# SOLDIERS FOR SEATTLE WATERFRONT FIRE YESTERDAY AT KINGSTON, ONTARIO, PENITENTIARY

## Mayor Dore Asking Federal Government To Provide Militia

Alaska Becoming Affected and Every Effort is Being Made to Move Ships—Ketchikan Makes Inquiry in Regard to Obtaining Meat From Here

P. Burns Co. Ltd. of this city today shipped fresh meat to Ketchikan from the local abattoir, that town having run short owing to failure of regular supplies to arrive from Seattle on account of the longshoremen's strike. This is the first shipment that has been made from here but, if the shipping tie-up continues, it is likely that more meat will have to be sent from Prince Rupert not only to Ketchikan but also to Juneau and other Alaska points.

SEATTLE, May 16: (CP)—Federal troops were asked for today by Mayor John F. Dore of Seattle to guard the waterfront so that non-union men may work ships during the longshoremen's strike which is now starting on its second week. Food and other supplies are running short in many Alaska towns and every effort will be made to move the ships.

At Longview, Wash., the Long-Bell lumber mills are closed down with three thousand men out of work. Two Everett mills shut down today, releasing 900 men.

**Violence Continues**  
SAN FRANCISCO, May 16:—Considerable violence continues to be reported from various Pacific Coast ports as the longshoremen's strike continues and special steps are being considered by the authorities to prevent further outbreaks. Meantime, conciliation negotiations are proceeding and hope is expressed in some quarters that the strike may be settled within a few days.

**Alaska Shipping Affected**  
KETCHIKAN, May 16:—With reports received here indicating that there may be an early settlement of the longshoremen's strike at Seattle, it is not expected Ketchikan fish shipments will be affected to any extent by the tie-up. Although there is some uncertainty as to northbound sailings from Seattle here which has already caused a shortage of certain perishable foods and other products, there has been little interference with southbound sailings. Certain freight is not being accepted northbound from Seattle including fish for here. Fresh meat is running short here and inquiries have been sent to Prince Rupert with a view to getting a supply there.

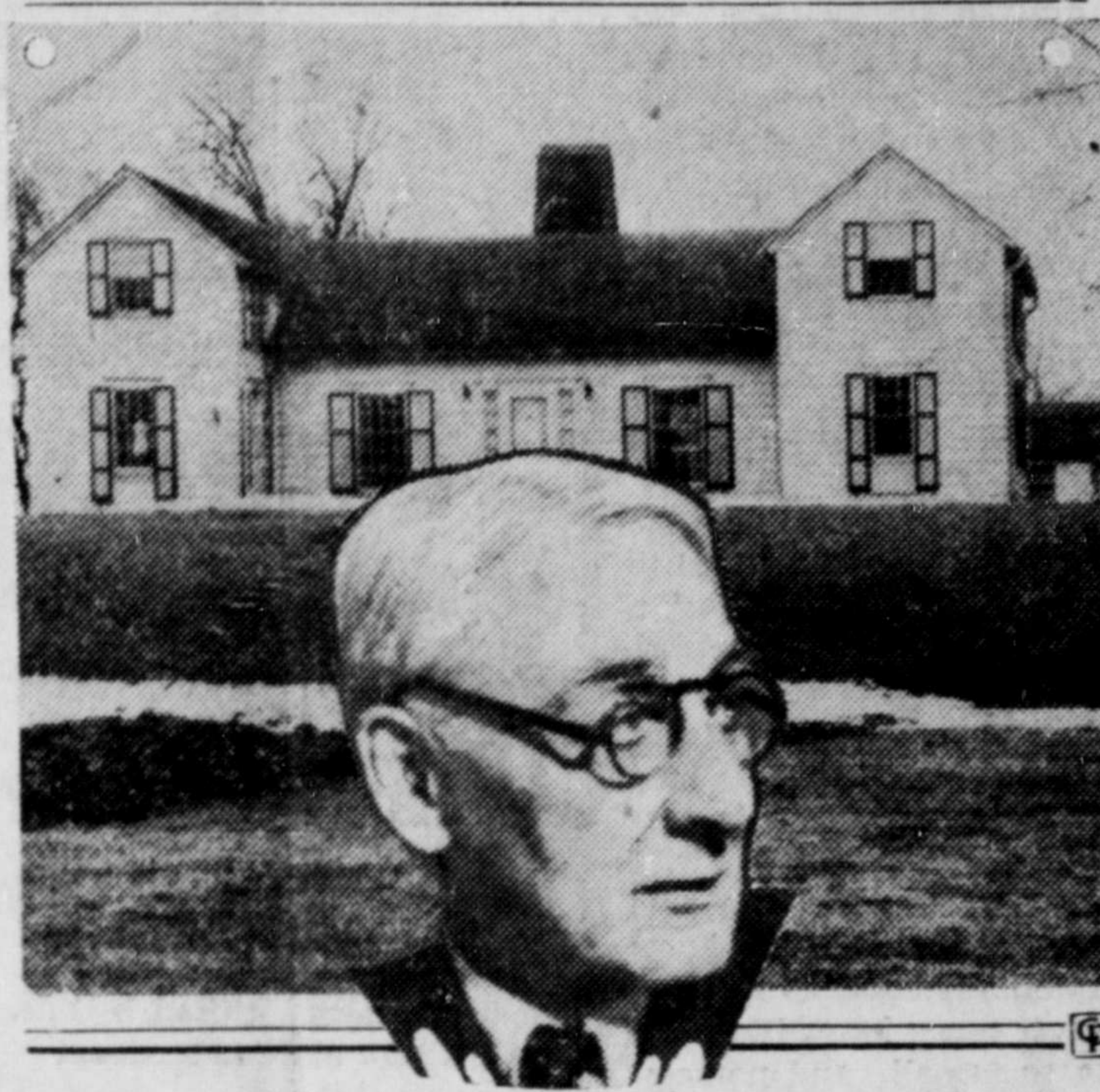

## BUDGET IS APPROVED

Sugar Tax Reduction To Become Effective This Sunday Instead of On July 1

OTTAWA, May 16 (Canadian Press)—The House of Commons last night without recorded vote carried the budget of Hon. Edgar N. Rhodes, minister of finance, following several weeks of debate. The main vote on the budget came after a new Liberal amendment had been ruled out of order by Speaker Black and a Progressive amendment had been voted down by 157 to 14. A previous Liberal amendment had also been ruled out of order as had been a previous Progressive amendment.

The reduction under the budget of the tax on sugar from two to one percent will become effective at midnight next Sunday instead of on July 1 as originally announced. Premier R. B. Bennett stated that the change had been made to accommodate British Columbia canners, the season being earlier in the western province than in the East.

## Penal Institution Is Set Ablaze by Inmates; \$50,000.00 Damage

Scenes of Tense Excitement as Fighting of Conflagration Proceeded But Officials Were in Control and All Are Accounted For

KINGSTON, Ont., May 16: (CP)—Damage estimated at between \$25,000 and \$50,000 was done to the Portsmouth Penitentiary here late yesterday afternoon as a result of a fire which is believed to have been started by convicts and which was reported last night to be under control. The "change" room in the south dome was destroyed. All prisoners were accounted for, it was officially announced. There were scenes of tense excitement as the fire fighting proceeded but prison officials and guards had the situation well in hand at all times and there was no demonstration of prisoners.

## ARREST IN DEATH CASE

R. A. Simpson Being Held in Connection With Killing of F. Knapp On Railway Line

VICTORIA, May 16: (CP)—R. A. Simpson has been arrested in connection with the death of F. Knapp, whose body was found Sunday on the Canadian National Railway tracks near Valemount on the Vancouver-Red Pass line, the provincial police announce.

An open verdict had been returned at the inquest to the effect that Knapp had been killed by a sharp instrument in the hands of an unknown person. Knapp had been stabbed in the shoulder and groin.

## PASSES AWAY DOWN COAST

Third Son of Rev. and Mrs. Peter Kelly Died at Bella Bella Hospital

BELLA BELLA, May 16:—Peter Hartley Kelly, third son of Rev. and Mrs. Peter R. Kelly of Ocean Falls, died at the Bella Bella Hospital on May 2 following a lengthy illness. Twenty-three years of age, he was a graduate of the Provincial Normal School in Vancouver and had also attended the University of British Columbia for two years.

Rev. Peter Kelly, father of deceased, is missionary in charge of the United Church mission boat Thomas Crosby which operates out of Ocean Falls, both the young man's father and mother being from Skidegate, Queen Charlotte Islands.

## LINER OLYMPIC HITS LIGHTSHIP AND THREE OF CREW ARE KILLED

NEW YORK, May 16: (CP)—Three members of the crew of the Nantucket Shoals lightship were killed and four are missing as a result of a collision with the White Star liner Olympic during a dense fog yesterday. The lightship was rammed and sunk by the liner.

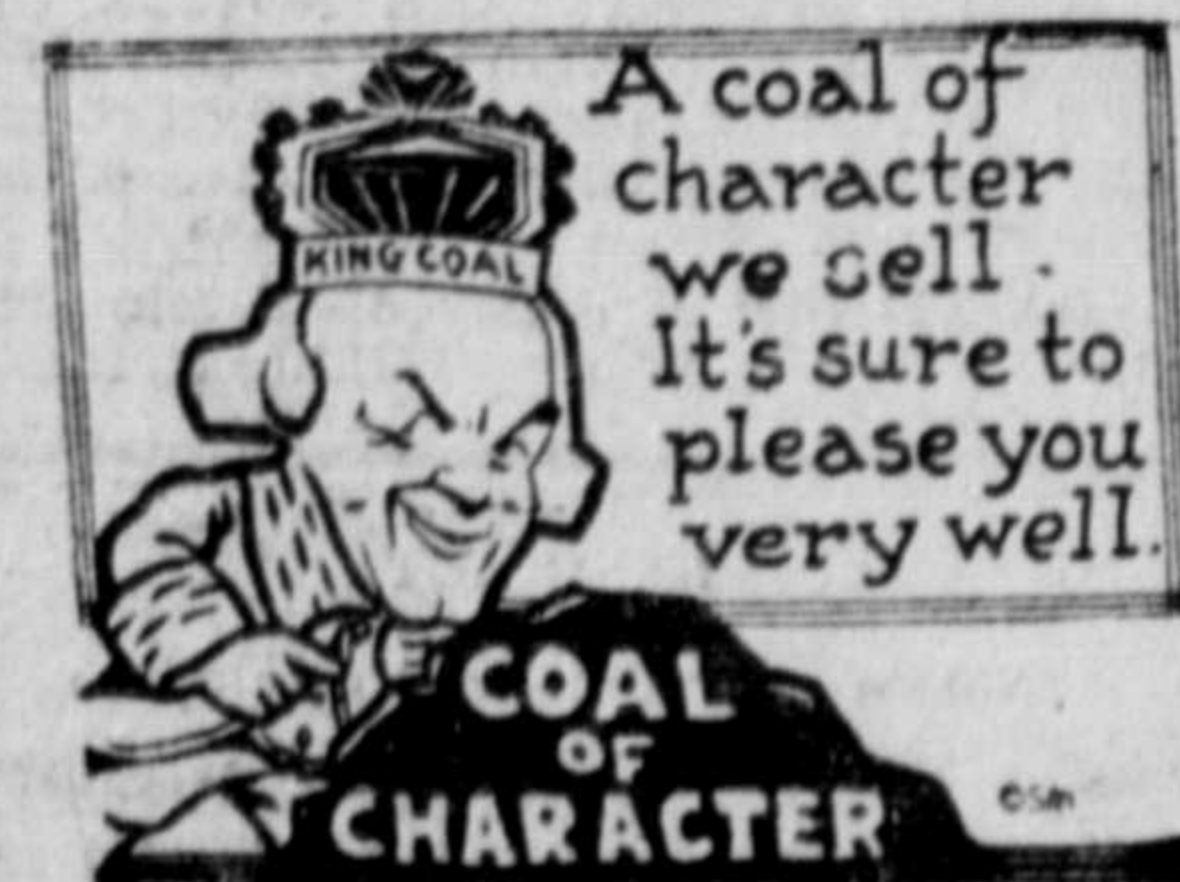

### COMMUNITY HALL HERE

Gyro Club Receives Report Upon Project Which Will be Placed Before Other Organizations

The Prince Rupert Gyro Club, at its regular monthly business luncheon yesterday with President W. H. Tobey in the chair, received a report from a committee consisting of H. N. Brocklesby, chairman, Dr. R. G. Large and S. J. Jabour on a new community hall undertaking for Prince Rupert. The proposal is to take the project up with other public and semi-public bodies in the city with a view to determining whether the present is considered an opportune time to proceed with same.

No financing plans were offered in the report which was accompanied by a set of plans for a building which it is estimated would cost \$10,000 not including foundations or heating arrangements.

The building as tentatively planned would measure 100 by 50 feet, would have a full regulation size basketball floor, room for three badminton courts, a stage, balcony, ladies' and men's dressing rooms and kitchen. It would have seating capacity for 600 persons and would be suitable for meetings, dances, etc. as well as for the playing of games. The committee feels that sufficient revenue could be derived from such a building to take care of ordinary maintenance, janitorial services, etc.

The Gyro Club, which considers that such a project would be impossible for any single organization to undertake but which feels that it should be a community undertaking, took no action other than to receive the report of the committee and take steps to have the matter placed before other organizations. The possibility of adding a swimming pool to the plans was discussed.

The club decided to send a delegate to the annual international convention to be held in Calgary in June. The delegate is expected to be Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth.

A resolution from the local Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees seeking support in the move for the restoration of wage cuts to lower paid employees of the Canadian National Railways was considered and, while the members individually were sympathetic, it was pointed out that club constitution did not permit of formal action on such matters.

The club raffle was won by M. A. Burbank.
