Pageant and Solemnity As Princess Marina Is United To Pr. George

Kings and Queens, Dukes and Duchesses, Lords and Ladies Look on With Hundreds of Thousands of Commuters—Grandeur and Tradition Observed

LONDON, Nov. 29: (CP)—With the pageantry of Old England and the solemnity of two religions, beautiful Princess Marina of Greece was wedded today to the Duke of Kent, better known as Prince George, fourth son of King George V. and Queen Mary of England.

The royal couple were united according to the ritual of the Church of England at 11.30 a.m. in Westminster Abbey and by the rites of the Greek Orthodox Church at a subsequent service in the chapel of Buckingham Palace.

The romance which began in the mountains of Jugo-Slavia on the estate of the assassinated King Alexander was consummated before the most glittering assembly of Europe's high personages which have gathered in the modern decade.

King George and Queen Mary, accompanied by a detachment of household cavalry, were the first in the Abbey. Then came Princess Marina and her father, Prince Nicholas, in the second procession, followed closely by the Duke of Kent and his brother, the Prince of Wales.

As Princess Marina entered the west door of the Abbey she was greeted by her eight bridesmaids. She wore an ermine robe over her silver wedding gown.

The Duke of Kent wore a naval uniform. The Abbey marriage service was solemnized by the Archbishop of Canterbury, before whom the royal couple knelt.

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

With a fair sized list of passengers, C. N. R. steamer Prince George, Capt. H. E. Nedden, arrived in port at 10 o'clock yesterday morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and sailed at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon for Anyox. Stewart and other northern points whence she will return here this evening southbound.

The big Alaska cannery tender Slaviv, surrendered to the Armour Salvage Co. for salvage after having stranded and sunk a couple of months ago in Grenville Channel, has now been completely reconditioned and on Tuesday underwent successful trial runs in the harbor. The Slaviv, which is to be converted to Canadian registry and commissioned in the Armour Salvage Co.'s local fleet, will be the fastest and most powerful general service boat in northern waters.

Northbound from Vancouver to Prince Rupert, Union steamer Cardena, Capt. Ernest Georgeson, was at Wadhams, Rivers Inlet, at 1 o'clock this morning. The vessel is due here tomorrow evening.

Skipper Bert Flewin, after a brief visit to port, returned to Port Simpson at noon today with his fish packer Taplow II, having on board George P. McColl, manager of the Hudson Bay store at Simpson, who had been in town for a couple of days on business. A. B. Cumming of Vancouver, district manager of the fur department of the Hudson Bay Co. for British Columbia, whom Mr. McColl had accompanied to the city after a visit to Port Simpson, returned to Vancouver on the steamer Catala Tuesday afternoon.

N. McDonald, in protest at the City Nightsoil Bylaw, declined, after appearing in city police court Tuesday afternoon before Magistrate McClymont, to pay a fine of \$1 and comply with an order to pay \$5 arrears, choosing instead to take the option of two days in jail. Mr. McDonald had refused to pay fees under the bylaw, claiming them to be an imposition.

STILL OF INTEREST

Basking Shark or No, Prince Rupert Does Not Intend to Part With Sea Monster

In spite of the positive identification of Dr. W. A. Clemens, director of the Nanaimo Biological Station, of the remains of a sea monster, which were found on Henry Island outside of Prince Rupert Harbor recently, as being those of a basking shark, a fairly common denizen of the deep, much interest still continues to be taken in the remains, not only in Prince Rupert but in the outside world.

Dr. Neal Carter, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, finds in every mail quantities of correspondence in regard to the creature. Yesterday brought an inquiry from F. Kermode, curator of the Provincial Museum at Victoria, who asked for full information regarding the skeleton. As far as can be learned, the Provincial Museum does not possess a basking shark among its many exhibits of natural life.

Another letter received yesterday by Dr. Carter was from a Port Angeles artist, who specializes in the painting of marine life and who would make an oil painting of Prince Rupert's sea monster. He has already painted "Cadborosaurus" of Victoria fame. Many Prince Rupert people enthusiastically feel that, come what may, any and all efforts to take the skeleton away from this city to any distant museum should be actively resisted. It is of sufficient interest and rarity, they feel, to be worth preserving and holding here as a permanent exhibit.

More Relief Is Requested

Unemployed Send Communication To Premier Pattullo Asking Greater Allowance

Local unemployed, following a meeting, have forwarded a request to Premier T. D. Pattullo for an increase of one hundred percent in the unemployment relief allowance and an issue of clothing necessary for men who have to work outside under inclement weather conditions in return for their relief. The request is similar in tone to one dispatched by local unemployed ex-service men to the federal government, the full text of which was published this week. Based on the minimum wage rate for the province, the four days' work per month now required is claimed to be in excess of the relief allowance granted. The allowance, it is contended, is sufficient only to procure the bare necessities of life and does not permit of clothing being obtained.
