



And for two years she played second fiddle only to Poland's Stella Walsh, Slender and pretty, the Montreal girl was the real queen of the Canadian track and most critics allowed she would rule the Empire sprint world before this summer was over. Hilda lost just enough drive in two years to make this out of the question.

Three youngsters who were juniors in 1932 came along at London, Ont., and finished one-two-three in 100 yards final. Miss Strike hadn't even reached the final. She watched from the sidelines while Audrey Dearnley, Peggy Matheson and Betty White romped in.
