# Congress Being Asked To Make Route Survey And Start on Building

Sum of \$2,100,000 For Project Requested-Would Connect Northwestern States With B.C., Yukon and Alaska

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 9: (CP)-Delegate Diamond of Alaska introduced a bill in Congress on Monday to authorize survey and construction of a highway to connect northwestern United States with British Columbia, Yukon and Alaska in co-operation with Canada. The bill would authorize a sum of \$100,000 for a survey and \$2,000,000 for roads in Alaska to connect the territory's road system with Dawson.
