Rotterdam Aug. 10.—A boiler on the Rhine steamer Gutenberg exploded today with fatal results. Six sailors were killed and the captain and ten passengers were seriously injured. Three others are missing and it is supposed that they were blown overboard. The funnel and portions of the boiler were hurled against the walls of the building on the mainland. The bursting boilers split the vessel in two and it sank almost instantly. It is known that a large number of her passengers perished.
