

INTERESTING NEW BOOK

One of the interesting new books is "Work of Art." h Sinclair Lewis, author of "Main Street," "Babbitt" and other outstanding volumes published at varying intervals since the first year of the war.

"Work of Art" violates all the rules of story writing much as did "Main Street" but its theme is not as generally appealing as was that of the story of the American small town. It deals with the operating of hotels and any person who reads it faithfully from cover to cover should be well posted on what to do and not to do in that line. The aim of the principal character was to operate a perfect hotel which would cater to the very rich and incidentally make him rich. How this failed is one of the tragedies of the

"Work of Art" is a study in hotel keeping, in 'human psychology, and in American life. It is a well worth while volume and there is no bad taste in the mouth at the end.
