### Two Hundred Persons Landed By Lifeboats or Picked Up

Conflagration Started in Library and Spread To Great Tanks of Fuel Which Blew Up, Making Vessel Seething Inferno of Flames.

SPRING LAKE, N.J., Sept. 8: (CP)—Fire swept the passenger liner Morro Castle at dawn barely eight miles off shore from Asbury Park, N.J., and early this afternoon 253 of the 558 passengers and crew on board were unaccounted for or known to be dead. Others had landed in lifeboats or had been picked up by rescue steamers. Sixty bodies had been recovered at this time and 185 persons had been definitely rescued and 193 were still missing in addition to the known dead.
