### REDS IN WALK-OUT

Red Menace in Connection With Textile Workers' Strike Called For Tonight in U.S.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 1: (CP)-Threats of Communistic strife have entered into the impending cotton textile strike while Union leaders are fighting to hold their lines on American principles.

The strike order issued yesterday called for a walk-out of some 500,000 spinners and weavers over a territory of 1,281 miles in New England and the south tonight following collapse of peace negotiations here.

The strike was extended today to include 200,000 silk workers, completely paralyzing the textile industry with approximately 700,-000 workers involved.

The strike becomes effective at midnight tonight.
