**High School Pupils**

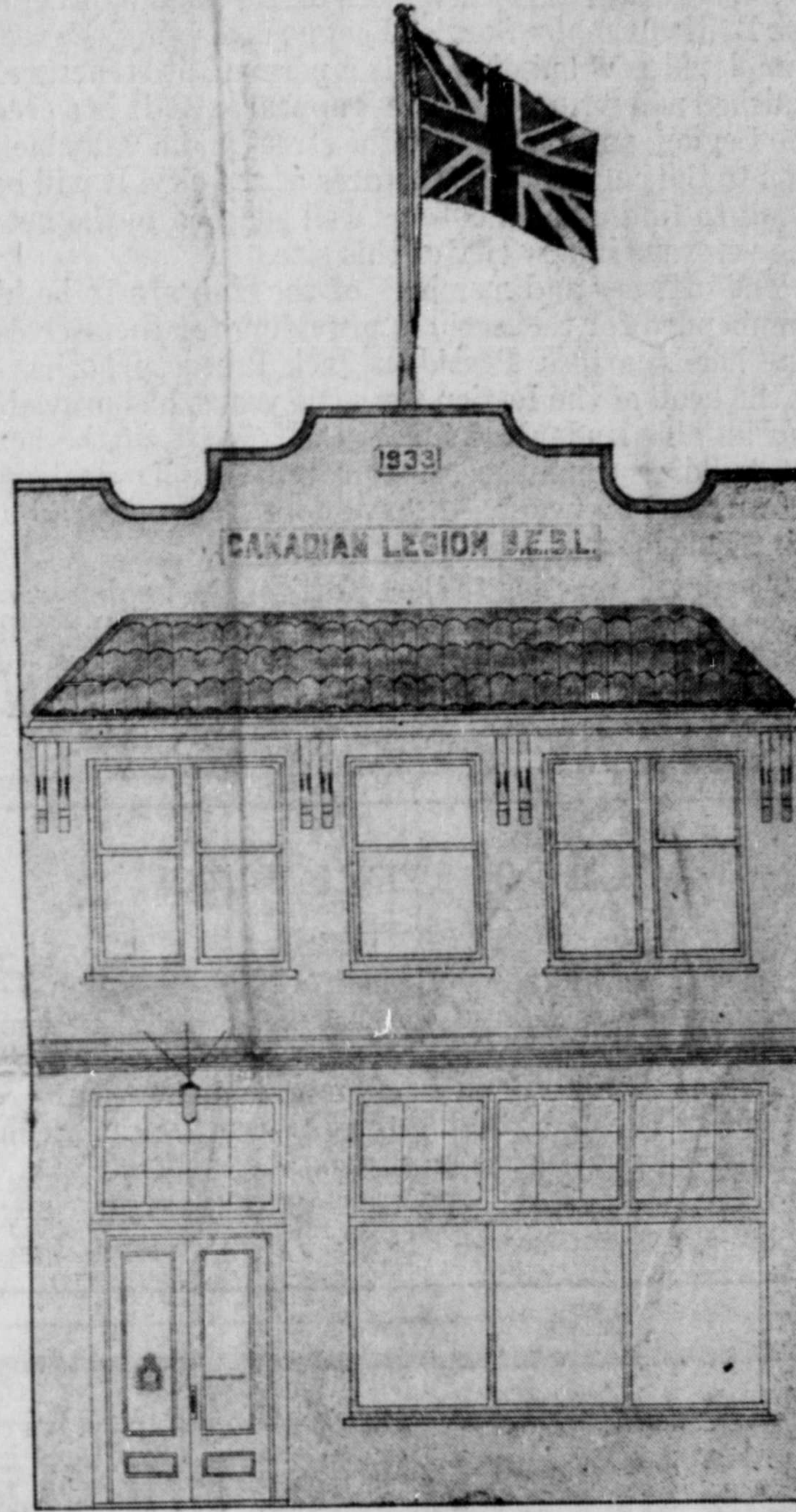

**STAKE BILL BEATEN OUT**

House of Commons Rejects Measure Which Would Have Legalized Hospital Lotteries

OTTAWA, May 23: (CP)—A bill to legalize sweepstakes for hospitals in Canada was defeated in the House of Commons last night by a vote of 105 to 57 via the six months' hoist route. The Senate had already approved sweepstakes for hospitals. The sweepstake bill was introduced in the House by John A. Fraser, Conservative M. P. for Cariboo. The vote was across party lines with Premier Bennett, Opposition Leader W. L. Mackenzie King and J. S. Woodsworth, C. C. F. leader, all opposing the bill.

**YOUTH IS ACQUITTED**

Frank Millen Found Not Guilty Of Murdering Powell River Boy Because of Insanity

NEW WESTMINSTER, May 23: (CP)—Frank Millen, fourteen-year old Powell River boy, was acquitted by a jury on grounds of insanity at the Supreme Court Assizes here yesterday on a charge of murdering John MacFarlane, aged 10, on April 3 at Powell River. The jury recommended sterilization of young Millen who is being held pending disposition by the Attorney General. It is expected he will be committed to asylum.

Mr. Boulter and Mr. Valentine will return to the city tomorrow evening while Mr. Jabour will spend a week at Anyox.

**Bombs Rained Over Large Area By Flight Squadron of Invaders**

Onslaught Said to Have Followed Refusal of Agriculturists to Give up Their Arms on Demand

SHANGHAI, May 23: (CP)—Reports from Peiping today alleged that a Japanese air squadron had bombed a wide area around Chingchow in Southeast Manchuria, killing a thousand farmers and destroying twenty villages. The onslaught is said to have followed refusal of the farmers to comply with demands of the Japanese Army to give up their arms. Many are injured and numerous villages are burning as a result of Japanese incendiary bombs, it is reported.

**GOOD WORK OF LEGION BANDIT IS SHOT DEAD**

This last year the Women's Auxiliary, with the help of the Daughters of the Empire, made the occasion one of the most successful in the history of the city.

Decoration Day, of which for many years the Adair Carss Chapter had charge and which more recently has been the responsibility of Hill 60 Chapter, is an occasion when the last resting place of the returned men who came home to die is fittingly decorated. The soldiers' plots in Fairview Cemetery are being all too rapidly filled and their upkeep is a solemn obligation that is willingly assumed.

SHREVEPORT, La., May 23: (CP)—Clyde Barrow, the southwest's notorious gunman, bank robber and murderer, and his woman companion, Bonnie Parker, were both shot and killed today by a squad of Texas officers as the two hunted criminals sped along a country road in an automobile at eighty-five miles per hour.

When commanded to stop, Barrow speeded up while the woman held a machine gun in her lap and operated it against the pursuers. Officers riddled the bandit car with bullets.

### FOOTBALL WAS DRAW

Merchants and Legion Played to Tie in Fixture Last Night

Merchants took the lead in the race for the Gilhuly Football Cup by holding Canadian Legion to a one-all tie last night in a fast, hard fought game. Merchants have now drawn two games which gives them two points while Legion and Regiment have each one point to their credit. The start of last night's game was again delayed by non-appearance of players, Canadian Legion being the chief offenders in this respect.

Both teams dished up a good brand of soccer and kept the large crowd of fans on their toes throughout. Merchants were fortunate to finish on equal terms as the Legion sharpshooters were awarded two penalty kicks and failed to score in each case. Gurvich saved both penalties in fine style although it is true that both shots were directed straight at the goal. With the Vets playing downhill in the first half they did most of the attacking and should have enjoyed a comfortable lead at the cross over but weak finishing in front of goal spoiled many good scoring opportunities. Smith, in the Vets' goal, did not have one direct shot to handle in the entire first half, so much did the Legion dominate the play in this period. In the opening minutes a miskick by Howe in front of goal spelt danger for the Merchants but the ball was finally scrambled away. Hunt giving away an abortive corner in the process. Thurber passed to Bussanich whose shot was saved by Gurvich at the expense of another fruitless corner. In another Legion attack, H. Dickens fouled Baptie but the resultant free kick was cleared. Merchants then made progress on the left wing and Chenoski forced J. Currie to give away a corner but Chenoski placed weakly behind. Shortly afterwards MacKay had a good opportunity to score but shot past. Play veered up to the other end and, during a hot attack on the Merchants' goal, MacKay was adjudged to have fouled Greer in the dreaded area and Referee R. B. Skinner unhesitatingly awarded a penalty. Christison was entrusted with the spot kick but shot straight at Gurvich who cleared. A golden opportunity was lost. Palmer, Webster and Bussanich put in shots in quick succession but Gurvich was not found wanting and cleared his charge. Midfield play followed but, soon after, the Legion again took up the offensive. Howe fouled Baptie just outside the penalty area. Baptie took the free kick but again Gurvich saved the Merchants' goal from falling. Shortly afterwards, however, he was beaten by a neat header from Christison on a lovely cross from Baptie on the Vets' right wing. This was after twenty-nine minutes of play. The Legion had certainly dominated play in the first half and was fully entitled to its one goal lead at half time.

### Second Half

It was an entirely different story on the resumption. The Merchants

set out with determination to turn the tables on their opponents and Carroll got away on the right, his parting effort just going outside. A. Dickens was right through but J. Currie blocked his shot to save a dangerous situation. The "Butter and Egg" men were hammering away at the Vets' goal in a desperate effort to secure the equalizer and were awarded three corner kicks in as many minutes but were unable to penetrate the Soldier's strong defence. In a breakaway Christison was right through at the other end when H. Dickens dashed up to sweep the legs from under the Legion centre forward. Baptie tried his luck with the resultant penalty kick but shot weakly at Gurvich who cleared. This was indeed fortunate for Merchants. From the goal kick play was carried right to the other end and Howe put in a good shot but Smith saved. J. Currie fouled A. Dickens when the latter was almost through. Howe, instead of trying a shot at goal himself, elected to pass to Chenoski who shot past. After eleven minutes' play the Merchants were rewarded by a goal from Hunt whose shot took Smith by surprise. The right half lobbed a high ball over the heads of several defenders and had the satisfaction of seeing the sphere drop behind Smith's outstretched hands for the equalizing goal. On the resumption S. Currie secured possession and passed out to Palmer on the left who put in a grand shot which flashed across the Merchants' goal but nobody was there to put it home. Both teams were now fighting hard for the lead but Merchants continued to have most of the play. Loken, A. Dickens and Chenoski all had shots of the Vets' goal without success. Thus all the money has been laid out in the city and undoubtedly has been of much assistance in providing a considerable payroll.

All citizens will join in congratulating the branch on their fine building which shows the faith they have in the community and in the future of the city.

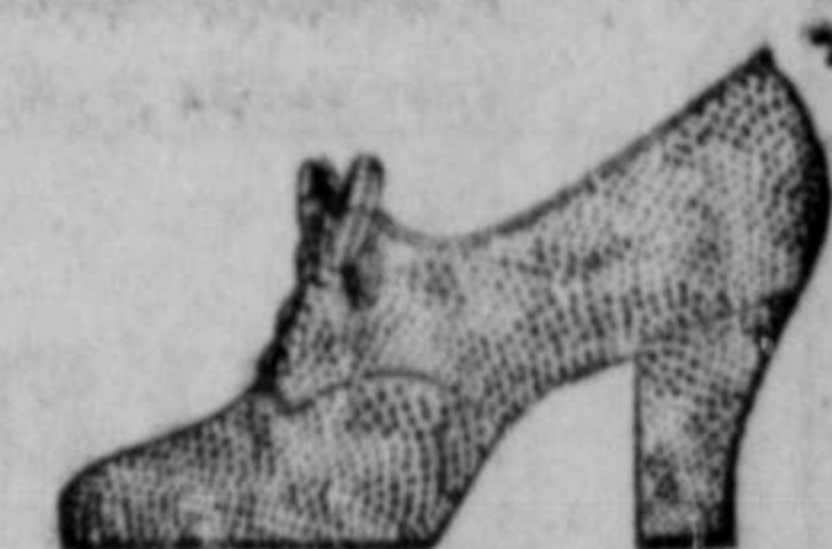
