. It is said that some of the marked Lindbergh ransom money was found upon Donnelly who is being held by the French police for the American authorities.

WINTER IN ANTARCTIC

Blinding Snowstorm and Sixty-one Below Zero In Little America Yesterday

LITTLE AMERICA, Antarctic, April 12 (Canadian Press)—Winter is beginning to clamp down its hold upon Little America where Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd's second Antarctic exploration expedition is encamped preparatory to making its dash to the south Pole in addition to other exploratory activities with the opening of the next short summer season. There was a blinding snowstorm yesterday and the temperature reached sixty-one below zero.

INVESTMENT CONCERNS TO REDUCE INTEREST ALL OVER DOMINION

OTTAWA, April 12.—Mortgage, loan and insurance companies are heading off Dominion competition with the promise that interest rates will be reduced in Western Canada from eight to seven percent and in Eastern Canada to six or six and a half percent.

ALBERTA URGES PUBLIC OWNERSHIP OF CENTRAL BANK IN THIS COUNTRY

EDMONTON, April 12.—The Alberta Legislature yesterday passed a resolution urging that the proposed central bank for Canada should be publicly rather than privately-owned. Premier J. E. Brownlee was one of the principal supporters of the resolution.

TAX BOOST IS FAVORED

All around Increase in Income Charges Favored by United States Senate

WASHINGTON D.C., April 12.—At the conclusion of a wild session of hectic debate yesterday, the United States Senate voted in favor of a ten percent increase all around in income tax.

TWENTY-EIGHT OUNCES OF GOLD IS SHIPPED FROM LAWN HILL MINE

SKIDEGATE, April 12.—Ross Morrison has now shipped out twenty-eight ounces of placer gold from his claim at Lawn Hill. Owing to shortage of water for his sluice boxes, Mr. Morrison has been forced to suspend operations temporarily.

Miner at Michel Killed at Work

William Jenkins, Young Man Who Lived With His Mother, Lost His Life Yesterday

MICHEL, April 12.—William Jenkins was killed in an accident in a mine here yesterday. He was a single man and lived with his mother.

MEN ARE RESCUED

Only Six Men Are Still Left On Bering Sea Floes

Leader Saved Prof. Otto Schmidt in Weak Condition But Was Valiant

MOSCOW, April 12.—Up to this morning Russian airmen had rescued 84 out of 90 men marooned since February 28 on Bering sea ice floes and expected to take of the remaining six today. The men had been stranded following the sinking of the steamer Cheliuskin in the ice pack off the north coast of Siberia.

Prof. Otto Schmidt, leader of the large party of Russians who were aboard the Cheliuskin, was among those who were rescued by the airmen during the past two days but he was taken to Nome for medical treatment rather than to Cape Van Karem in Siberia where the most of the others were landed. The gallant leader of the expedition, which originally numbered more than one hundred, was very weak. He had been suffering from bronchial trouble in recent weeks but was taken aboard the plane only over his strenuous objections, having insisted that all the others be taken off the floes before he left.

Pilot M. T. Sletneff was also accompanied on the flight from Cape Van Karem to Nome by Prof. Ushakoff, leader the rescue expedition, Clyde Armistead and Bill Lavery, both mechanics of Fairbanks. The 375-mile flight was made in two hours and ten minutes. Prof. Schmidt was given medical attention immediately on arrival at Nome.

Times Better But Not Due to "New Deal" Says Ford

DETROIT, April 12.—Henry Ford stated yesterday that times were much better in the United States but that the improved conditions were not due to President Roosevelt's "new deal."

Aged Capitalist Is Removed To Smyrna On Way to Chicago

Long Flight From Justice Apparently Ended—Will Answer to Embezzlement and Grand Larceny Charges In Connection With Utilities Enterprises

ISTANBUL, Turkey, April 12: (CP)—Unless some unforeseen development now occurs, the long flight of Samuel Insull, former utilities magnate of Chicago, from justice in the United States appears to be ended. The aged capitalist, who was intercepted by the Turkish authorities a couple of weeks ago while on his way from Athens to Roumania where he had been offered refuge, was taken in charge today by the United States authorities and started for Smyrna, Syria, where he will be placed aboard an American vessel and taken to Chicago where he will answer to charges of embezzlement and grand larceny in connection with the collapse of his former great utilities enterprises. Over a year ago he was indicted by a Cook County grand jury—At that time he fled from Paris to Athens where he had been a fugitive from justice up to about a month ago.

BIG HUNT FOR GOLD

Eleven Hundred Prospectors To Take To Hills In B.C. This Spring

VICTORIA, April 12.—No less than 1100 British Columbia prospectors are in readiness to take to the hills this spring in the most intensive search for gold in the history of the province, it is stated at the Department of Mines headquarters here.

REPUDIATION OF DEBT BY BRITISH COLUMBIA IS FEARED BY BENNETT

OTTAWA, April 12.—Premier R. B. Bennett's threat of disallowing the Special Powers Act if invoked by Premier T. D. Pattullo of British Columbia is founded upon the suspicion that British Columbia plans repudiation of its debt, it is reported here. Premier Bennett threatened that he might veto the Special Powers Act if it came in conflict with the Dominion constitution or the British North America Act. It is also reported here that Premier Pattullo is prepared to challenge Premier Bennett to test the constitutionality of the Special Powers Act in the highest court of the Empire.

CHARGE BY TOM REID

Relief Supplies Valued at \$72,000 Alleged To Have Disappeared After Being Paid For

OTTAWA, April 12.—Tom Reid, Liberal member for New Westminster, charged in the House of Commons yesterday that \$72,000 of relief supplies had disappeared in British Columbia after being paid for.

Capt. George Black Honored By House: Was His Birthday

OTTAWA, April 12.—Tuesday was the sixty-first birthday of Capt. George Black, popular Speaker of the House of Commons, and member for Yukon, and formalities were waived for a few minutes as the members of all political stripes joined in the hearty singing of "See Him Smiling" in honor of the presiding officer.

Sterilization Recommended By Coroner's Jury Probing Powell River Murder Case

POWELL RIVER, April 12: (CP)—A coroner's jury investigating the slaying of ten year old John McFarlane yesterday returned a verdict stating that he "came to his death from a blow on the head by some blunt instrument in the hands of a person or persons unknown but that the evidence points to Frank Millen, a juvenile, who has confessed to the crime."

The verdict adds: "We recommend that, in the event of Frank Millen being found guilty of the murder and being found to be mentally deficient, sterilization methods be adopted."

CENTRES OF PUBLIC INTEREST

At one time anything Russian was of interest to the public. Then the interest shifted to Italy and to Germany and occasionally to Russia and Japan. For a week or two Victoria was all absorbing and all eyes were on Premier Pattullo. Today Ottawa is the centre and Premier Bennett is the star actor in the comedy. People are watching Ottawa closely and wondering what is about to happen there.

WORK AND WAGES FIRST

During the recent campaign T. D. Pattullo promised the people of this province work and wages. In that effort he expected to get the co-operation of Premier Bennett as a national duty. Judging from news coming out of the national capital, Mr. Bennett may refuse to co-operate. If he takes that stand the British Columbia premier will be reminded that "work and wages" was what he promised and what he must give the people of this province, no matter what else may be neglected. Men who have been without remunerative work for years are not interested in hearing of financial recovery unless it makes it possible for them to finance their households. Already there is more employment in the province as the result of increased confidence and greater demand for commodities but there must be more than that. If Mr. Bennett will not co-operate in this work, then it is just too bad for Mr. Bennett. But we still think he will. If he does not, we shall be sorely disappointed in him.

INVESTMENTS IN CANADA

There is something like two and a quarter billion dollars of money from Great Britain invested in Canada and nearly four billion dollars of United States money. From all other countries the amount invested in this country is considerably less than two billions. This should indicate that United States more than any other country would be interested in the welfare of Canada. Set against the financial interest is the sentimental interest, the interest which comes from being a member of the same empire. It is probable therefore that Britain is much more interested in the welfare of Canada than is the United States. British money is also invested in the United States in huge sums so there is a financial tie there too. An interesting triangle!

GRAIN MAN IS CHARGED

Arthur Cutter, Prominent Chicago Pit Operator, Ordered To Court.

CHICAGO, April 12.—On charges of violation of the Grain Futures Act laid personally by Secretary of Agriculture Wallace Arthur W. Cutter, prominent Chicago wheat market operator, was yesterday ordered to appear in Washington on May 14 to show why his trading privileges should not be withdrawn. The action of the secretary has caused a sensation in trading quarters here.

Cutter, among other things, is charged with making false reports on his commitments and with keeping false accounts in connection with his trading activities.

Bullish Tendency On Stock Market

All Around Advances Shown In Trading in New York

NEW YORK, April 12.—There was a bullish tendency on the New York Stock Exchange Tuesday with all issues showing advances from fractions up to two points. Closing averages were: Industrials, 105.05, up 1.51; rails, 49.89, up .81; utilities, 25.85, up .14, and bonds, 92.34, up .13.

The upward movement continued yesterday when railway shares and special issues gained from one to five points, with increased buying, the close being irregular with the trend of silvers and steels down in late dealings. Labor difficulties and the threat of an automobile strike at Detroit helped to contribute to the late weakness.

Yesterday's turnover was 1,500,000 shares, closing averages being as follows: Industrials, 105.16, up .11; rails, 50.28, up .39; utilities, 25.85, unchanged and bonds, 94.46, up .12.

RECEIVING EXCURSION

Queen Charlotte Islands Look Forward to Visit of Vancouverites

SKIDEGATE, April 12.—Preparations are already being made for the Vancouver Board of Trade excursion to the Queen Charlotte Islands. There will be over one hundred passengers. The steamer will call at Queen Charlotte City at 8 a.m. June 8 and will leave at 2 p.m. giving all the passengers time to motor up the east coast as far as Tlell and Port Clements on the Pattullo Highway. Many interesting sights can be seen on this motor trip. They will pass through the village of Skidegate Mission, the home of the Haidas, the remnants of a once mighty nation. They will pass the Dominion Government Radio Station at Dead Tree Point.

At Tlell the visitors will see a little bit of old England, as there is an English settlement at this beautiful spot. Deer can be seen grazing in the fields among the cattle, also large sand dunes on the longest gold-bearing beach in the British Empire, a hundred and fifty miles long. Those wishing to indulge in a few hours fishing will find the Tlell hard to beat for several varieties of game trout.

On the trip up from the Kelley Logging camp at Atli Inlet can be seen the remains of two of the largest Haida villages, Tanoo and Skedance, with most of the totem poles still standing.

Three Suspects in Toronto Slugging Case Are Released

TORONTO, April 12.—Three men who were being held as suspects in the case of Clelland Russell, British Columbia born druggist, who is believed to have been killed by being slugged over the head recently while stepping from his car here, have been released by the authorities after questioning.

WAR TIME SPY HERE

Ignatius Timothy Trebisch Lincoln
On Coast Enroute to Europe to
Found Buddhist Monastery

VANCOUVER, April 12: (CP)—Ignatius Timothy Trebisch Lincoln who was a famous German spy during the Great War and who spent three years in the Tower of London as a prisoner, has been granted the privilege of passing through Canada enroute to Europe where he will form a Buddhist monastery.

Lincoln arrived from China aboard the liner Empress of Russia Monday night and was held by the immigration authorities until yesterday.

He must leave Canada by May 5. He is accompanied by four Buddhist monks and six nuns.

Military Honors Are Accorded To Col. Ira Biffell

CHICAGO, April 12.—Full military honors were accorded at the funeral here of the late Col. Ira Biffell, pioneer American airman under whose instruction Col. Charles A. Lindbergh learned flying. A score of noted flyers were in attendance to pay final tribute.

Two weeks ago, Biffell, suffering from heart trouble and growing blindness, was discovered by a newspaper reporter to be dying in the charity ward of a local hospital. Friends of earlier flying days had him removed to a private ward where he died a few days ago.
