COL. RALSTON LEADS ATTACK ON BUDGET IN COMMONS

One Billion Ounces of White Metal Will Be Bought by Uncle Sam

Would be Purchased For Use as Primary Money at Rate Of Fifty Million Ounces Monthly-Congressional Passage and Presidential Approval Predicted

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 24: (CP)-Congressional passage and presidential approval of a bill to authorize the purchase of one billion ounces of silver for use as primary money was predicted today by a member of the Senate silver bloc who participated in the White House silver conference yesterday. The legislation would call for the purchase of fifty million ounces of silver monthly.
