REDS IN WALK-OUT

Red Menace in Connection With Textile Workers' Strike Called For Tonight in U.S.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 1: (CP)—Threats of Communist strike have entered into the impending cotton textile strike while Union leaders are fighting to hold their lines on American principles.

The strike order issued yesterday called for a walk-out of some 500,000 spinners and weavers over a territory of 1,281 miles in New England and the south tonight following collapse of peace negotiations here.

COLOR AS AN ASSET

A visitor who had recently been in the United States and had driven a great deal about one of the large cities remarked on the fact that the gardens of Prince Rupert showed more color than did the gardens in the big city to the south. It was one of the best compliments yet received for the city in which we live.

The worst feature of the local gardens is that there are too many breaks caused by neglected vacant lots. Even on the best part of Fourth Avenue and on Borden Street there are gaps in the general scheme of beautification that mar the effect.

It has been suggested that, where adjoining vacant lots interfere with the scheme of street beautification, the owners of gardens try to secure the use of the vacant lot and do enough work on it to prevent it being an eyesore to the whole community. In some places the municipality charges the owner a fee for cutting the weeds. At any rate an effort should be made to co-ordinate the gardening activities so that, while there may not be uniformity on a street, there may at least be a prevention of the unsightly conditions that now exist.

This summer has been favorable to gardening. While the slugs and cut worms did a great deal of damage, enough flowers were saved to give plenty of color and lawns have been kept better than ever before. If the present rate of progress can be maintained Prince Rupert will soon become noted for its gardens and flowers and tourists will come from far and wide to see them. Also the railway authorities will recognize the city's attractions and give the tourists plenty of time to explore it.

WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Eight Canadian Boats Still Operating in Halibut Fishery—Good Prices Paid During Week—Rough Water in Hecate Straits

Following the closing of Area No. 2 to halibut fishing for the season, the opening of September sees only three vessels of the Prince Rupert fleet actually on the grounds in the more distant Area No. 3 although five other vessels have not yet discontinued operations for 1934 and are contemplating further fishing this fall. The Canadian boats actually out are the Takla, Capt. Chris Parkvold, Cape Beale, Capt. Edgar Arnott, and Signal, Capt. Paddy Ivarson. The other boats which have not discontinued halibut fishing operations definitely for the season are the Lysekil, Capt. Al Wole, Margaret I, Capt. George Fritz, Covenant, Capt. Hans Underdahl, Melville, Capt. John Ivarson, and Teeny Milly, Capt. George Fritz.

During the week ending yesterday there were no arrivals of Canadian halibut at Prince Rupert and American landings were light at 117,000 pounds from seven boats. This brought the total of American landings for the season up to 6,134,600 pounds which, added to the Canadian total of 5,490,265 pounds, made a grand total for the season at the port to date 11,624,865 pounds. Prices during the week reached the high mark for the season of 11.7c and 7c paid the Tahoma yesterday for 19,000 pounds. The prices for the week ranged downward from this to 9c and 6c.

Pilot Jack MacConnachie returned on Monday of this week to Anyox with his Eastman flying boat after having spent Carnival Week in Prince Rupert making barnstorming flights over the city with local sightseers. The popular northern pilot plied a good trade. Weather conditions were ideal and many folk made short trips. Possibly for the majority it was their first ascent in aircraft.

The fine weather of the past week or so here has been attended with brisk westerly winds outside the harbor which on some occasions attained veritable gale proportions. All incoming small craft report that it has been very rough in Hecate Straits and elsewhere outside. On some of the more exposed trolling grounds, it has been impossible to carry on fishing operations.

Union steamer Cardena, Capt. Ernest Georgeon, with a good sized list of passengers on board, arrived in port at 10:20 last night from the south and sailed on schedule at midnight on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

SHIP SINKS; MANY DEAD

One Hundred and Thirty-Six Passengers of Steamer Perish in Wreck Off Manchuria

TOKYO, Sept. 1: (CP)—The steamer Takan Maru founded near Antung, Manchuria, yesterday and 136 passengers and members of the crew were drowned. Twenty-six persons were saved.

Mrs. Don Yelf and two children, who have been spending the summer at Massett, will sail from there on the Prince Charles tomorrow, returning to their home in Vancouver.

CHEVROLET STILL LEADS

Gain Brings Six Months Total to 67% Over the 1933 Sales, With Nearly All Makes Sharing In the Advance

Sales of new passenger cars in Eastern Canada continued to shoot upward in June, exceeding even the May figures, although the latter is normally the peak month in the year. At the same time, they showed a gain of 83% over June, 1933. The total for June of this year was 9,287, as compared to 9,254 in May and 5,027 in June of a year ago.

The gain brings the total for the first six months of this year to 32,124 units, a 67% increase over the 20,001 which had been sold in the same period of 1933. Nearly all makes shared in the advance. Chevrolet continues to lead the parade with 8,823 to the end of June. Ford is a close second with 7,540 as compared with with 3,909 last year. Plymouth and Dodge continue to battle for third place with 3,648 and 3,562, respectively. The former is now more than 100% ahead of its six months total of 1933.

Oldsmobile has moved into fifth place among the leaders. A gain during June brought the total for this make to 1,407, as compared with 464 in the same period of last year. Hudson continues to show the greatest percentage gain, registering 211 in June, as against 24 last year, with six month totals for this year and last 629 and 81, respectively. (204)
