NO DICTATORSHIP STATES PREMIER
BIG METEOR FALLS ON PRAIRIE WITH DEAFENING CRASH

Bursting Star Cuts Blinding Swath And Is Seen Far Afield

Thousand of Persons in Alberta and Saskatchewan Are Startled by Astral Phenomenon Sunday Night—Houses Are Shaken Over Wide Area

EDMONTON, March 19: (CP)—Startling thousands of persons in Alberta and Saskatchewan as it cut a blinding swath of brilliant silver green light, a huge meteor flashed across the heavens at 9 o'clock last night and burst like a star bomb a few miles south of Ferintosh. The phenomenon was visible from Edmonton and houses were shaken

by the detonation over a wide area but so far no trace has been found of the meteorite, the physical body of a meteor that some times strikes the earth.

The falling meteor was seen as far distant as Saskatoon on the east and Banff on the west and throughout an area 150 miles wide, motorists on highways and passengers in trains being startled.

STEVEDORES TO STRIKE

Vote in San Francisco Yesterday is Ten to One in Favor of Walk-Out For Wage Adjustment

SAN FRANCISCO, March 19:—Longshoremen here voted 10 to 1 yesterday in favor of a walk-out in demand for a wage adjustment which employers have so far refused to meet. The strike, which is set to start on Friday, may affect stevedoring service in all ports of the coast from San Diego to Seattle.

Insull Now Being Shipped to States

Will be Transferred at Mediterranean Port to Another Vessel For Transport Home

ATHENS, March 19:—Greek government authorities stated on Saturday that Samuel Insull, former American utilities magnate and fugitive from justice following his indictment over a year ago in Chicago on embezzlement, larceny and conspiracy charges, would be landed by the freight steamer, in which he attempted last week to escape to Port Said, in Egypt or some other Mediterranean port whence he will be transferred to another steamer for delivery direct back to the United States.

STRIKE IN LOG CAMP

J. R. Morgan Co.'s Operations at Crescent Inlet Reported Tied Up—Police Report Awaited

Divisional headquarters of the provincial police here have been advised of a loggers' strike in the J. R. Morgan Co.'s logging camp at Crescent Inlet, Queen Charlotte Islands, where upwards of one hundred men are employed. No details were available to noon today when a further report from Constable C. G. Sharpe of Queen Charlotte City was being awaited.

More Camps Close

VANCOUVER, March 19:—There are no signs of an immediate settlement of the strike of loggers who are demanding higher wages from the Bloedel, Stewart & Welch, Thompson & Clark, Elk River, Lamb Lumber Co. and Great Central camps which are still closed. All efforts to bring about an agreement between the companies and the men have so far failed.

Three more camps closed down over the week-end. As a result of the strike about 2200 loggers are now out. The latest camps affected are Merrill and Ring at Rock Bay, the Discovery Passage Timber Co. at Elk Bay and Brown & Kirkland Logging Co. at Seymour Narrows.

New York Stock Mart Still Weak

All Averages Down in Saturday's Trading as Depression Continues

NEW YORK, March 19:—Weakness was again displayed during Saturday's brief session of trading on the New York Stock Exchange. Industrials closed at an average of 101.65, off 1.07; rails at 48.43, off .37; utilities at 26.33, off .24, and bonds at 92.40, off .02.

STRIKE IS POSTPONED

Commencement of Tie-up of Automobile Industry in U.S. Deferred to Wednesday

NEW YORK, March 19: (CP)—Commencement of the strike of the automobile trades of the American Federation of Labor has been deferred from today until Wednesday as efforts continue to be made by the authorities with a view to effecting a satisfactory settlement. Fear has been expressed that 250,000 workers may be involved, practically tying up the industry. Heads of the various automobile manufacturing companies are refusing to meet demands of employees for recognition of labor unions and reinstatement of men dismissed for union activities.

CANADIAN IS KILLED

Rev. Emil Choset, Quebec Missionary, Reported Slain by Bandits in Manchuria

MONTREAL, March 19:—Advice was received here on Saturday that Rev. Emil Choset, aged 35, French Canadian missionary, had been killed by bandits in Manchuria.

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Further Details of Special Powers Act Come Up This Week

Government's Plans on Economic Matters to be More Fully Explained—Administration Will Still be Responsible For Full Accounting to Legislature

VICTORIA, March 19: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo intimated on Saturday that the plans of the government in connection with the Special Powers Act, which would bestow wide powers on the government for the next year in connection with economic matters, would be explained in the Legislature more fully this week.

"The government is not attempting to set up a dictatorship," declared Mr. Pattullo, "but it is necessary that we be prepared for any eventuality in our endeavors to adequately meet the existing situation."

"There is nothing of that sort involved," said Mr. Pattullo to newspapermen when confronted with the word 'dictatorship' in connection with the 'Special Powers Act.' "The government has not the slightest intention of interfering with constitutional acts or the rights of elected representatives of the people."

The Premier added that, despite the wide powers that would be conferred, the Legislature must be called into session again within the statutory period of one year after it prorogues and the government would then have to give a full accounting of all it had done under special measures.

Governor Rolph Leaves Hospital

Chief Executive of California Makes Speedy Recovery From Pulmonary Congestion

SAN FRANCISCO, March 19:—Governor James Rolph Jr. had made such a satisfactory recovery from a pulmonary congestion from which he has been suffering during the past two or three weeks that he was able to be out of bed yesterday and it was expected that he would be allowed to leave hospital for home today.

Prison at Piers Island Closing

Last of Doukhobors Serving Time For Nude Parading About to Return to Brilliant

VICTORIA, March 19:—The special prison camp at Piers Island, where Doukhobors have been incarcerated for the past couple of years for nude parading, is about to be closed. The last of the offenders have about completed the serving of their terms and will be returning to their homes at Brilliant.

Prince Mdvani and Heiress Bride On Way to Singapore

HONG KONG, March 19:—Prince Mdvani and his bride, the former Barbara Hutton, five and ten cent store heiress, sailed from here on Saturday for Singapore in the course of their honeymoon tour of the Orient.

CHILDREN ARE SLAIN

New York Man Being Sought Following Quadruple Killing on St. Patrick's Day

NEW YORK, March 19:—The New York police are conducting a wide man hunt for John McHale who is alleged to have beaten his four children to death on Saturday afternoon following refusal of his wife to go with him to a St. Patrick's dance. On returning home from a family shopping trip, Mrs. McHale found the four children dead and her husband disappeared. It is believed he may have been suffering from a mental disorder.

CAUSED COLD CHILLS

Prince Rupert people must be excused if they felt the cold chills run up their backs last week when they heard that the steamer Prince Rupert was not to exchange places with the Prince George but would return to Vancouver. It was at once feared that the Prince George would follow her and that the Rupert would not return here for repairs. The orders for the change had come at the last minute, just as had a somewhat similar order on a previous occasion and everybody was suspicious. Bitter experience had taught them to be so. It is very satisfactory to know that no important change of plans is contemplated.

OTTAWA A PROBLEM

The Ottawa situation with an election in sight within the next year and possibly within the next few months is very complicated, Premier Bennett, according to report, has been trying to get someone to take charge of the election campaign but without success. General McRae, who was so successful four years ago, refuses to have anything to do with it. Hon. H. H. Stevens, minister of trade and commerce, who has been the most active, indeed, almost the only active member of the cabinet outside of the premier, is reported to be not in favor with the Prime Minister.

Reports received from the eastern and western points indicate that the Bennett administration is not in favor with the electorate but neither is Mackenzie King so very popular, even with his own party. The C. C. F. is badly disorganized in the east, so there seems to be a general discontent with everyone and everybody. It is an age of discontent. Ottawa is a problem that an election may or may not solve.

Perry, Fort George, and Kenney, Skeena, Oppose Stewart Railway; Case of Northern Camp Presented

VICTORIA, March 19: (CP)—Strong opposition to the extension for five years of the charter granted in 1929 for the construction of a railway line from Stewart to Fort Grahame by the Canadian Northeastern Railway, controlled by the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. Ltd. was voiced in the private bills committee of the Legislature at the end of the week by Hon. H. G. Perry, Liberal member for Prince George and Speaker of the House, and E. T. Kenney, Liberal member for Skeena. Both opposed the extension on the grounds that, if completed, it would tap the Peace River country and probably ruin any chance of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway being extended there.

Case of Stewart

STEWART, March 19:—A public meeting was held in the Moose Hall under the auspices of the Stewart Board of Trade to discuss the pending application of the Canadian North Eastern Railway Company for extension of time for railway construction under the charter granted in 1929. Edward T. Applewhite, president of the Stewart Board of Trade, was in the chair and outlined briefly the discussions at the meetings of the board, resulting in the appointment of a committee to draft a resolution for submission at this meeting. The resolution, it was stated, was to serve as a basis for discussion at the meeting and to be amended or changed as the meeting should see fit. William R. Tooth, chairman of the municipal council, introduced the motion, explaining each clause. After a full and free discussion the resolution was finally adopted in the following form:

"Whereas notice has been given that an application will be made to the Legislative Assembly by the Canadian North Eastern Railway Company for an act extending the time for the completion of the lines of railway which the company is authorized to construct;

"And whereas one of the said lines of railway is the line from Stewart to Fort Grahame in which the people of the community of Stewart and other Portland Canal communities are vitally interested;

"And whereas the said railway company has a lease on the waterfront at Stewart until 1950;

"And whereas, under existing statutes, the line of railway from Stewart to Fort Grahame was to have been completed by March 20, 1934;

"And whereas great benefit would accrue to the Province of British Columbia by development of the rich mineral deposits and other natural resources in the belt through which the proposed railroad would be constructed;

"And whereas public statement has been made by a minister of the crown, Hon. A. Wells Gray, to the effect that development of Northern British Columbia by rail and road would pull the province out of the present depression;

Extension Favored

"Now, therefore, this public meeting resolves as follows:

"1. That this meeting is in favor of an extension of time being granted to the Canadian North Eastern Railway Company for the construction of the said line from Stewart to Fort Grahame, provided that

"2. The Government of British Columbia should receive from the said railway company legally binding assurances that a certain amount of work will be done within the time specified in any extension to be granted.

"3. That, in considering this matter, the government of British Columbia should not place the interests of the northern part of British Columbia secondary to the interests of any other railway company or the southern part of the province."

The meeting decided that copies of this resolution should be sent to the Premier of British Columbia, the Department of Railways at Victoria, Wm. J. Asselstine, M. L. A. for Atlin, the Minister of Lands, the Chairman of the Railways Committee of the Legislature, Rev. Robert Connell, Leader of the Opposition, and Clive Planta, M. L. A. for Peace River.

P. B. Jack acted as secretary to the meeting.

At the regular meeting of the council of the Stewart Board of Trade, preceding the public meeting, most of the time was taken up in a full and informal discussion of the application of the Canadian

North Eastern Railway Company for extension of the charter to build the line from Stewart to Fort Grahame. Finally a committee consisting of the president of the board and the chairman of the municipal commissioners was appointed to prepare a resolution for submission to the provincial government and the member for Atlin, the resolution to be submitted to the public meeting.

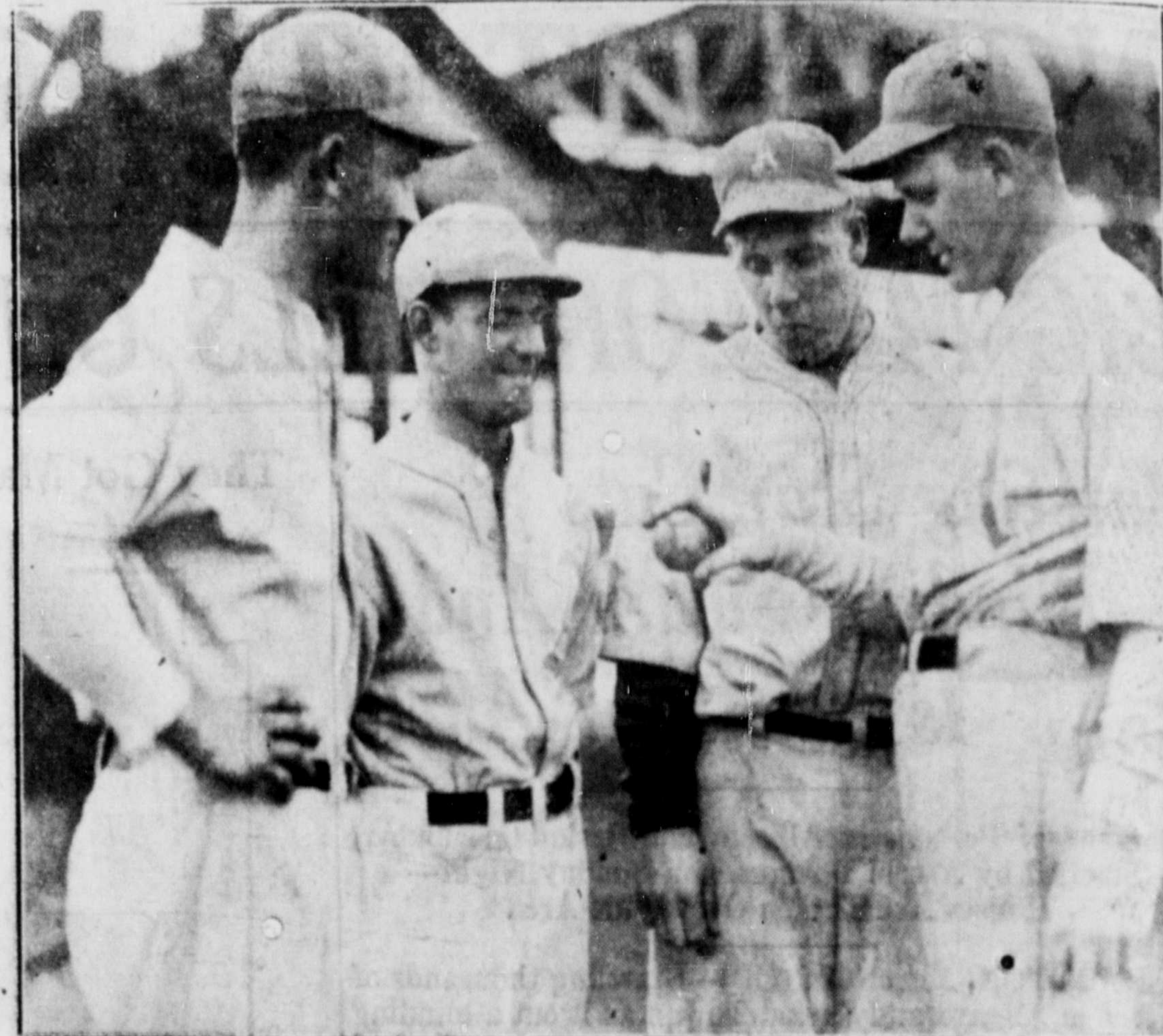

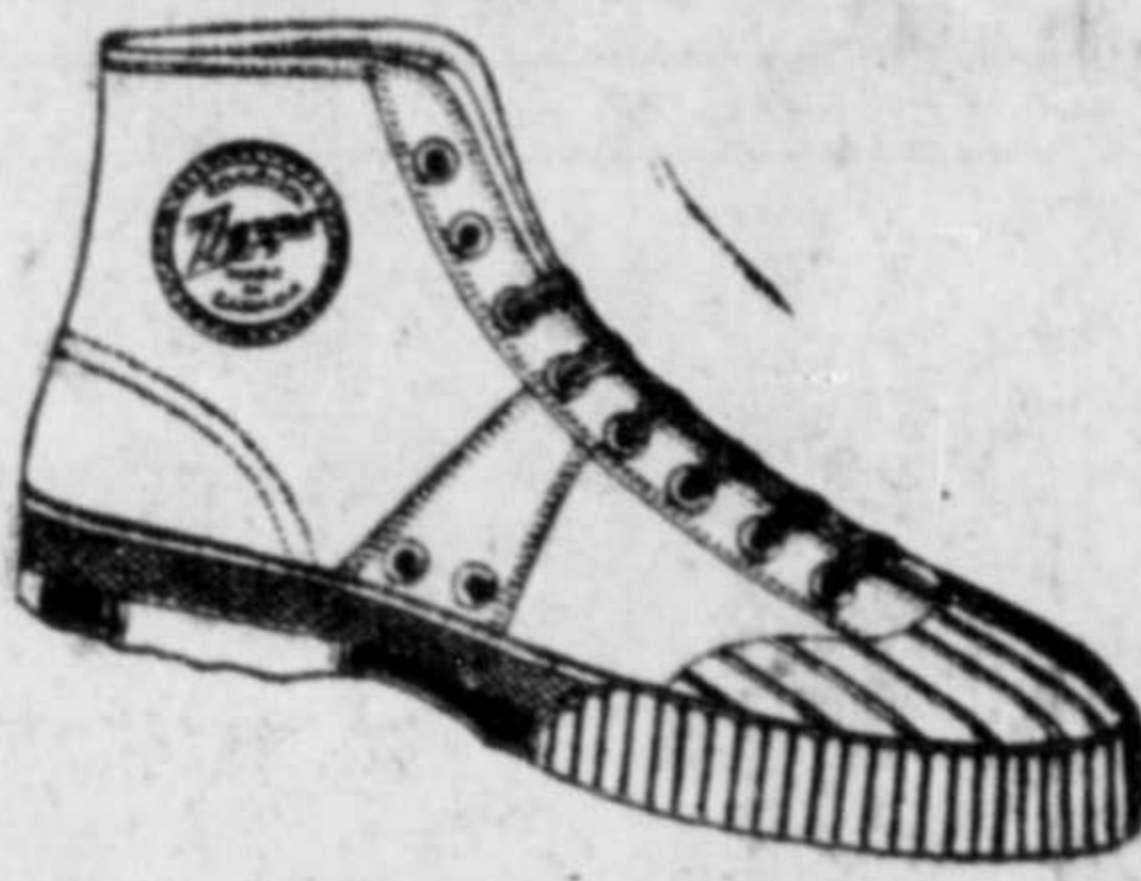
