Giant Machine "Southern Cross" Makes 1970 Mile Trip From Senegal to Brazil in Little Over Eighteen Hours-Germany Also in Competition

NATAL, Brazil, Jan. 4: (CP)-The great French flying boat Southern Cross arrived here today after completing an Atlantic crossing from Saint Louis, Senegal, in eighteen hours and seventeen minutes for 1970 miles. The plane is the French entry in a race with Germany to set up the first trans-Atlantic air mail line between Europe and South America via Africa.

Magnificent Scene As Pope Creates Saint Bernadette

Economic Changes in England Planned; American Plan Being **Emulated** in Certain Respects

LONDON, Jan. 4: (CP)-England is to institute important economic changes, some of them along the lines of the N. R. A. in the United States. The British government, at the present session, will move for sweeping changes in the industrial line-up. Each basic industry will probably be required by law to promote schemes of amal-

gamation of individual firms into redundant firms. Organization of iarge scale buying of raw materials HOPING TO and central administration of selling finished products will also be probably provided for. Failure of industries to carry out conditions of protective tariffs may force remedial actions.
