JAPANESE FAVORING DISARMAMENT NEW MERCHANT MARINE SUBSIDY PLAN IN GREAT BRITAIN

Non-Aggression and Non-Menace Said To Be Principle Wanted

His Country Actuated by Spirit of Disarming in Insisting Upon Abolition of Naval Ratios, Declares Foreign Minister Hirota

TOKIO, Nov. 30: (CP)—Japan's foreign minister, Koki Hirota, told the Diet today that the government is "endeavoring to establish firmly the principle of non-menace and non-aggression." In insisting upon abolition of the ratio principle, the minister declared that the country was actuated by a "spirit of disarmament."

TRADE HAS INCREASED

British House Hears That Imperial Conference Facts Have Been Beneficial

LONDON, Nov. 30: (CP)—Major B. Caldwell, under-secretary of the Dominions in charge of overseas trade, told the House of Commons Tuesday that, since the Imperial Conference trade agreements had gone into force a couple of years ago, there had been an increase of more than thirty-three percent in trade of the Mother Country with the Dominions. Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa all had increased their purchases from the United Kingdom.

After hearing Major Caldwell's statement the House rejected by a vote of 358 to 35 a Liberal amendment to the Speech from the Throne replying to the government's proposal for falling to adopt policies leading to a revival of Imperial and world trade.

TURIN, Italy, Nov. 30:—Fifty persons were injured yesterday in the explosion near here of a gasoline train which blew up and burst into flames.

SAAR PLEBISCITE AND MARSEILLES KILLINGS COMING BEFORE LEAGUE

GENEVA, Nov. 30:—December 5 or 6 were reported in reliable quarters yesterday as being the probable dates for the opening of special meetings of the League of Nations when two important problems, both fraught with eruptive possibilities as far as the peace of Europe is concerned, will be considered. One of these matters is the Saar plebiscite and the other the Jugoslav protest holding Hungary officially responsible for the assassinations at Marseilles of King Alexander of Jugo-Slavia and Foreign Minister Louis Barthou of France.

Hauptmann Spends Thanksgiving Day In Cold Solitude

HUNTERDON, N.S., Nov. 30:—Bruno Richard Hauptmann, the most-discussed prisoner in the United States today, who is held in Hunterdon County jail awaiting trial for the kidnap-murder two and a half years ago of Charles Augustus Lindbergh jr., had his Thanksgiving dinner alone in the bull pen yesterday as guards stood watch over him. He is not allowed to use metal dishes but Mrs. McRae, wife of the warden, provided him with cardboard dishes.

Other prisoners in the jail had their Thanksgiving dinner with Warden and Mrs. McRae.

SILVER IS IMPORTED

Biggest Individual Shipment Ever Reached Montreal to Fill December Deliveries In Canada

MONTREAL, Nov. 30: (CP)—To fill December deliveries on the Canadian Commodity Exchange, the largest individual shipment of silver ever to reach Montreal, approximately 740,000 ounces, arrived yesterday by train from Chrome, N.J., having been shipped by the American Metal Co.

The shipment was consigned to two companies licensed by the exchange as official warehouses. Yesterday's silver receipts brought the total in licensed vaults of the exchange to 2,214,853 ounces.

Embezzlement Case Against Insull To Be Proceeded With

CHICAGO, Nov. 30:—The State of Illinois will press embezzlement charges against Samuel Insull sr. in connection with the collapse of his utilities enterprises in spite of his acquittal on charges of using the mails to defraud. January 7 has been tentatively set as the date for the hearing of the embezzlement charges.

Millions Being Made Available To Assist Mercantile Shipping

Vast Scheme, Effective Next Year, Announced in London Today—New Building to be Encouraged Under Government's Project

LONDON, Nov. 30: (CP)—A vast plan of the government to subsidize the merchant marine effective next year was announced today. Ten million dollars will be placed at the disposal of coastal freight lines and fifty millions will be advanced to encourage new construction or the re-outfitting of old units of the merchant marine. Shipping firms which benefit must scrap a certain proportion of existing tonnage.

Great Benefit Would Be Done Coal Mines and Much Saved By Making Gas and Fuel Oil Here

VANCOUVER, Nov. 30: (CP)—Eighteen million dollars could be conserved annually and enormous benefit done the coal mines of British Columbia through the erection of a modern hydrogenation plant, James Dickson, chief inspector of mines, told delegates to the British Columbia branch of the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy in session here.

Such a plant, using coal, could produce all the gasoline and fuel oil needed in the province, turning out gasoline at fourteen to sixteen cents a gallon, Mr. Dickson said.

REMEDY STILL NEEDED

Yesterday Colonel J. W. Nicholls gave an interesting address on the economic situation before the Rotary Club in which he was critical of the recently proposed big public works scheme. He admitted that, while men and women were ill-fed and without proper clothes and at the same time the granaries were filled to overflowing and clothing material was being destroyed, there was something wrong. Unemployment was the problem with which the statesmen of the country had to deal. Unfortunately he made no proposal as to how to deal with the difficulty. Instead of that he assumed the more easy role of critic.

Only a few suggestions have been made as to how to deal with the unemployment problem and these have come mostly from the workers themselves. One group advocates that the workers shall take over all industries and wealth by force. Another group plans to do the same "by constitutional means." Labor unions have made an attempt to meet the situation by reducing the hours and days of labor in some trades. With a few notable exceptions the statesmen of the country have been silent and so have the larger employers. Premier Pattullo proposed to put the unemployed to work by using the national credit and, more recently, Hon. H. H. Stevens has made a proposal for spending a huge sum to put men to work on construction. No other outstanding proposals have been made.

We suggest that what is needed today is less criticism but more constructive proposals. There seems to be a tendency to let things go on in the hope that they will right themselves. While we expect conditions to improve as a result of the present upward swing, we have no hope that they will take up the slack permanently. The improvement will be for a few years only and then we shall have another period when the unemployed will be much more outspoken than they have been during the depression from which we are now emerging. They will demand that they be given work and wages and they will receive the backing of many thousands of those who realize the injustice under which they are suffering.

We are living in the Twentieth Century and we must realize that conditions under which men and women existed in the Nineteenth Century will not be accepted today.

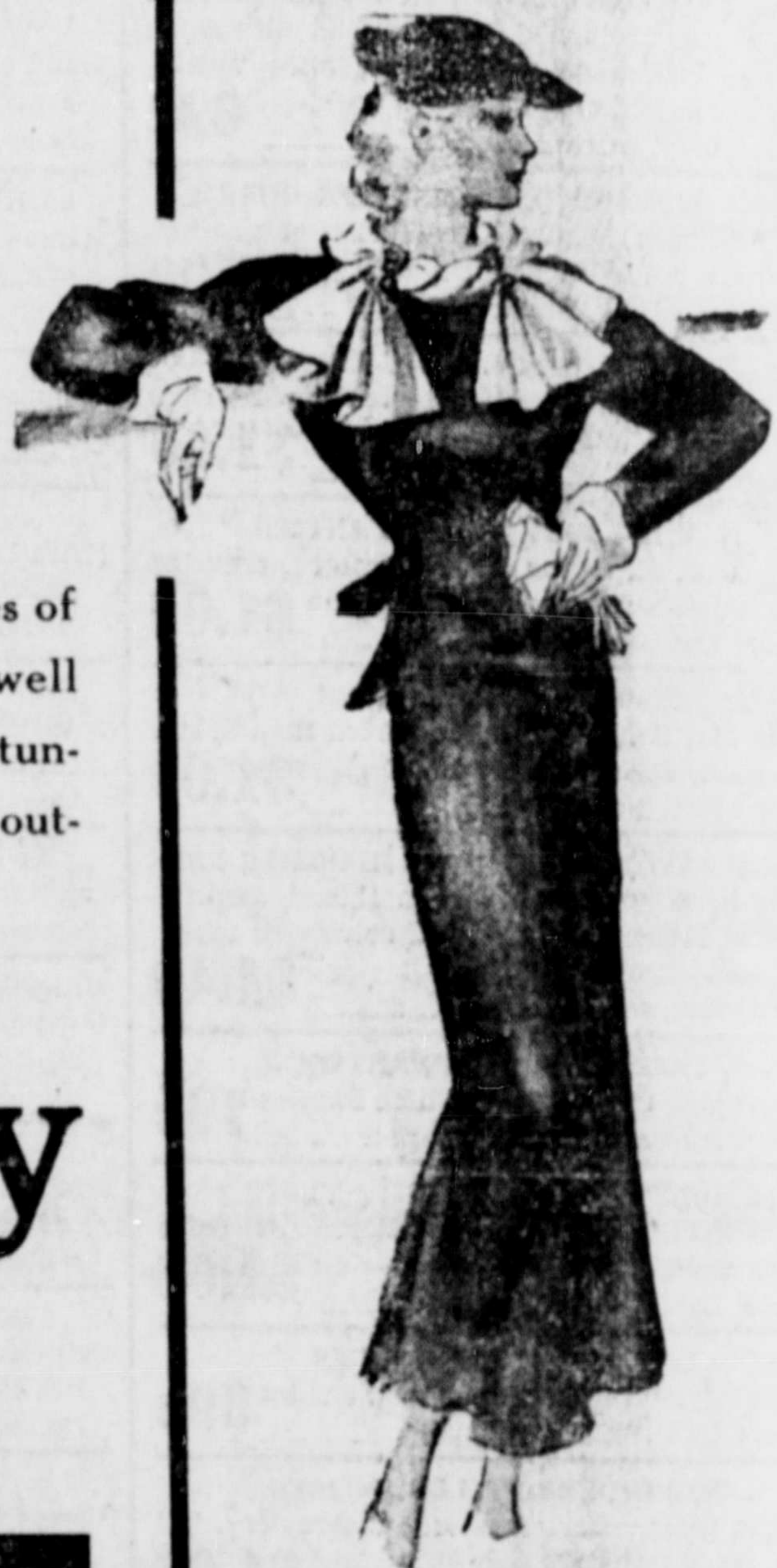

ECONOMICS IN CANADA

Lieut.-Col. Nicholls Speaks Against Inflation and Municipal Extravagance

REVIEWS OTHER COUNTRIES

Would be Calamity to Set Country Back Now it is Making Good Progress, He Says

What is good for the United States, for Italy, for Germany, for Russia or for any other country is not necessarily the right thing for Canada, declared Lieut.-Col. J. W. Nicholls, comptroller of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., in addressing the Rotary Club yesterday afternoon on "Canada's Future National Economy." Canada was as yet undeveloped and would have to borrow capital to enable it to make proper use of its resources. The Dominion must export in order to pay the debts on former loans and the debts must be paid as a matter of national honor and also in order that people with capital might be attracted here.

While Colonel Nicholls did not develop his own ideas of how the country could get out of its present difficulties, he gave a number of valuable and interesting warnings as to what not to do. He spoke very strongly against the proposal to raise money in such huge sums as proposed. This would be inflation and history shows that inflation was undesirable. It had been proved undesirable in a number of differ-

ent countries. Inflation was defined by Webster as "blowing up with gas or air." That seemed to define it fairly accurately. He quoted examples in the United States from 1873 to 1879, in France from 1790 to 1797 and again 15 years ago. Daniel Webster said: "Of all the contrivances for cheating the laboring classes none has been more effective than that which deludes them with paper money."

Canada was now on the upward grade, the speaker said, and it would be a calamity to set the country back by destroying the confidence which is gradually returning. He urged the municipalities set their own houses in order and he congratulated Premier Pattullo on his stand in refusing to see the municipal representatives. They had got themselves into the mess by ineptitude and extravagance and should get out of it themselves.

Dealing with the proposal to finance the schools from an additional income tax, the Colonel suggested it was easy to recommend that someone else should pay. In British Columbia today the income tax was higher than in any other country. Corporations already paid 22 1/2% of their profits in income tax if they made any profits and, if they did not, they had to pay other taxes. They paid municipal taxes, sales tax, licences, stamp tax, to such an extent that the average corporation paid over half of its profits in taxes.

Congratulates Hart

The speaker congratulated Finance Minister Hart on realizing that if any further increases of taxes were made capital would be driven out. Very soon nothing would be left but the school teachers and the unemployed. He did not wish to undervalue the services of the

school teachers. He realized their problems and sympathized with a profession that was working faithfully and well under extreme difficulties but he blamed those who were unable to recognize the present condition.

In the opening of his address, Colonel Nicholls spoke of the unemployment problem as the most important with which the country has to wrestle. There were millions of underfed and poorly clothed people with granaries full and cotton being plowed under. The reason for the condition was the war which had speeded up production and which was followed by a period of jazz and extravagance. Each country was trying to deal with the difficulty in its own peculiar way. United States could afford to spend because they were today a creditor country. Canada was in a different position.

The speaker gave interesting summaries of the conditions in Russia, which he described as having returned to a system of capitalism. Italy and Germany were adopting other methods. Each were old countries with differing problems. In South America the constitutional changes were brought about by assassination. All had their problems and methods. None had been as effective as those in Britain.

At the conclusion, President J. J. Little thanked the speaker for his excellent address.

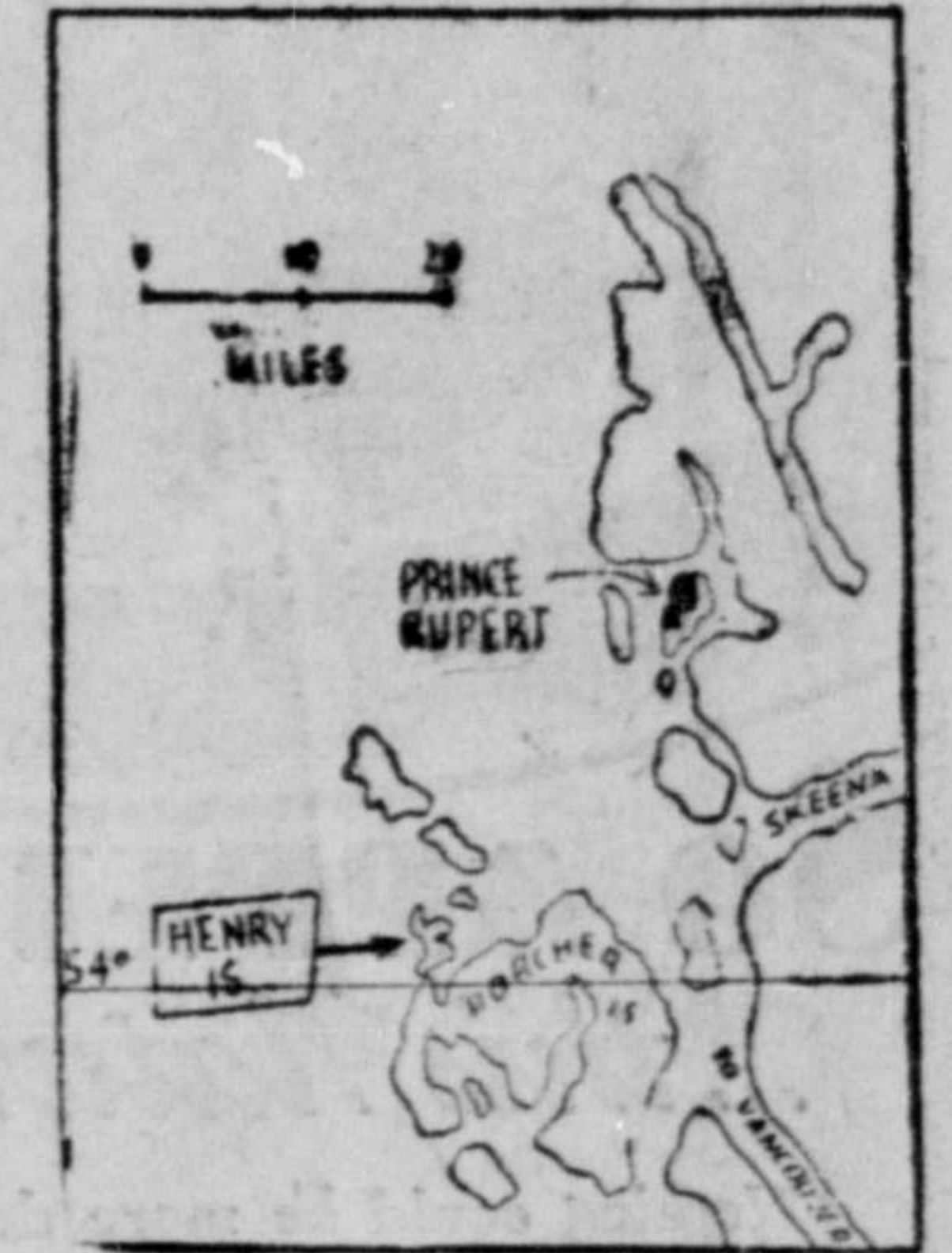
Demonstrations Banned in Paris

SPORT CHAT

Townsend expects to win back the title in this bout despite that he was thoroughly outpointed by Wallace before. The battle will be followed with much interest. Wallace has many admirers here following the bout in the city some months ago when he cleaned up on Jack McEvoy.

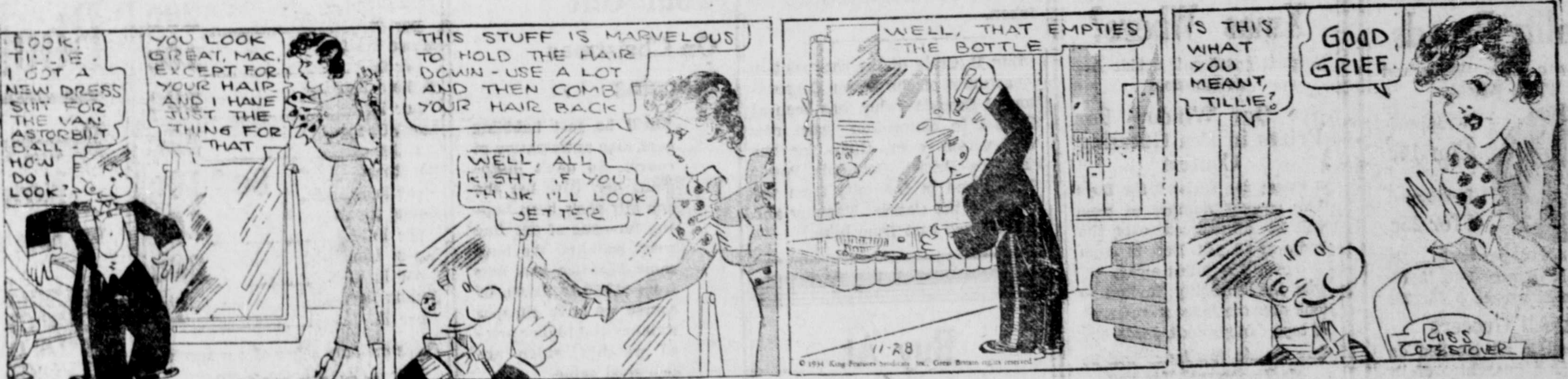
