All salmon seining in Areas No. 7 and 8 of District No. 2 will be prohibited after the nearest week-end closed season to August 15 until a sufficient quantity of pink salmon have passed safely up to the spawning streams. This closure will be enforced during the 1935 and 1936 seasons after which it is hoped conditions will be found to be sufficiently satisfactory to permit of normal fishing operations.

On the east coast of Queen Charlotte Islands all salmon purse seining will close at the week-end nearest to August 25 during the 1935 and 1936 seasons until a sufficient quantity of pinks have passed to the spawning grounds.

UNHURT BY DEPRESSION

Chain Stores Increase Profits Despite Hard Times, Commission is Told

OTTAWA, Nov. 13: (CP)-Canadian chain stores suffered relatively little damage during the depression, the mass buying commission was told yesterday by F. P. Higgins, Toronto auditor.

Higgins showed that six of the increased gross profits, net profits and dividend paid in 1933 as compared with 1929 despite a slight decrease in net sales.

This was in contrast with acute losses suffered by manufacturers, farmers and other classes.

THE FIVE AND TEN

Since 1929 F. W. Woolworth Co. Ltd. has transferred to the parent company in New York \$11,200,000. the commission was told today by one of its auditors. This represented net profits and dividends after income taxes had been paid.

The commission was informed that the Canadian Woolworth organization is owned and controlled by New York head office and the Canadian company is assessed for a portion of the executive salaries paid in New York. During the past five years the Canadian company paid \$2,750,000 to cover New York management salaries while the Canadian officials were only paid \$1,500,000, leaving an overcharge of \$1,750,000.






